

Queen, Prince Philip Chart Full Schedule for U.S. Visit

Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip on their Oct. 15 visit to the United States, will be far busier than the ordinary tourist.

Their detailed schedule was released today and it includes something for almost every minute.

There'll be military and diplomatic ceremonies, luncheons, receptions, dinners, a visit to an art

gallery, religious services, a football game in Maryland and a visit to the northern Virginia horse country.

These are just some of the things they are to take in before their visit ends with a flight back home from New York.

The visit of England's Queen and her prince will begin at the Jamestown Festival near

Williamsburg, Va., celebrating the 350th anniversary of the founding of the first permanent English colony in America.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 16 — Arrival at Patrick Henry Airport near Williamsburg, on a Royal Canadian Air Force plane; visit to Jamestown Island and the Jamestown Festival park; visit to the College of William and Mary at Williamsburg; reception in the garden of the Governor's Palace at Williamsburg.

THURSDAY, Oct. 17 — Flight to Washington aboard President Eisenhower's plane; luncheon at the White House with President and Mrs. Eisenhower; laying of wreaths by Queen Elizabeth at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier and at the Canadian Cross in Arlington National Cemetery; reception by the joint committee of press, radio and television correspondents and news photographers; formal dinner at the White House.

FRIDAY, Oct. 18 — A visit by the Queen to the National Academy of Arts; a visit by Prince Philip to the National Academy of Sciences; visit by the Queen to Children's Hospital; reception and luncheon by Vice President and Mrs. Nixon at the Capitol.

Reception by the Queen and prince of the heads of diplomatic missions in Washington at the British Embassy; visit to the Pan American Union, where Secretary of State and Mrs. Dulles will give a state dinner.

SATURDAY, Oct. 19 — Reception by the Queen and prince of various members of staffs of mission of the Commonwealth countries at the British Embassy; award of insignia to American citizens who have received honors from the Queen; visit by Prince Philip to the Marine Barracks; laying of foundation stone of the new British Embassy office building; football game at College Park, Md., between teams of the universities of North Carolina and Maryland; dinner at the embassy by the royal couple in honor of President and Mrs. Eisenhower.

SUNDAY, Oct. 20 — Religious services at the Washington (Episcopal) Cathedral and the National Presbyterian Church; visit to Middleburg, Va., in the Virginia horse country, expected to be of special interest since the Queen is an ardent horsewoman and the prince is a poloist of repute; Commonwealth dinner at the Australian Embassy.

MONDAY, Oct. 21 — Arrival by train at New York; luncheon by Mayor Robert Wagner; visits to the United Nations and Empire State buildings; dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel by the Pilgrims and the English Speaking Union; Commonwealth lunch at the Seventh Regiment Armory.

TUESDAY, Oct. 22 — Takeoff around 12:45 a.m. for London.

Floodwaters Tear Hole in Florida Dam, Block Road

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Sept. 30 — Floodwaters from the Ocklawaha River tore a gaping hole through the earthen part of a power dam today and swept across a state highway.

The highway patrol had sent word to the governor's office shortly before noon that two persons were reported killed but ear-

ly tonight Sheriff W. P. Joyce said no lives were lost.

Several persons, including two legislators driving to a special legislative session in Tallahassee, were trapped on State Highway 20 by the swirling waters which swept away their cars. They were rescued.

The legislators, Sen. Bart Knight of Blountstown and Rep. Ed Peters of Calhoun County, told stories of an anxious hour of watching a wall of water move toward them and of clinging to tree limbs and their car until help arrived.

Knight said his car was swept off the highway and he swam until he could grab the lower limbs of a big tree.

Before help arrived he said "my muscles soon started feeling like needles were stuck in them." Peters said he clung to the top of his car until rescued.

Five persons pulled from the flood scene were treated at a Quincy hospital for exposure.

The Florida Power Corp., dam created a lake of 6,700 acres about 23 miles southwest of Tallahassee near Hosford. State Highway 20 from Tallahassee to Panama City is about a half mile below the dam.

White Citizens Unit to Picket White House

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 — John Kasper, self-styled rabble-rouser and campaigner against classroom integration, said today the Seaboard White Citizens Council will picket the White House tomorrow.

Kasper, executive secretary of the council, said pickets will protest against use of federal troops to help enforce integration in Little Rock.

He said the marchers also will protest against tomorrow's meeting between President Eisenhower and four Southern governors. The governors will discuss with the President the problems of integration.

Kasper said in a statement the White Citizens Council, other unnamed organizations and individuals will begin marching along Pennsylvania Avenue in front of the White House at noon tomorrow.

Meeting With Ike

The governors conference proposed only that the committee talk about measures to get troops out of Little Rock. Eisenhower in agreeing to the meeting broadened the subject matter.

Kasper said the four Southern governors will meet with Eisenhower "have long ago committed themselves to the same race war against their own white people," as Eisenhower and the Supreme Court are spawning on a national basis.

Greatest of All Time

He said the meeting should bring together Eisenhower and Griffin, or the President and Gov. Orval Faubus of Arkansas, whom Kasper described as "the greatest rights leader of all time."

Kasper was freed from a Nashville, Tenn., jail two weeks ago on \$2,500 bond after being indicted on a charge of inciting to riot. He had made speeches in Nashville protesting against a federal court order directing integration of first grade classes there.

The Seaboard White Citizens Council has several thousand members in the District of Columbia, Maryland, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, Florida and Alabama, Kasper said. He declined to give an exact figure.

Army Missile 'Successes' Said Untrue

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 — The Air Force Assn. said today that reports of Air Force ballistic missile launching successes in Florida are a "mish-mash of half-truths, outright fabrications and deliberately misleading implications."

The civilian organization of Air Force supporters said in an article in its magazine Air Force that Army-inspired criticism forced Secretary of Defense Wilson to back off from an earlier decision approving the Air Force Thor intermediate-range ballistic missile — IRBM — over the Army-developed Jupiter.

Wilson instead appointed the heads of the ballistic missile programs of the two competing services — Air Force Maj. Gen. Bernard A. Schriever and Army Maj. Gen. J. B. Medaris — to work with W. M. Holaday, assistant secretary of defense, on a committee to make the IRBM selection.

The magazine said that in order to soothe the ruffled feelings Wilson may—regardless of the committee's recommendation—announce a "merger" of the two missiles.

"From a technical point of view a true merger is a virtual impossibility," the magazine said.

Regardless of how the announced decision may be phrased, the nation's IRBM will be the Thor or something closely resembling it, at least by the time it reaches operational units in operational quantities.

Air Force magazine added that Wilson bypassed a competent and objective group, the Scientific Advisory Committee, set up to advise on just such matters.

Ike Labels UF Stockpile Of Services

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 30 — President Eisenhower marked the opening of the United Community campaigns Sunday by declaring they stockpiled services to strengthen and protect life in time of emergency.

In a statement, recorded on film and tape, the President said: "Your community, as all others, has set its goal. All together, these goals add up to 400 million dollars."

"That money will be our stockpile to help bring health and healing to the sick-to help troubled families to offer new hope to the crippled and handicapped. It will give guidance to youth—comfort the aged—and help hold high the spiritual level of every community."

The campaigns are being waged throughout the United States and Canada.

Anti-Commies Seek Regime In Tiny Nation

SAN MARINO, Tuesday, Oct. 1 — Informed sources said anti-Communist members of Parliament either have or probably will set up their own government today in opposition to this tiny republic's long-entrenched Red regime.

The Italian news agency ANSA said the new government was established just after midnight. The anti-Communist leaders declined to confirm it. They said they had no announcement to make. But informed sources here expected later in the day.

ANSA said the opposition parties have named their own executive, saying they were the legitimate government of San Marino with both ordinary and extraordinary powers.

Defections from the Communists gave the anti-Red bloc a majority in the 60-member Grand Council—Parliament—Sept. 19 for the first time since World War II.

The Council was scheduled to name new captains regent on that day, but the Communists dissolved the body to prevent it from voting. The Reds called an election for a new Council Nov. 3 and said the Red regime would remain in power until then.

Visitors to See Parade

PEIPING, Sept. 30 — American youths visiting Red China will watch the Communist National Day parade here tomorrow from a day reserved for special delegations. The capital is already heavily decorated for the celebration.

Spy Fugitives From U.S. in Soviet Union

MOSCOW, Sept. 30 — Alfred K. Stern and his wife, Martha Dodd Stern, fugitives from American charges of espionage, registered as weekend visitors at a Soviet museum.

The two had last been reported in Prague, Czechoslovakia. The wealthy American couple flew to Europe from Mexico with their son Robert in July after ignoring a subpoena to testify before the New York federal grand jury that later indicted five persons on spy charges.

Travelers from Moscow noted the Sterns' names in the guest book at the Yasnaya Polyana Museum, 75 miles south of Moscow. The museum is the former home of novelist Leo Tolstoy.

First Indications

The registrations were the first indication the Sterns had reached the Soviet Union.

Stern is a former investment broker. Mrs. Stern is the daughter of the late William E. Dodd, who was U.S. ambassador to Germany, 1933-38.

The Sterns were each fined \$25,000 in absentia in New York May 1 for contempt in refusing to answer the summons to testify before the grand jury. It later indicted Jack and Myra Sobel, Mr. and Mrs. George Slatovskii and Jacob Albam on charges of spying for Russia. However, a federal official said in mid-August the Sterns had liquidated their assets and the government had been unable to uncover any of their possessions to levy against.

Albam and Mrs. Sobel were sentenced to 5½-year prison terms. Jack Sobel is awaiting sentence. The Zlatovskis are in Paris. Mrs. Stern is reported to be a friend of Mrs. Zlatovskii.

Names Mrs. Stern

The U.S. House Committee on Un-American Activities announced Aug. 17 Boris Morros, counterspy for the FBI, had named Mrs. Stern as a Soviet spy who once tried to betray him to the Russians.

In Prague, the Sterns described themselves as victims of "a well-planned campaign of vilification and slander."

The Sterns were indicted in New York Sept. 9 for espionage. The federal grand jury charged the two invested \$130,000 in a music publishing business as a front to cover their activities on behalf of the Russians and used their residence, Conn., estate for furtive meetings with Soviet agents.

Dollar Notes To Carry Inscription

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 — One-dollar notes carrying the inscription "In God We Trust" will be issued at most banks starting tomorrow.

The Treasury, announcing this today, recalled that Congress in 1955 authorized addition of the wording, which has appeared on coins since 1864.

The new silver certificates also will bear the signature of Robert B. Anderson, who succeeded George M. Humphrey as secretary of the Treasury several weeks ago.

The changes were made simultaneously with a revision of printing methods at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing.

Soldiers Drilling in Streets of Damascus

DAMASCUS, Syria, Sept. 30 — Soldiers drill in the streets of old Damascus. One can hear the hoarse orders of officers, the slap of the soldiers' hands upon their rifles, the stamp of their feet as they go through the manual of arms. Their faces are deadly serious.

In another section one can see Futuwa youth organization recruits learning the rudiments of street fighting and the use of arms.

Elsewhere in Syria men and women alike are undergoing training for guerrilla war. Their "Popular Resistance Organization" is called Muqawamah Al Shaabiyyah. All this typifies the state of mind of the leadership of this

country—though not necessarily of the people. More than anything else, it reflects deep fear of Israel. When the chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Afif Bizry, speaks of defending Syria's sovereignty to the last drop of blood he is inadvertently disclosing his respect for Israel's capabilities.

Expects Invasion

When strong man Lt. Col. Abdul Hamid Serraj says Syria is ready to fight from street to street, house to house, he reveals what is uppermost in many Syrian minds. Syria seems to expect some day to be overrun by an invader.

There is little real popular enthusiasm for the military life. Syrian teen-age boys are unaccustomed to discipline. The Futuwa draws recruits not from street ruffians but from the wealthier classes. Its members all are students. They get para-military training, but probably 85 per cent of them do not like it.

Members of the popular resistance organization all are volunteers, but again there is little enthusiasm. The idea is borrowed from the Egyptians.

The army itself is far from ready to threaten anybody. The quantities of arms and equipment it has received from the Russians have not reached the stage where it might attack Israel.

50,000 in Army

The army totaled only 5,000 men at the time of the Israeli war, and has reached about 50,000 now. Much prewar equipment still is in evidence, and it will be a long time before replacement is complete.

The soldiers who look over the army's leadership are determined to use any means and take any political risks to give Syria self-respect, as they view it.

These men were newly graduated when the Israeli war began. They fought in that war. They saw their badly equipped, poorly trained army soundly whipped. Then they saw Syria undergo one political coup after another, with little hope of stability. They developed an abiding fear of Israel's potentialities and possible intentions.

Air Fare Penalty Strikes at Home

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 — Two weeks ago the scheduled airlines put into effect a \$3 penalty for passengers who buy tickets and then fail to show up or cancel their reservations.

Today it became known that one of the first persons assessed that penalty was Stuart G. Tipton, president of the Air Transport Assn., the trade association through which the carriers acted.

Tipton reportedly was delayed on a flight from Alaska and failed to use—or to cancel—space he had reserved on a plane from Seattle to Chicago.

More Federal Judges Needed

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 30 — Chief Justice Earl Warren of the U. S. Supreme Court told the 2nd Circuit Judicial Conference here Sunday the federal court system needs 45 new judges.

Addressing the conference of some 150 judges, lawyers and invited guests, the chief justice said: "We have not been able to get Congress to appreciate the problem."

Warren said 10 of the 45 judges needed should be assigned to the 2nd District, which comprises Connecticut, New York and Vermont.

Gov. Abraham A. Ribicoff attended today's opening ceremonies to extend the greetings of the state.

COEXISTENCE Debate Urged By U.N. Unit

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Sept. 30 — The U.N. Steering Committee today recommended a General Assembly debate on the question of peaceful coexistence and non-interference in the affairs of other countries.

The debate, while proposed by the Soviet Union, appeared certain to open up a general discussion of the Middle East crisis and the shipment of Soviet arms to Syria.

In the preliminary discussion, a sharp East-West clash developed in which the problems of Hungary, Algeria, the Suez and the Middle East were raised.

The United States went along with the majority of 11 in favor of placing the coexistence item on the Assembly's agenda. Nationalist China, however, voted against it and Britain, France and Paraguay abstained.

The U.S. position was that the question is, in effect, already on the agenda. Chief U.S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge said he hoped the discussion would help the Soviet Union to realize what the term peaceful coexistence means.

"We think," Lodge declared, "that living in peace with your neighbors means that you don't gobble them up—as was done in the case of Hungary."

Poles Raise Butter Prices, Fight Imports

WARSAW, Poland, Sept. 30 — Butter prices went up more than 25 per cent in Poland Sunday and the prices of animal fats and margarine went down. Trade Minister Mieczyslaw Lesz said the move was intended to cut off butter imports that cost 12 million dollars this year.

"We can't afford it," he said. Lesz apparently was putting into effect a policy laid down by Communist party leader Wladyslaw Gornulka in a speech to Polish peasants Sept. 8. Warning that new belt-tightening is on the way, Gornulka said Poles must stop eating butter and switch to lard and other substitutes. He said Poland could not afford to import butter, especially since Poland had large quantities of substitutes.

Under the new government decree the cheapest butter now will cost 29 zloty a pound, against 23 previously. The average industrial wage is 64 zloty a day.

The Finance Ministry announced a devaluation of the zloty in February from four to the dollar to 24. The true value is around 80 to the dollar.

Cheese prices went up 10 to 30 per cent. Margarine dropped from 13 zloty a pound to 11 and lard from 16 zloty to 13.

In the past year average wages have been hiked 20 per cent to placate industrial discontent. Since consumer goods are in short supply much of the increase has gone on food and drink.

The Poles seem to use a lot of butter and prefer to cook with it when they can.

Rice Growing Promoted

VERCELLI, Italy, Sept. 30 — Experts from a score of nations wound up Saturday a six-day meeting to seek means of increasing the world's rice production. One recommendation: That the Food and Agriculture Organization distribute the best selected seeds from the Americas and Europe to Eastern countries and vice versa to promote wider diffusion of proved hybrid varieties.

Atlas Suggested As Stimulant to Basin Industry

PORTLAND, Sept. 30 — Publication of an atlas of the Columbia Basin, to stimulate interest in the region's resources and as aid in developing industry, has been recommended to the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee.

A group headed by W. E. Bullard of the U.S. Forest Service suggested that the atlas be published by the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee.

The proposed atlas would cover all of Washington, all of Oregon except the Klamath River drainage, all of Idaho except the Great Salt Lake drainage, and parts of Wyoming, Utah and Nevada.

Bullard's group, set up by the committee, recommended that the atlas proposal at its next meeting, and then set up another committee to seek outside financial backing.

Muzzle Loader Found

WHITE RIVER, Ont., Sept. 30 — A flintlock muzzle-loading gun, uncovered by the fall of a lake shore tree is being placed in the Fort William Museum. Historian J. P. Bertrand estimates the gun is at least 300 years old.
