

Present 11-Holiday Schedule for City Employees Affirmed

The present 11-holiday schedule for city employees was affirmed Monday night by Salem City Council.
Action on the most controversial part of the personnel policy statement, otherwise already approved by Council, came after alternate proposals from Aldermen Russell Bonesteel and E. C. Charlton were rejected.
Charlton wanted to eliminate Lincoln Birthday, Washington Birthday, primary and general election day holidays, and also the Veterans Day holiday unless citywide observance includes store closings.
Bonesteel, who also has advocated fewer holidays, moved unsuccessfully last night to ask a citizens' committee to make a recommendation on the subject. He suggested the group be composed of two labor representatives, two representing small business and two representing large businesses.

Bonesteel Plan Loses
Alderman Bonesteel told the Council he would prefer a direct salary increase where city salaries are below those of private industry, rather than substituting the advantage of a more liberal holiday schedule.

The Bonesteel plan was defeated by a 4-3 vote.
A move to ease State Street parking problems near Willamette University was approved by the aldermen at their City Hall meeting last night. They agreed to have city crews grade and gravel vacant property recently acquired by Willamette on Trade Street near South Capitol.

Making up to 100 parking spaces there would probably lead to measures to restrict student parking on State Street in front of the university, it was indicated by aldermen.

Library Spread Seen
The newly opened West Salem branch of Salem Public Library may lead the way toward future library branches in other parts of the city, declared Alderman Loring Grier Monday night as the Council passed a resolution of thanks for the assistance of several groups in helping prepare the new library in West Salem City Building.

Singled out were Junior Chamber of Commerce, West Salem Lions Club, West Salem P.E.T. Home Demonstration Agency, Capital Journal and The Oregon Statesman.

Branch libraries have figured in long-range planning of the city, but no additional branch is now under consideration.

Action was deferred on parking meters for Hollywood business area where a majority of businesses recently expressed themselves against the meter plan.

Alderman Clayton Jones, absent from the Council session, was in Salem Memorial Hospital for observation but not reported as seriously ill.

Other Council Action
The City Council took these actions:

Approved installing 20 signs giving direction to Salem Chamber of Commerce office, with the chamber contributing \$5 toward each sign plus \$1.25 annual maintenance each.

Introduced legislation to make city law conform with new state law allowing a teen-ager with

Third A-Sub Successful in Sea Trials

GROTON, Conn., Oct. 28 (P)—The Navy's third nuclear powered submarine—Skate—returned today from her first two days of sea trials. She passed her builder's sea trials with flying colors.

During a submerged trial run of four hours, her nuclear power plant drove her at more than the originally designed full speed, said the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics Corp., the builder.

The Skate started her tests yesterday. Navy Day, and returned at mid-afternoon today. The trial was six months ahead of schedule. She is tentatively scheduled for commissioning next December.

Her keel was laid July 21, 1955, and the 257-foot vessel was launched last May 16. She displaces 2,190 tons and carries 85 officers and men. She is commanded by Cmdr. James F. Calvert of Cleveland, Ohio.

Peak-Roaming Elephant Back In Captivity

MITCHELL HOLLOW, N.Y., Oct. 28 (P)—Siam—ill with a cold—ran out of elephant steam today and submitted to captive chains after 13 days of roaming through the Catskill Mountains.

The 2½-ton elephant was a subdued girl when captured near a mountainous stone quarry. Twice earlier today she had broken away after her trainer thought she was under control.

"She seemed glad to be caught," said Leonard Marquitt, superintendent of the quarry.

Siam has a "very bad cold" and has lost "lots of weight," Mrs. Alfred Vidbel, one of her trainers, told a reporter.

Vidbel and a posse trailed the tired animal several miles through woods. When the elephant halted near the quarry, Vidbel simply walked up to the 13-year-old circus and television performer and talked to her. She stood quietly while an assistant put hobbling chains on her legs.

Meat Cutters Press Demand For Work Limit

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 28 (P)—Most of the supermarkets in the Kansas City area remained closed today as meat cutters pressed a demand for a work limit. No new contract talks were scheduled in the four-day old strike.

Jobbers of perishable foods said they were routing shipments intended for the struck stores to other communities. A spokesman for the Milgram chain said thousands of dollars worth of fruits and vegetables were rotting in closed stores and warehouses.

Housewives turned to small independent grocers or waited in long lines to have their purchases checked out in supermarkets being operated by supervisory personnel—about 20 per cent of the total.

Spokesmen for both the Meat Cutters' Union and the supermarket's said pay increases were only a secondary issue in the strike. Both said the "maximum work" demand is the first in the nation's retail meat industry.

"The stores have been pouring more and more work on our people while reducing their staffs," said C. H. Nothnagel, executive secretary of Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen Local 576. He said the union asks a payroll equal to 8½ per cent of meat sales.

Die-Hard Fascists Observe March on Rome Anniversary

PREDAPPPIO, Italy, Oct. 28 (P)—Five hundred die-hard Fascists knelt at the tomb of Benito Mussolini in chilly rain today on the 35th anniversary of the Blackshirt march on Rome which brought the dictator to power.

Italian police reinforced their garrison in this northern Italian mountain village where Mussolini was born and where his remains now are entombed. No incidents or violent demonstrations were reported.

Driver Cited After Accident

Two drivers escaped injuries in a two car accident at the intersection of highways 22 and 51 on the Independence road early Monday evening, state police reported. A car driven by Dorothy Alice Frazer, Portland, was damaged when her car ran in a ditch to avoid colliding with a car driven by David R. Benson, Delake, police said.

State police cited Benson for failing to yield the right way in the 6:45 p.m. accident, they said.

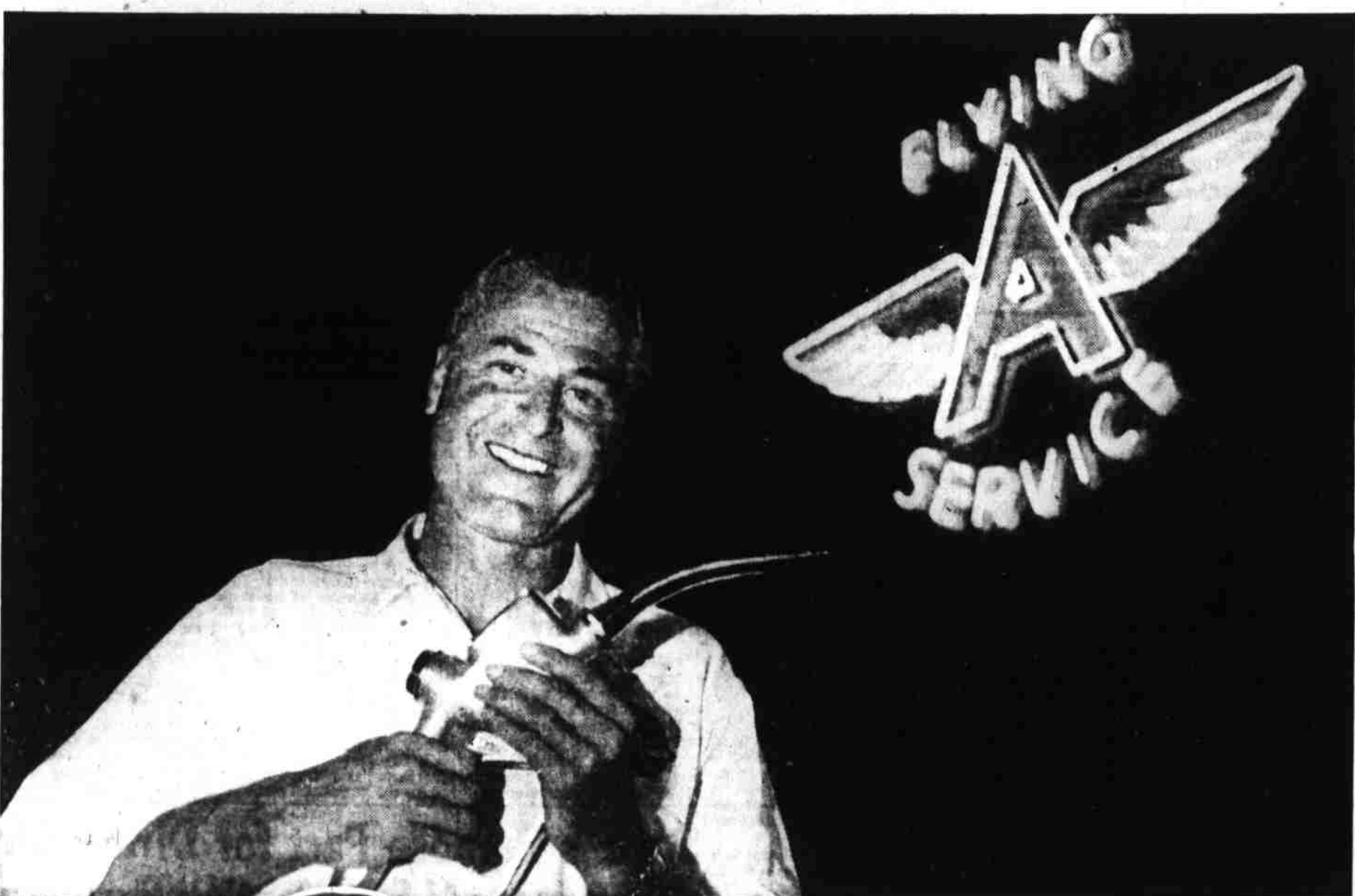
