getting six points early in the second period and again just before time ran out on them at the half.

Most of the second half was played in a midfield. The Mustang's deepest penetration was to South's 30 on their initial drive in the second half. The Sax best effort came in the waning moments of the contest. They got as far as the MIII 34 where a pass interception ruined their last chances of reaching paydirt.

Nothing went right for the Sax in the first half. Penalties ruined three drives, they lost the ball once on a fumble, which indirectly led to the first Milwaukie score, and a pass deflected by a South defender fell into the arms of its intended receiver and was instrumental in setting up the second Milwaukie touchdown.

## Moore Stops Anthony in 7th

### Archie Still Top Ranker

Tony Showed He Could Take It

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 30 (AP)—

Youth made a bold and a gallant stand but in the end it was light heavyweight champion Archie Moore who held on to his world title tonight with a cannonade of shots that brought a knockout in the seventh round over young Tony Anthony of New York.

Scheduled for 15 rounds, California's most famous fugitive from a rocking chair and carpet slippers put the crusher on 25-year-old Tony after 11 minutes 25 seconds of the seventh.

Moore, who claims to be under 40 and more likely is in his mid-40's, thus successfully defended the title he won in 1952 for the sixth time.

It was a riotous sixth and seventh rounds that thrilled a crowd of around 8,000 in Olympic auditorium and it must have given a national television audience a kick as well.

Referee Mushy Callahan halted the proceedings after Anthony was beaten to the canvas midway in the seventh, and as the rangy fighter managed to get to his feet, Mushy stepped in and halted it.

Under California rules it goes as a knockout—so ordained to keep a hopelessly beaten fighter from further punishment.

Moore weighed in right on the nose just before noon at 175, and it took more than 20 minutes overtime for the San Diego king to part off an extra quarter of a pound.

Anthony, who was to receive his first loss as a light heavyweight, weighed a trim 172.

Tony did deflate the impression he has a glass jaw. If it was china, he would have gone down from some of Archie's finest shots long before he did.

## Seattle Boat No. 1 Choice

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 (AP)—Mira Slovak, refugee Czech pilot and speedboat driver, expressed a special reason today for wanting to win the President's Cup on the Potomac River this weekend.

"If I win," Slovak said, "then I will get a chance to shake hands with President Eisenhower and thank him for what he did for me."

Slovak, now private pilot for William E. Boeing Jr. of Seattle, is one of 16 hydroplane drivers here to compete for the \$30,000 President's Cup in races tomorrow and Sunday.

The 27-year-old Slovak, who says he gets a bigger thrill from driving hydroplanes 150 miles an hour than from flying, mans the wheel of Boeing's Miss Wahoo. He and Wahoo are currently second in the season's point competition among hydro of unlimited size.

Leading the parade is Willard Rhodes' Miss Thriftway, the Gold Cup winner from Seattle and President's Cup defender Thriftway, with Bill Muncy at the controls, is the favorite to repeat in the annual Potomac classic.

## Cards, Braves Both Post Wins

### Yankees Boost Lead to 7 Games

Joe Cunningham's two-run 10th-inning home run carried St. Louis to a 7-5 victory over Cincinnati last night and kept the second place Cardinals within four games of Milwaukee in the National League race.

The Braves won their fourth straight, rapping the Chicago Cubs 9-3 as southpaw Warren Spahn became the first 30-game winner in the Majors this season.

The New York Yankees closed in on their third consecutive American League flag, defeating Boston 7-4 while Cleveland scored twice in the ninth and defeated Chicago's second place White Sox 3-2. The Yankees now lead by seven with seven to play and hold a magic number of "3." Any combination of two New York victories and Chicago defeats will clinch the pennant for New York.

Milwaukee's magic number is "5." Both the Braves and Cards have eight games remaining—including a three-game showdown at Milwaukee next week.

The Milwaukee victory eliminated Brooklyn's defending champion, who was beaten 3-2 by Philadelphia.

Baltimore defeated Washington 1-0 in the only other AL game played.

Larry Jackson, Morrie Martin and Billy Muffet blanked the Redlegs over the last seven innings with Muffet winning his second for the Cards. Cincinnati had shelled starter Wilmer Mizell with four in the second that overhauled a 2-0 St. Louis lead, then added another in the third for a 5-3 edge. The Cards tied it in the ninth on Walker Cooper's pinch single, then tagged relief pitcher Bill Kennedy for the clincher in Cunningham's ninth homer.

A five-run seventh cracked a 3-1 tie for the Braves, Spahn, gaining his eighth 20-victory season, was lifted in the seventh when the Cubs got their third hit and walk.

Rockie Don relieved, struck out two to retire the side and wound up with six strikeouts in his 2-1-3 innings. Bob Rush lost his 16th. Wes Covington homered for the Braves, who had 14 hits.

Yogi Berra slugged a three-run homer and Hank Bauer drove in a pair for the Yankees as Whitey Ford won his 11th. The little lefty, out a week with the flu, had a three-hit shutout tied the ninth, when pinch-hitter Ted Williams led off with a home run, his 35th and first at Yankee Stadium this year.
