

# Conversion Miss Gives Oregon Bowl Lead

The Oregon victory scuttled Washington State's dreams of immediately forging ahead in what would be WSC's first Rose Bowl bid since 1951, although it left the Cougars still in the running. Oregon meets the two other PCC teams eligible for the bowl—California and Stanford—the next two Saturdays.

While the Ducks and Cougars were battling it out, California was blanking the winless USC Trojans 12-0 at Berkeley and at Seattle. Stanford was blanking Washington its fourth straight defeat, 21-14.

But the big surprise of the week-end games came at the Los Angeles Coliseum, where Oregon State, an eight-point favorite, took a one-side wallop from UCLA, 26-7.

The defending PCC champions kicked off to UCLA to open the game — and got the ball jammed back across their goal line just 15 plays later. From there on in the Bruins made it their game.

The win left the Bruins second in PCC standings. Oregon beat the Bruins 21-0, Oct. 5 in their only loss this season. Next week the Bruins travel to Stanford to meet the Indians.

Oregon State and Washington State follow the conference leaders. Next week they meet the conference trailers — Oregon State against Washington at Seattle and Washington State against the last-place Trojans at the Coliseum.

Little Idaho rates ahead of the once-powerful Trojans in PCC standings, having skipped conference contention over the weekend to the College of Pacific 7-7 at Stockton. Next week the Vandals play Fresno State at Moscow.

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP)—The old equalizer—UPSET—was put to full use yesterday, leveling the Big Ten football race to a take-your-choice affair.

Michigan State's Spartans, ranked No. 1 nationally, and Minnesota's fourth-ranked Gophers fell unexpectedly, allowing Iowa's defending champions and Ohio State to take the conference lead.

Purdue, which hadn't tasted victory in three previous games, upended Michigan State, 20-13, and Illinois mauled Minnesota, 34-13, in two of the nation's biggest upsets.

Ohio State remained undefeated in two conference games by rolling past hapless Indiana, 36-0, and Iowa—the Big Ten's only undefeated team—thrashed upstart Wisconsin, 21-7. Michigan, loser the previous week to Michigan State, scored a 34-14 triumph over winless Northwestern.

Stamped a three-touchdown favorite, Michigan State never lived up to expectations against the underrated, injured and ailing Boilermakers. But neither injuries nor flu could keep Purdue from its objective. Ross Fichtner, an 18-year-old sophomore quarterback, filling in for regular Bob Spoo, who was out with a hand cut, led Purdue with the poise of a veteran.

While Purdue was stealing the upset thunder, Illinois fashioned a good-sized surprise for the homecoming crowd at Champaign. A two-touchdown underdog, Illinois turned the game into a rout by scoring twice in the first quarter and taking a 21-0 halftime lead over Minnesota's Gophers.

Four conference games are scheduled Saturday headed by a lightning-Minnesota battle for the "Little Brown Jug." Illinois invades revenge-minded Michigan State while Iowa is at Northwestern. Ohio State goes to Wisconsin. Indiana takes on Villanova in non-conference play and Purdue is home to Miami (Ohio) in another non-league tilt.

## Sutherland Backs QB

**WSC Mentor Cites Newman's Courage**

PULLMAN, Wash., Oct. 20 (AP)—Washington State's Jim Sutherland, the veteran coach who was second guessed by his young quarterback in the dramatic last seconds of a 14-13 loss to Oregon, was philosophical about it today.

He said it was all part of character building and he praised quarterback Bobby Newman who reversed a decision from the bench and tried and missed—an extra point kick yesterday that would have tied it, 14-14.

Sutherland had sent fullback Eddie Stevens into the game to convert, but Newman overruled him, kicked it himself, then hung his head in grief as the ball hit the left upright on the goal post and bounced back.

"This is what makes football a fine game for young men," Sutherland said. "Here was a boy with courage or conviction who made a decision to take great responsibility on his own shoulders before thousands of people."

Players who were there in the middle with 65 seconds to play said there was a calm, quiet debate between Newman and Stevens amid a steady roar from 19,000 fans, some of whom had come down to stand around the end zone.

Stevens made his report to the field general: Higher headquarters had sent him in to kick. Newman said he'd like to try. Stevens, who hadn't tried a conversion since the Nebraska game a month ago, had his instructions but he listened. Newman had been practicing place kicks. Stevens was ready but agreed to go along. Newman was calling the signals and they made a joint decision. He called his own.

The Newman decision on the extra point developed from the fact that Bunny Aldrich, WSC's No. 1 placekicker who made the first conversion, had already been in and out of the game and couldn't return in the period.

Crafty Kid Gavilan, the aging ex-welterweight champion from Cuba, hopes to move back into the welterweight title picture at the expense of young, aggressive Caspar Ortega of Mexico on Tuesday night.

The two 147-pound contenders clash in a return bout that is expected to lure some 10,000 fans to Wrigley Field in Los Angeles.

Gavilan had lost five straight and a successor to Carmen Basilio, the high-ranking Mexican at Miami Beach last July 31. The victory jumped the 31-year-old Cuban into the No. 6 spot among the welters. Ortega, now 22, fell from a No. 3 ranking to seventh following successive defeats to Larry Baker and Gavilan.

The winner may earn a berth in the welterweight elimination tournament being set up by the World Boxing Committee to determine a successor to Carmen Basilio. Basilio vacated his welter crown when he won the middleweight title from Ray Robinson.

## Ghost Pays Illini Visit; MSU Next

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Oct. 20 (AP)—The Galloping Ghost haunted the turf at Illinois' Memorial Stadium yesterday—possibly as vital as on a home-come day 33 years ago when he raced to football immortality.

For the spirit of Red Grange, insiders revealed after Illinois' 34-13 upset victory over Minnesota yesterday, might have been breathed into an Illini team that played far beyond expectations.

Grange, who ran for four touchdowns in the first 12 minutes against Michigan in a 39-14 homecoming upset on Oct. 18, 1924, appeared before the Illini team Friday afternoon, 33 years after his greatest day on the gridiron.

Now a television sports announcer, Grange huddled with the 1957 Illini for 15 minutes and gave the team a pep talk.

"We knew he was in town and we asked him to come over and say hello to the boys," said Illini coach Ray Eliot. Eliot would not reveal what Grange had said to the team.

Nor would he attribute the victory to any single factor. "It was totally a team victory. The boys went out there, saw their chance to win the game and they did. I'm real proud of them. If anything, the victory was a matter of aggressiveness. We had an aggressive defense against Minnesota."

Eliot admitted the Illini played Minnesota quarterback Bobby Cox "differently" in defense, but would not say exactly how. More important, however, was the stopping of Minnesota plays up the middle which in previous games had proven so successful.

Eliot didn't come up with anything which could be called new offensively. "Our offense has been pretty good most of the season," said Ray. "We just cut down on our mistakes and it made us look better."

And just like a coach, Eliot wasn't really enjoying his victory celebration, he was thinking of next week when Illinois invades Michigan State.

The Spartans were upset last year by Illinois, 20-13, just when they had been ranked the No. 1 team in the nation. To add to Eliot's woes, Purdue upset Michigan State, 20-13, yesterday.

"They'll really be after us now," moaned Eliot, "especially since it's their homecoming."

LAUREL, Md., Oct. 20 (AP)—The president of Laurel race course still wants Queen Elizabeth to enter her 3-year-old colt in the Laurel International here Nov. 11.

Laurel's John Schapiro said today he was attempting to get word to the Queen that he is the only British horse invited to the \$100,000 invitation-only race.

Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin offered the official invitation yesterday, on behalf of Schapiro, while the Queen was attending the Maryland-North Carolina football game at College Park.

McKeldin said the Queen declined politely, however, saying "it wouldn't be sporting" because another British horse will be running in the international.

The only other horse from the British Isles for which an invitation has been accepted is Ballymoss, an Irish colt.

Schapiro was attempting to get in touch with the Queen today to inform her that this would be the first time England has not been represented in the race unless she sends over her chestnut colt, Dou Telle.
