Muffet Specialties

Milk Curds, Yogurt Favored By Ancients

Long before Little Miss Muffet was interrupted by a spider in her lurch of curds and whey, milk curd in some form had been enjoyed by peoples all over the world. Now that cottage cheese has come again into popularity we might look to see what it and its cousins have done for the world.

Milk curd is an appetizer in Persia (now Iran), where it is cooled and served before most meals. There might be a sprinkling of cardamom or poppy seeds, a little cinnamon or cloves ground together with rose paste, or a light topping of yogurt or pistachios.

The Iranians serve curd in the form of yogurt or mast as a soup too. This is uncooked and served cold.

Yogurt Cucumber Soup

3 cups yogurt
1 1/2 cups finely cubed cucumbers
1/2 cup dried currants or small seedless raisins
1/2 cup water

1 tablespoon minced fresh dill
3 tablespoons minced chives
1 teaspoon salt
Dash of black pepper

Beat yogurt, add cucumbers and currants, then add water until the consistency of cream soup. Add dill, chives, seasonings and blend well. Chill. Serve cold. Add 2 hard-cooked eggs chopped if more heartiness is desired. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

A green garden salad served traditionally during the Jewish holiday Shavuoth is one which takes pot or cottage cheese.

Garden Green Salad

1 or 2 cucumbers
10 radishes
2 green onions, 3 tomatoes

Pot cheese or cottage cheese
Sour cream
Salt
Green greens

Use green and white of onions. Cut all vegetables to desired size, serve with the cheese and sour cream and pumpernickel bread. Yogurt, another recently popularized milk product appreciated by peoples of foreign countries. The Egyptians prefer a yogurt salad with surprise flavors in their contribution to the United Nations Cookbook.

Yogurt Salad

1/2 teaspoon minced garlic
1 teaspoon minced fresh mint
1 pint yogurt

3 cups unpeeled cucumber slices
1 large cucumber
3 medium radishes

Mix garlic and mint with yogurt, stir in cucumber slices. Serve on lettuce cups and garnish with radish slices. Makes 3 or 4 servings.

Clabbered milk is an old standby in Scandinavian countries. It must be with un-pasteurized milk according to these standard directions. It is served chilled with sugar, ginger and cinnamon and accompanied by knackebrod or ginger snaps.

Clabbered Milk

Smear bottoms of four individual glass or china bowls with 1/4 teaspoon sour cream. Set in a warm place and fill with milk. Cover with paper and leave until milk has set (separated or clabbered). Then place in refrigerator until ready to serve. If to be made in large bowl, beat well before serving.
