

First U. S. Ships to Go Around North America Sail for Home

ARGENTINA, Sept. 20 (AP)—Three U. S. military ships are leaving tonight for their home ports, completing the first circumnavigation of North America by American vessels.

The cutter *Storis* and buoy tender *Bramble* and Spar left Washington July 1, crossed the Arctic Circle in Bering Strait July 10 and recrossed it 64 days later in Davis Strait.

Weary of a summer-long battle against sea wind and ice, the ships docked at the U. S. naval base here yesterday to take on fuel and fresh provisions. Cmdr. Harold L. Wood, commanding officer of the *Storis* and the three-ship unit, said the brief stopover also provided the officers and crew with rest and recreation. They covered more than 4,000 miles in the Arctic without a break.

Train Kills Man Walking Along Tracks

WOODBURN, Sept. 20 (AP)—A broad-gauge train was killed instantly when hit by a train this morning while walking on the Oregon Electric tracks near the old Broad-gauge railroad station near here.

Lawrence Britten, about 45, was hit by the southbound Southern Pacific train 231 between 1:42 and 1:45 and carried approximately 500 feet, it was reported by Marion County sheriff's office.

The sheriff's report also said the engineer was unaware of the accident and the body was discovered later Friday morning by L. F. Marshall, Woodburn, a member of the railroad fire patrol.

Britten, a laborer, had been living at Broadacres for about the last seven years, and is believed to have a wife and son in San Francisco. He had a habit of walking the tracks, according to friends, and was last seen at a racetrack tavern earlier in the evening.

Completion Time Advanced on Salem Water Line

Construction of the \$3,750,000 Stayton Island to Salem water line is proceeding well ahead of schedule with completion estimates pushed up from July 1959 to late next summer, according to John Geren, Salem water department supervisor.

First link of the long line, from Turner to Stayton Island was 71 per cent complete by Aug. 31. Early estimates looked for only 63 per cent of the line to be down by that date. Completion of this link should come early this fall, Geren said.

Contractors Lord Bros. Construction are ready to go under the north channel of the North Santiam at Stayton Island. This will link the island with Stayton.

World Record Cold Recorded

DAVISVILLE, R.I., Sept. 20 (AP)—A world record low temperature of 102.1 degrees below zero Fahrenheit was recorded Tuesday at the South Pole.

Antarctic bound scientists were told of the new mark during a briefing yesterday at the naval construction battalion center here.

The new mark is 1.2 degrees colder than the minus 100.4 recorded at the South Pole May 11.

The new low was recorded by Dr. Paul Siple and his International Geophysical Year pole station crew. Dr. Harry Wexler, chief scientist of the United States antarctic program, said.

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Trees Foil Copter Rescue; Ailing Hunter Dies in Idaho

GRANGEVILLE, Idaho (AP)—A Boise hunter died in the remote Selway primitive area of North central Idaho after heavy timber prevented use of a helicopter as an emergency ambulance.

Ralph M. Karre, about 46 and the father of five, apparently died of bleeding ulcers Thursday night. He became violently ill Wednesday at a hunting camp on Battle Ridge near the Idaho-Montana line 70 miles northeast of here and 30 miles west of Hamilton, Mont.

A fellow hunter Robert McLellan of Boise walked 17 miles to the Woolley Pack Camp for help. A rider with horses was sent back.

Another hunter Harvey Blake Boise met the rescue party on the trail and reported Karre was too ill to ride a horse.

Political Violence Erupts In San Marino Republic

SAN MARINO, Sept. 20 (AP)—San Marino, smallest republic in the world, had two governments and a king-size political rumpus today.

Contending factions in this mountain-top nation of 30 square miles and 13,000 persons were the Communists, who have ruled since 1945, and an opposition of Christian Democrats, independents and Socialists who have set up a rump government.

The political battle turned into violence last night. Soldiers turned anti-Communists away from the Parliament building and San Marinense attacked each other with fists and feet in a free-for-all.

All was quiet in the centuries-old town square today. But militiamen in 19th Century uniforms and fingering pre-World War I rifles nervously suggested that a party of 200 foreign tourists leave the country they did.

The crisis broke out when six Reds, member of the Grand Council—Parliament—that was elected two years ago defected. That reduced the Communists' 33 seats a majority to 29 in the 60-member body.

Council Dissolved
The Grand Council was supposed to meet yesterday to elect captains regent, chief ministers for the next six months and the Communists faced defeat. Before the council could meet the Communists dissolved it and called a new election for Nov. 3.

The opposition objects to election.

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Lost Estacada Man Found Safe in Woods

ESTACADA, Sept. 20 (AP)—Herman Gehring, 38-year-old Estacada area man lost Thursday while on a walk near his home, was found safe Friday about half a mile from his home.

Authorities said the elderly man a mule with a history of heart attacks was tired and hungry but otherwise unharmed from his overnight stay in the chilly open. He was taken to a Portland hospital where he was reported doing fine.

The search, involving a number of men and bloodhounds ended about 3:10 p.m. when Stan Wise, resident of the area came upon the missing man.

Immigrants Increase

OTTAWA, Sept. 20 (AP)—More immigrants arrived in Canada in the first eight months of 1957 than in any full year since 1913. The eight-month figure was put at 225,000, and 30,000 more may come along by Dec. 31. The 1954 total was 164,857. The peak year 1913 landed 400,870.

Boone received the Pulitzer award earlier this year in recognition of the editorials he wrote in Alabama when Miss Autherine J. Lucy, a Negro, sought admittance to the University of Alabama.

He will be awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree by Colby Friday evening, Nov. 8.

The occasion is a tribute to Elijah Parish Lovejoy, Colby-educated editor who is considered America's first martyr to press freedom. Lovejoy an early abolitionist, was shot to death by a mob while defending his press in Alton, Ill. in 1837.
