WASHINGTON, Oct. 6 (AP)—Little Rock may have blasted Democratic congressional leaders' hopes that Congress could get through the 1958 election-year session without a fight over civil rights.

Man Charged In Attack on Wife's Mother

PETERSBURG, Va., Oct. 6 (AP)—A 23-year-old Petersburg man was charged today with attempted rape and felonious assault with intent to kill his 45-year-old mother-in-law.

Police said the accused, Earl H. Ezell Jr., was released tonight on \$5,000 bond for his appearance in Police Court here, probably Wednesday. They said he attacked the woman, Mrs. Helen Funk, and inflicted severe knife wounds.

Ezell, police said, made his assault after going to Mrs. Funk's home early today and asking her to come to the aid of a sick person.

She was attacked after Ezell stopped her car in a dimly lit residential section of the city.

Residents heard the woman's screams and called police. The officers said the woman kept repeating, "Don't let him at me; he's going to kill me," after their arrival.

Mrs. Funk was stabbed in the left side of the face, chest and hip. She also suffered severe bruises on the legs and arms. She was hospitalized at Petersburg General Hospital.

Police found a pocket knife, its four-inch blade open, on the front seat of Ezell's car.

Mexican Storm Takes 2 Lives

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 6 (AP)—A three-day tropical storm caused two deaths and considerable damage along the northwest coast of Mexico during the weekend.

A dispatch from Guaymas said the two deaths occurred when a house collapsed at the town of Empalme. Serious damage was reported to the cotton crop in Sonora and a similar report came from La Paz, Lower California.

A bridge five miles south of Empalme was washed away and hundreds of cars were reported bottled up on the main tourist coastal highway.

Gonzaga U. Adds Leader

SPOKANE, Oct. 6 (AP)—The Very Rev. Edmund W. Morton, 41, was inaugurated Sunday as the 20th president of Gonzaga university at a ceremony in Spokane's Coliseum.

The event attracted a large number of dignitaries, including the presidents of nine colleges and universities and Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.).

Father Morton succeeded the Rev. Francis E. Corkery, who has been assigned temporarily as acting provincial for the Oregon Province of the Society of Jesus.

The new president came to Gonzaga after spending four years at Mount St. Michael's, northeast of Spokane.

Young GOP Hits Oregon's Stand On Civil Rights

COOS BAY, Oct. 6 (AP)—Oregon Young Republicans at their final convention session in Coos Bay yesterday said Oregon should clean its own house in the matter of civil rights before criticizing other states.

The organization criticized Oregon for what the resolution described as racial discrimination in housing.

Touching on tax matters, the Young Republicans also passed a resolution urging that the forthcoming special session of the Legislature provide higher personal income tax exemptions as one method of cutting down on the expected state tax income surplus.

Eisenhowers Kept Inside by Cold At Gettysburg

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Oct. 6 (AP)—Cold, murky weather kept President and Mrs. Eisenhower indoors today.

A chill rain fell until midmorning and the temperature at that point was in the mid-40s. It warmed up about five degrees during the afternoon but the skies stayed leaden.

The President plans to return to Washington sometime tomorrow, apparently after another round of golf at the Gettysburg Country Club if the weather improves. He has no scheduled engagements at the White House tomorrow.

rights advocates in both parties to point to with pride and yet containing substantial concessions to Southern objections — it appeared the Democratic chiefs were entitled to a long breath of relief.

But the integration crisis at Little Rock has inspired a new round of proposals to put more teeth into the civil rights law of 1957 and to deal with the possible use of troops in civil rights crises.

Within the past week, Rep. Keating of New York, senior Republican member of the House Judiciary Committee, said he is studying the possibility of restoring to the civil rights law some of the broad powers originally proposed for the attorney general. In the version finally adopted, the special injunction-seeking authority of the attorney general was restricted to voting rights cases.

Keating also said he will introduce a bill to prohibit use of the National Guard by a governor to resist enforcement of a federal court order.

School Bus Crash Claims 5th Fatality

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6 (AP)—Meldon Smith, driver of a school bus which crashed from a hilly street into a stream bed last Monday, today became the accident's fifth fatality.

He died at General Hospital of multiple injuries.

Police said Smith, 53, of San Gabriel, was never able to tell what happened. Authorities had hoped he would be able to testify at an inquest next Monday into cause of the accident.

Three school children died the day of the accident, a fourth a day later. Two dozen other children were injured. One is still in critical condition.

Crash Hurts Albany Man

ALBANY, Ore., Oct. 6 (AP)—An Albany man was injured in an auto collision with a taxi one mile north of here tonight on Highway 99E, state police said.

A passenger in the cab, Oran Ross McGar, was taken to an Albany hospital for over-night observation, police said.

The Albany cab driven by Hugh Kizer was in a collision with a car driven by Frank Lloyd Rodgers, Glendale, police added.

GREENVILLE, S.C., Oct. 6 (AP)—The first Globemaster of the 63rd Troop Carrier Wing touched down in the ice at McMurdo Sound in Antarctica last Thursday, opening Phase 3 of Operation Deep Freeze.

19 Italian Policemen Join San Marino Anti-Commies

SAN MARINO, Oct. 6 (AP)—Nineteen Italian policemen removed Italian insignia from their uniforms today and joined the forces of San Marino's provisional anti-Communist government.

They were assigned to help the opposition regime's 100 civilian-garbed volunteers defend the anti-Red headquarters in a steel mill

at the edge of this 38-square-mile nation.

The old Communist government, in power 14 years, remained in control of most of the independent republic, which is completely surrounded by Italian territory. The Reds have about 200 civilian militiamen armed with submachine guns and rifles. The regular 180-man San Marino police force has been neutral in the tug-of-war since the anti-Communist group proclaimed Tuesday that it was the republic's legitimate government.

Italian Reds Rally

A thousand Italian Communists rallied this morning in the Italian resort town of Rimini, 15 miles away from San Marino, in support of the San Marino Reds. They carried Italy's Christian Democratic government for supporting the new provisional San Marino regime.

Alvaro Casali, minister of defense of the new "white" government, said the 19 policemen quit their jobs in the Italian carabinieri and received special authorization from the Italian government to be sworn in the service of a foreign nation.

"Since we cannot count on the present San Marino police force, which is formed mostly by the Communists, we have to prepare a new force," Casali said.

Blockade Continues

Italian police continued their blockade of the roads leading to San Marino. Italy recognized the provisional government immediately after it was formed, and the United States recognized it later.

The anti-Communists had attained a majority in San Marino for the first time since World War II because of defections from the Communists and their Socialist allies. The Communists then dissolved the Parliament and said they would remain in power until elections Nov. 3.

The anti-Communist proclaimed themselves the legitimate government of San Marino's 13,000 residents after the regular six-month terms of Communist chief ministers expired at Monday at midnight.

Prison Staff Jailed

KAMPALA, Uganda, Oct. 6 (AP)—The whole staff at Jinja prison has been jailed.

All the 74 warders and 5 wardresses went on strike, claiming their privileges had been withdrawn, and were sentenced for refusing to obey a lawful order to get back to work.

They were welcomed inside by cheers from the regular convicts while cops took charge outside.

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Choir Girl, Boy Found Shot to Death

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 6 (AP)—An 18-year-old choir girl and an 18-year-old boy with whom she went to church on Sundays were found shot to death in her home late last night.

Doris Posey had been shot in the back, Jerry Wylie in the left temple. A .22-caliber rifle was near the bodies.

"I just can't believe Jerry would do it," said Doris' mother, Mrs. Eunice Posey of suburban Reseda. "They went to school and church together. But they never dated much. He was more like a brother to her than anything else."

But Detective George Stoner said: "We believe she had been refusing his advances so he got a gun and killed her."

The bodies were found by Doris' brother, Jerry, 13.

Soviets Say Yanks Molest Red Warships

MOSCOW, Oct. 6 (AP)—Soviet fleet complained today that American "snoopers" again are molesting Soviet warships—this time the cruiser Kuibyshev, carrying Defense Minister Georgi K. Zhukov on a visit to Yugoslavia.

The paper, organ of the Soviet navy, said that while the Kuibyshev was in Turkish waters of the Sea of Marmara yesterday she was surrounded by cutters filled with "curious people" carrying cameras.

One of these small boats, which Soviet Fleet said carried no identifying marks, had "a man in an American military uniform at the rudder." He took pictures, the paper added, and said another vessel came out later flying an American flag and repeated the performance.

Zhukov is due in Yugoslavia Tuesday.

Soldier Hurt In Car Crash

SCOTTS MILLS, Oct. 6 (AP)—A Ft. Lewis soldier visiting Scotts Mills was injured and his car wrecked in an accident tonight on Crooked Finger Road about four miles southeast of here.

The soldier, Pfc Jack Robison, was taken by passersby to Silverton Hospital, where his injuries were said to be deep but not serious cuts on the head and arm. Marion County Deputy Sheriff James R. Warren of Salem said.

The Robison car was almost totally wrecked as it hit some boulders and a fence post and then crashed into a phone pole, Warren said. The accident occurred about 7:15 p.m. as the car apparently skidded on a curve, he said.

Stereotypers Get 35-Hour Week, Raise

PORTLAND, Oct. 6 (AP)—Stereotypers at Portland's two daily newspapers have a new contract which calls for higher wages and shorter working hours.

The announcement of the contract was made yesterday by the union, the Oregon Journal and The Oregonian. The new contract was agreed upon last week after the union had authorized a strike.

The contract, which runs two years, calls for a \$121.50 a week pay scale for the day shift, and \$126.50 for night work. The scale under the old contract was \$119.50 for both shifts.

Next fall each shift will receive another \$5 a week boost.

By next fall both shifts will work a 35-hour week. Under the old pact, the day shift had a 37½-hour week.

Driver Cited in Chain Collision

LEBANON, Oct. 6—Three cars collided in rear-end collisions about 10 p.m. tonight on Highway 20 three miles east of here, Albany state police reported.

Cars driven by Doris Roberts, 24, Eugene; Presley, 36, and Robert Paquette, 22, all from Lebanon, collided when the first car stopped to make a left turn, police said.

The third car in the chain failed to stop in time in the three-car pile up and state police said they cited Paquette with following too closely.

Girl Scout Hanged in Rope Practice

ALBANY, N.Y., Oct. 6 (AP)—A 12-year-old Girl Scout who had been practicing tying knots with a rope today was found hanged in the bedroom of her home at nearby Guilderland.

State police and a coroner said the death of Caroline Ulsamer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Ulsamer, appeared to be accidental. Ulsamer is an assistant state attorney general.

State police said Mrs. Ulsamer found a rope looped around Caroline's neck, with one end caught on a door hinge.

Troopers said the girl was fond of horses and apparently had made an improvised stirrup. They theorized that the knotted end of the rope became wedged in the hinge and that the girl slipped while using the stirrup loop to practice mounting. The loop apparently fell over her head and around her neck, police said.

Salem Family Escapes Injury In Auto Collision

ALBANY, Ore., Oct. 6—A Salem family escaped injury in a two-car collision this afternoon on Highway 20 in Albany.
