

U.S. High Court Opens Monday, Faces Race, Communist Issues

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—The Supreme Court opens a new term Monday to face sharply contested racial issues involving racial segregation and Communist activities.

The tribunal's nine justices head into the new term seeming undisturbed by widespread criticisms of some of their recent decisions and silently aloof to personal attacks.

The court's docket indicates there could be more critical attacks in the coming nine-month term. Some of the cases awaiting action have a combined feature

of great public interest and bitter controversy.

For instance, Virginia—with a state policy of "massive resistance" to school integration—has pending an appeal seeking to uphold its pupil placement act.

This law puts student assignment powers in the hands of a three-member state board. It was ruled unconstitutional by U. S. District Judge Walter F. Hoffman of Norfolk in cases specifically affecting Norfolk and Newport News. After the U. S. Circuit

Court in Richmond upheld Hoffman, school officials of the two cities and the state joined in appealing to the high tribunal.

The appeal said the case gave the Supreme Court an opportunity to lead a large section of our country out of the chaos into which the Brown decision has plunged it.

The Brown decision was the high court's ruling against compulsory school segregation.

Other appeals involving racial questions, on which the high court was asked to grant hearings, include one by segregationist John Kasper. He appealed from a one-year sentence for contempt, growing out of integration disorders at Clinton, Tenn., in August, 1956.

Virgil Hawkins, Negro who has been trying for almost eight years to be admitted to the University of Florida Law School, wants the court to hear his case and order immediate admission. The Florida Supreme Court said Hawkins would not cause "great public mischief."

Dulles, Russ Hold 'Helpful' Talk on Issues

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko announced after a long conference today that they had held "helpful" talks on major East-West issues including the Middle East and disarmament.

Dulles, it was further reported, brought up to Gromyko what he called the need for reunification of Germany but the Russian minister declined to talk about that problem on the ground that it was not a proper subject for him to discuss.

A communique jointly agreed on by Dulles and Gromyko at their unprecedented 3-hour, 45-minute conference in the study of Dulles' home said that four major topics were discussed. They were listed as the Middle East, disarmament, the situation in Europe, and U. S.-Soviet contacts.

Gromyko on emerging from Dulles' house and after a friendly farewell handshake from the secretary of state said that he thought the conversation "was useful" in clarifying the relative positions of the Washington and Moscow governments on the problems discussed.

The joint statement issued by Asst. Secretary of State Andrew Berling said: "Secretary of State Dulles and Foreign Minister Gromyko met for approximately four hours and dealt with a number of major topics."

Apartment Traded by Salem Man

Ralph S. Fussell of Salem said Saturday he has traded Riviera Apartments, 2993 River Rd. NE, for 320 acres in the Ft. Rock area 88 miles southeast of Bend.

Assuming ownership of the 10-unit court apartment is Glen Cox of Albany. Fussell said he did not know whether Cox plans to operate the court himself.

Fussell, 1516 Madison St. NE, said he will remain in Salem where he is employed as cabinetmaker for the State Highway Dept. He said he plans to lease the Ft. Rock land, where well irrigation is newly available in an area producing alfalfa, rye and barley.

Death Claims T. E. Foltz

Thomas Emery Foltz, 53, of 1190 B St. NE, died Saturday at a Salem hospital.

Foltz was born in Superior, Colo., on Aug. 8, 1904, and lived most of his life in Grand Junction, Colo. He moved to Salem in 1952 and was employed by McKinney Lincoln-Mercury as custodian.

In Salem, he was a member of the Presbyterian Church and Fraternal Order of Eagles.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Ruby Foltz, and a daughter, Mrs. Billie Francisco, both of Salem; brother, W. E. Foltz, Monterey, Calif.; sister, Mrs. Ruby Roberts, Denver.

Services will be Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. in Virgil T. Golden chapel. Interment will be at Belcrest Memorial Park.

Burglary Attempted

Ethel E. Johnson told city police Saturday that another broken window pane had been discovered after police had previously investigated an attempt to burglarize her home at 1110 Winter St. NE, Friday.

Ike May Free Racial Data

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—A spokesman said today the administration is considering whether to make public certain information that played a part in President Eisenhower's decision to send federal troops into Little Rock, Ark.

White House press secretary James C. Hagerty told newsmen the Justice Department is studying the question of releasing the information from its files on the school integration dispute in the Arkansas city.

Hagerty said the data was given to Eisenhower before he decided to use federal troops to enforce court orders requiring integration of Little Rock's Central High School. (Story also on page 23.)

Paper Declares London Trip Eyed By Eisenhowers

LONDON, Sunday, Oct. 6 (AP)—The Empire News said today plans are being discussed for a state visit to London by President and Mrs. Eisenhower.

The independent Sunday newspaper reported Queen Elizabeth II will issue the formal invitation in Washington.

Her tour of the United States begins Oct. 16.

The article said American officials have been to London and Balmoral Castle in Scotland, where the Queen has been on holiday, to discuss her trip to America and a return visit of the Eisenhowers.

It did not speculate when the visit would take place, but said the Eisenhower probably would stay at either Buckingham Palace or Windsor Castle.

Alcorn Says Oregon Demos Hunt Headlines

COOS BAY, Ore., Oct. 5 (AP)—The Republican national chairman tonight called Oregon's senators "Notorious headline hunters" and again criticized Democratic handling of the civil rights bill in the Senate.

GOP Chairman Meade Alcorn in a speech prepared for delivery here asserted Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) and five other "so-called liberals" tried to "bury the House-approved civil rights bill in the Senate Judiciary Committee" headed by Eastland of Mississippi.

He said the other five were Sens. Kennedy (D-Mass.), Magnuson (D-Wash.), Mansfield (D-Mont.), Murray (D-Mont.) and O'Mahoney (D-Wyo.). Alcorn spoke at a state Young Republican convention.

So-Called Liberals
"The payoff for this sell-out came next day when the six so-called liberals won support for the Helms Canyon bill from more than a dozen anticivil rights Democrats, five of whom, including Eastland, had voted against the project before," Alcorn said.

"I question both the forthrightness and the sincerity of any self-professed champion of civil rights who would coldly toss aside the great moral principle involved here for a dam that most Americans think we don't need anyway," he said.

The GOP party chairman said Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) and Morse "appear to be as hopelessly divided and in as sharp conflict as their party is nationally." Their bickering and public quarreling serve only to emphasize that no state can afford the luxury of two notorious headline hunters in the Senate at the same time."

Not Reached
The senators were not reached at once for comment. In the past, however, Morse has asserted there was no vote-trading on civil rights and Helms Canyon bills.

Both Morse and Neuberger have denied their sometimes-opposing votes on issues means any personal split or bickering between them.

Power Official Dies
NEW YORK, Oct. 5 (AP)—Eugene A. Yates, 76, board chairman of the Southern Co. and leading private-power executive whose name became prominent during the Dixon-Yates controversy, died at his home here tonight.

Surgeons Separate Twin Girls

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 5 (AP)—A 16-man operating team today "successfully separated" Siamese twin girls. The children's chances for survival were reported good although one child's heart stopped during the two and a half-hour operation.

The infants, born eight days ago in Mercy Hospital, Long Island, New York, were brought to Children's Hospital here Thursday to determine their chances for survival.

The girls, Pamela and Patricia Schatz, together weighed 13 pounds, 7 ounces before today's operation by a team headed by Dr. Everett Koop.

They were virtually normal in all respects, except for being joined at the pelvis. Each had a full complement of vital organs operating independently of the other.

A team of four medical doctors, two surgeons and two plastic surgeons performed the operation. The smaller of the two girls, Patricia, had a congenital heart lesion—blue baby—and was the weaker of the two. She was anesthetized first. When the separation was completed it was noticed that Patricia's heart had stopped. Dr. Koop made a quick 6-inch incision and massaged the heart until it beat.

Both children were placed in incubators.

Women, Girls Fend Attacks

Separate attempts to assault a pair of 13-year-old girls and two women were repulsed near midnight Friday in the area of State and Winter streets, city police report.

The women said that a stocky built man approached them in the 300 block of Winter Street, struck one of them in the stomach and threw the other to the ground before the screams landed him off. One woman struck the man repeatedly with an umbrella, she told officers.

The teen-age girls reported a similar experience in the 1000 block of State Street by a short, dark man. He crept from between two parked cars, the girls said, and threw one of them to the ground but fled through Wilson Park when the teen-agers screamed, they told police.

Failure Forecast For Guy Mollet's Cabinet Attempt

PARIS, Oct. 5 (AP)—Failure for Socialist Guy Mollet in any attempt to form a new French government seemed virtually assured tonight when the Independents announced they would never vote him full economic powers.

Mollet had indicated he would ask Parliament for special powers to fight inflation if he becomes premier of the country's 24th post-war Cabinet. He needed the Independents' votes for his investiture.

Boy Survives 150-Foot Fall In Mine Shaft

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Oct. 5 (AP)—A 10-year-old boy fell 150 feet down a narrow drilling shaft today and was pulled out alive with a rope an hour later.

Richard Nasuti Jr., son of a retired coal miner, was reported conscious but in serious condition at Locust Mountain State Hospital. He suffered shock, severe bruises and brush burns over much of his body and undetermined ankle injuries.

The boy fell to the bottom of the foot-wide shaft in an upright position after attempting to jump the hole while cavorting with two companions.

Quake, Storm Fatal to 11

TUNIS, Oct. 5 (AP)—A quake and windstorm hit the Kerkennah Islands in succession today and official sources reported 11 persons were killed in the village of Kraten.

Officials said 130 of the villagers were injured in the quake, which struck shortly after midnight. The storm that followed destroyed 130 homes.

Doctors and medical supplies were rushed to the area.

The Kerkennahs, a group of seven islands with a population of 15,500, lie in the Gulf of Gabes 20 miles off the east Tunisian coast. They belong to Tunisia.

On the mainland, eight persons died in central and southern Tunisia when heavy rains collapsed their homes.
