

Sewer, Water Study Requested Of Proposed Annexation Region

Estimated costs of sewers, water and drainage in a proposed major annexation area at east city limits will be reported Nov. 12 to Salem Planning Commission.

The commission has been asked by Salem City Council to study the proposed annexation of 239 acres east of present city limits between D street and Southern Pacific Gear Line, extending east to the Salem Bypass.

Residents petitioning for annexation already represent over 60 per cent of the families involved, reports Wesley Kvarsten, commission planning director.

State Board Recommends Sale of Unused Properties

Sale of a former site for a state reformatory near St. Paul and several smaller pieces of unused state land is recommended in a report filed Tuesday with the State Board of Control by a committee studying land utilization.

The reformatory, now under construction north of Cottage Farm, was to have been built on the 425-acre Williams and Hart Ranch, 15 miles north of Salem in Fairfield District until the Air Force announced it was going to build a base in that area. The Air Force plans also have been abandoned.

The property was purchased three years ago for \$70,000 from Ralph E. Williams Jr. of Portland, who had renamed it Fairfield Farms.

Several tracts in the Salem area are in the list recommended for disposal. They are:

Recommended Disposals

The north edge of the Oregon State Hospital grounds bordering D Street NE. The committee said lots 150 in depth from 23rd Street to Park Avenue could be sold for residential development.

A 62½-acre triangle of prison property north of Salem Bypass between Turner Road and Southern Pacific Railroad mainline, south-east of Salem. The committee says it is "very poor" farmland but a potential source of sand and gravel.

Another triangle of prison property, 125 acres bounded by Mission Street and Turner and Airport roads SE. The committee says the location is ideal for commercial development and should bring \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Fifteen acres at the northwest corner of Fairview Home property, north of Strong Road, SE. The committee says the area which is farmland adjoining a residential development, will be cut off from the institution by an extension of 25th Street.

Twelve acres at Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital, The Dalles, and 24 acres at Eastern Oregon State Hospital, Pendleton.

The committee recommends extension of Blind School property to the north by reclaiming land sometimes inundated by Pringle Creek.

High Priced Out

A possible hitch in disposing of some of the land was pointed out by Merrifield. He said in some cases there are no accurate maps defining state-owned lands and that clear records of ownership are in the hands of the private landowner.

Some of the trouble probably goes back to original donation land claims and other records were lost in the Capitol fire of 1933, he said.

Commissioners decided to call a public hearing on changing the name of Moody Avenue in East Salem to Ellis Avenue. Moody is a 2½-block section of a street otherwise named Ellis both to the east and the west. It lies between Market and D Streets, extending from about 21st Street to the Salem Bypass.

Objections to the plan came from a petition signed by 26 neighbors in the R-1 (single-family) zoned neighborhood. Their spokesmen at the hearing included Raymond E. Olsen, Gene Huntley and John Garren.

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Woman Sues To Collect Earlier Claim

PORTLAND, Oct. 29 (AP)—An 82-year-old Seattle woman filed suit here today in an attempt to collect the \$83,000 she earlier was awarded by a U. S. District Court.

Mrs. Marguerite Connell said in the suit she will seek to prove that Edgar R. Errion owns three Oregon farms—two of them in Polk County valued at \$82,000 and another in Yamhill County valued at \$36,000.

The suit said that Errion has not yet paid the amount awarded Mrs. Connell by a U. S. District Court in Seattle.

In the earlier suit, Mrs. Connell said she lost stock valued at \$100,000 when Errion persuaded her to invest in some oyster beds at Coos Bay.

Errion, of Portland and Seattle, now is serving a term in the McNeil Island federal prison.

Errion pleaded guilty to a charge of mail fraud stemming from the promotion of the Mt. Hood Hardboard and Plywood Co-operative of Estacada, Ore.

Rioting Follows Turkish Election; 2 Reported Dead

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Oct. 29 (AP)—Postelection rioting was reported today from at least five cities.

Marital law was imposed in the Syrian border city of Gaziantep after two persons were killed and the town hall sacked, press reports said.

The national ministry of the interior in Ankara denied knowledge of the incidents.

But independent press reports said backers of the People's Republican party, which lost to Premier Adnan Menderes' Democrats in Sunday's Parliamentary election, rioted in Samsun, Kayseri, Mersin, Ispahane and other localities as well as at Gaziantep.

The Republicans claimed the government used illegal means to win the election.

Police Tell Presley to Clean Show

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 29 (AP)—Elvis Presley, who rocked 10,000 screaming members of the hot rod set last night, was under police orders to clean up his second show tonight.

Presley's show, his first Hollywood rock and roll concert, was condemned by many parents who accompanied their moppets to the Pan-Pacific auditorium.

Dick Williams, entertainment editor of the Los Angeles Mirror-News wrote:

"If any further proof were needed that what Elvis offers is not basically music but a sex show, it was provided last night."

Deputy Chief Richard Simon said he has instructed his vice squad to instruct Presley to eliminate any so-called sexy overtones from his performance. A spokesman for the City Attorney's office, admitting many complaints from parents, said Presley's performance did not violate city laws against obscenity which are aimed mostly at burlesque and stag shows.

He added, however, that Elvis' performance in front of children was in "questionable taste."

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Ex-Publisher At Pendleton Succumbs

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 29 (AP)—Lee D. Drake, 75, retired Pendleton newspaperman who had been active in civic affairs here much of his life, died last night.

He had been ill since mid-summer, when he suffered a heart attack.

He was part owner and business manager of the East Oregonian here for many years and shortly after World War I was associated with newspaper publishing at Astoria and at Twin Falls, Idaho.

He retired from newspaper work in 1950 but continued active as Umatilla County civil defense coordinator. He retired from that a year ago.

Drake was one of the founders of the Pendleton Round-Up and the Happy Canyon pageant associated with it.

He was born in this county. His only son, James of Poulisbo, Wash., survives.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 29 (AP)—Mrs. Dorothy LaFollette Sousa, 36, today obtained a divorce from John Philip Sousa III, 43, grandson of the famed bandmaster, testifying that he "wanted freedom to come and go as he pleased."

Superior Judge Harold P. Huls granted the decree.

Sousa has been paying \$200 a month for support of the couple's 10-year-old son, John Philip IV.

Soviet Skeletons Rattled As Czarist Files Studied

PALO ALTO, Calif., Oct. 29 (AP)—A closet full of Soviet family skeletons was rattled today when the Hoover Institution opened 100 secret police documents.

The Reds thought the documents were burned some 30 years ago.

The set of 500-pound wooden packing cases contain the files of the Paris office of the Czarist Russian secret police of more than 40 years ago.

They hold a veritable Who's Who of the expatriate and exiled revolutionaries who flocked to Western Europe after the abortive 1905 revolution. Hoover Institution officials hope they will yield considerable background information on past and present members of the Communist hierarchy.

Secretly Shipped

The files were shipped secretly from Paris to the United States in 1926 by Basil Maklakov, the last pre-Communist Russian ambassador to France.

Maklakov, apparently realizing the great value of the papers, signed a statement that he had burned them. Then he shipped them to the United States. Feeling his life would be in jeopardy if the truth were known, he stipulated that the cases should remain sealed until at least three months after his death. He died last July in Switzerland at the age of 86.

Officials of the Hoover Institution on war, revolution and peace at the Stanford University campus have opened five of the boxes and given the contents a hurried examination, says C. Easton Rothwell, director.

Police Archive

"This is the only Russian police archive of any magnitude accessible to scholars outside the Soviet Union," said Witold Sworakowski, assistant director who was born and educated in Poland.

"All the evidence we have been able to find indicates that the Reds accepted Maklakov's statement that he had burned the papers—in fact were relieved to."

Huge Estate Target of Will Contest

HILLSBORO, Ore., Oct. 29 (AP)—A \$980,000 estate was made the target of a will contest here today.

Thirteen first cousins of Mrs. Anna M. Algesheimer, who died last April at the age of 77, brought the suit, contesting the will which left about \$900,000 of the estate to the Roman Catholic order of the Sisters of St. Mary.

The order operates St. Mary's schools for boys and for girls, near Beaverton, Ore.

Sherry Fong Jury Picked

PORTLAND, Oct. 29 (AP)—A jury of seven women and five men today was selected to hear the second degree murder trial of 26-year-old Sherry Fong.

Mrs. Fong is charged with killing her 16-year-old baby sister, Diane Hank.

In his opening statement to the jury today, Deputy Dist. Atty. Robert Christ said that the state will attempt to prove that the Hank girl was killed with poison.

The state also will attempt to prove, Christ said, that Mrs. Fong administered the poison that killed Miss Hank in January of 1954.

Miss Hank's body was found wrapped in a blanket near Washougal, Wash., in February of 1954. Christ told the jury that at the time of her death Miss Hank was a close friend of Mrs. Fong and her husband, Wayne.

The prosecutor also indicated that some of the witnesses he will call testified at the three previous trials in which Mrs. Fong was accused of the Hank girl's death.

Christ said he will call his first witness tomorrow morning.

The council's new study of the 'Fixed' Tape Story Told in Maloney Case

PORTLAND, Oct. 29 (AP)—The final testimony was taken today in the bribery conspiracy trial of Thomas E. Maloney, 54, a former Seattle and Spokane race track clerk.

The trial is one of a number which sprang from this city's long vice probe.

Among the final witnesses today was Portland gambler Clifford O. Bennett, who said he once had been told about a "fixed" tape recording.

Bennett said that Raymond Clark once told him "Don't worry about Langley. We've got some tapes fixed." Bennett also said Clark told him how tape recordings could be altered in a fool-proof manner.

Earlier in the trial, Clark testified he made a tape recording of a room conversation between Maloney, then Dist. Atty. William Langley and Joseph McLaughlin of Seattle.

The state has charged that McLaughlin, Maloney and Langley were in on a plot to open up gambling operations here.

The tape recording Clark said he made at the order of racketeer Big Jim Elkins, his employer, was played for the jury earlier in the trial.

Maloney testified in his own defense that he once was an investigator for Langley. Maloney said he helped ferret out vice operations here.

In an earlier trial stemming from the probe, Langley was removed from office after being convicted of a charge of failure to prosecute gamblers.

The defense and prosecution will make their final arguments to the jury tomorrow morning.

Man Enters Guilty Pleas To Murders

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 29 (AP)—A plea of guilty to two counts of murder in the second degree was entered by Baxter Hignite, 27, at his hearing today before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Hignite had waived preliminary hearing and his right to be heard by the grand jury.

The charges grew out of the Oct. 12 fatal shooting of James Flaugh, 58, and his wife, Lillie Pearl Flaugh, 33, both of Merrill.

The couple was caring for Hignite's two-year-old daughter, Cheryl Ann, who had been left in their charge by his estranged wife, Leeta Ray Hignite.

He is accused of shooting them when they refused to allow him to take the child away.

Minor Injuries Result as Two Autos Collide

HUBBARD, Oct. 29—Three persons suffered minor injuries in a two-car collision at Boones Ferry and Broadacres roads early tonight, state police said.

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working woman fills a book, and for those who think they're experts on women, working and otherwise, here are three questions:

1—Which group has the larger percentage working—the 20-year-old group of girls or the 50-year-old group of women?

2—What is the median age at which a woman has her last baby?

3—How many women in the labor force are married?

Take a moment to think, and let's go to the answers, and maybe a few surprises.

1—The proportion of working women of 20 and 50 is exactly the same—45 per cent.

2—Half the women of America have had their last baby at 26.

3—Six of every 10 women who work are married.

The National Manpower Council was set up in 1951, under a Ford Foundation grant, to study how better to use this nation's resources. Its executive director, Henry David, was in town today, discussing some of its findings.

"Do you realize we produce 50 per cent of the world's goods with only 6 per cent of the population?" he said. "We found during the war that our real limiting factor was our manpower resources."

Which fetches us around to that wonderful resource, women.

In 1880, four million women worked and made up about a sixth of the working population.

In 1956 about 22 million women worked, made up almost a third of the civilian labor force, and picked up more than 42 billion dollars in wages and salaries.

Generally speaking, David believes, a woman now works when she first gets out of school, drops out to have babies, and then, when her last youngster heads for kindergarten or the first grade, gets herself a job again.

Whether this is good or bad, it's happening, and David says employers should understand what's going on and provide more opportunities for women who come back.
