The Scharff brothers, Kurt and Werner, of Austria and California, have parlayed homesickness for their native land into a worldwide fashion business.

When the good-looking young brothers arrived in New York in the early days of World War II, they were wandering mournfully down Fifth Ave. when they saw a shop bearing a familiar sign, "Lanz of Salzburg." Here, they said, was a friend from home, for they had been raised in a village only a few miles from Salzburg. They entered the shop in the middle of a fashion show, sought out Lanz, happily exchanged home town gossip and ended the afternoon as partners in the business.

The brothers had visited California briefly several years before during a world cruise, and convinced Lanz it would be wise to move west. A week after their arrival in America the Scharffs and Lanz were enroute to California in a secondhand Ford, and in another week they were in business in Los Angeles.

Today Lanz dresses and separates are favorites of college girls and their elders all over America and are sold also in London, Paris, Zurich, Lucerne, St. Moritz, Amsterdam, Luxembourg, Hong Kong, the West Indies, Bermuda and Canada.

Designer for the firm is Werner's pretty American wife, Elinor, known as "Nornee" to buyers from coast to coast. Lanz fashions retain the peasant braid and embroidery touches that have distinguished them, and have added sophisticated airs.
