Searchers Reach Air Crash Fatal To Realtor's Son

Ground searchers Saturday reached the wreckage of an Army plane in which Col. Emery E. Hyde of Eugene, son of state Real Estate Commissioner Clarence F. Hyde, and three other officers crashed Oct. 2. The four officers were dead, as reported Friday by air searchers.

One body, believed to be that of Col. David M. Perkins of Wichita Falls, Tex., was found with a two-day beard growth 200 yards from the plane, Associated Press reported. The three were found in the plane, two badly charred and one reduced to a skeleton, AP said.

Principals Plan Meet In Salem

About 250 principals of junior and senior high schools throughout the state are expected at the annual fall conference of Oregon Association of Secondary School Principals Monday and Tuesday in Hotel Marion.

Willard Bear, state secondary education supervisor, said Saturday.

Theme of the conference will be "Bridging the Gap from High School to College."

Dr. Ellsworth Thompson of Washington, D. C., assistant secretary of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, will speak on that subject at the opening 9 a.m. session Monday.

And a panel of two college instructors and two high school principals will discuss the question, "Is the High School Adequately Serving the College-Bound Student?" at 10:45.

Panel members will be Dr. Dorothy Johansen, Reed College associate history professor; Dr. William Burton of Corvallis, Harvard University professor emeritus; Dale Parnell, Springfield High School principal; Ivan Parker, Wy-East High School principal; Clifford Skinner, Washington High School principal, will be moderator.

The conference will break up into discussion groups and the panel will re-assemble in mid-afternoon for questions raised by the groups, Bear said.

The morning session at which Dr. Thompson is slated to speak will be opened with greetings by Gov. Robert D. Holmes and Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction.

Ends at Noon
A panel on "How Can a High School PTA Serve Your School?" is scheduled for Tuesday morning and the conference is to end at noon.

C. H. Simpson of Athena, association president, will preside at the Monday meetings. Principal Robert Dow of Parrish Junior High School, association vice president, is to preside at the Tuesday sessions.

The 370-foot long Wasco Dam will be on Clear Creek some 35 miles west of Maupin. It will be part of the Wapinitia Project.

The bureau said it also plans to call bids later this year on the relocation of Hill Cemetery near Ashland. It will be moved from the Emigrant Reservoir portion of the Rogue River Basin Project.

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6-Month State Road Mishaps Total 30,404

Oregon chalked up 30,404 accidents in the first six months of 1957 and the toll was 7,863 persons injured, and 200 killed.

Salem in the same January to June period reported 1,075 accidents, which injured 223 and killed two persons, according to the State Department of Motor Vehicles.

Of those accidents in Salem, almost 500 happened between the hours of 2 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Slightly more than 25 per cent of the 200 killed in Oregon were attributed to one type of accident—that in which a vehicle "ran off a roadway."

More Than Double
The 1957 deaths attributed to this type of accident were more than double those in similar accidents for the same period a year ago.

Officials said running off the roadway generally is caused by a driver losing control of car due to excessive speed, or falling asleep at the wheel. Momentary distractions also were figured as a cause.

In comparison, Eugene, a city of similar size, had 104 less accidents and 42 less injuries. It did not have any fatalities in the January-June season, compared to Salem's two.

Friday replaced Saturday as the highest accident day in most major cities in Oregon. Saturday, however, remained the top day for accidents in Oregon's rural areas.

Over half of Salem's 1,000 accidents occurred on city streets—resulting in a lesser number of serious accidents probably because of reduced city speeds.

In Rural Locations
This conclusion is based primarily on the fact that three-fourths of the fatal accidents occurred in rural locations. Officials said this does not vary much from year to year.

All but 96 of Salem's 1,075 accidents involved collision with another vehicle, injuring 174 persons. Pedestrian injuries amounted to 30; 23 accidents were due to fixed objects, 19 "ran off roadway," 16 were train accidents; five were bicycle type, three involved animals; one overturned in roadway and one other was non-collision.

French Report 61 Rebels Slain

ALGIERS, Oct. 12 (AP)—French officials said 61 rebels were killed and nine captured today in a battle near Batna, in eastern Algeria. The battle started after an observation plane spotted a sizeable rebel band camped near the city. French forces encircled the band and wiped it out. The French said some seven tons of military equipment, including ammunition stores, were seized.

French losses were not announced.

A French report, excluding that action, said 600 rebels had been killed in operations since Sept. 10.
