

Farmers Must Take Marketing Stand, Agriculture Dean Says

If federal funds are to be kept coming into agricultural research, farmers must take a definite stand on marketing, Dean Earl Price told the Oregon State Board of Agriculture Thursday.

Price, dean of agriculture at Oregon State College as well as an ex-officio member of the state board of agriculture, met with the group throughout Thursday in its first of a two-day session being held at the department offices. This morning's session will begin at 10 a.m.

"Any request for additional research funds for agriculture is

being challenged because people feel that the funds are being directed only toward more production of products that are in most instances already in surplus," Price said. "They do not realize—and by saying they, I mean state legislators, many of the congressmen, and even some of the farmers—how much research is directed toward protection against actual and potential agricultural diseases and insect emergencies which could wipe out an entire agricultural industry in our state. Much is also being directed toward improved marketing."

Dean Price pointed out how much research has been used to stem diseases in crops and animal husbandry.

Wheat Crop Cutback Plan Discussed

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 31 (AP)—A proposal to put the entire wheat crop on a bushel basis rather than on the present acre basis was discussed here today by the National Assn. of Wheat Growers. The two-day meeting ended today.

Purpose of the proposal is to cut back wheat production and wheat-growing states would be allowed to sell only a certain amount of wheat for domestic consumption.

Plans also were made for the annual convention of the association to be held in Spokane, Wash., Feb. 4-7.

The association's voting delegates from the six member states—Washington, Oregon, Texas, Kansas, Nebraska and Colorado—attended.

Oregon Takes No Stand

Washington and Oregon delegates took no stand on the proposed program.

Bert Hughes, Imperial, Neb., president of the national wheat growers organization, has tentatively scheduled a meeting in Pendleton, Ore., to explain plans of the National Conference of Commodity Organization.

The NCCO has been studying the overall farm problem. Primary purpose of the Denver meeting was to revise the association's wheat program to fit needs brought out by the NCCO sessions.

Verne Barbre, Ephrata, Wash., president of the Washington State wheat growers, has asked the state association's legislative committee to attend the Pendleton meeting that it may come to a decision on the new NCCO program.

Ike Asked to Make Pan Am Denial Final

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (AP)—President Eisenhower today was asked by Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) to finally deny Pan American Airways the right to pick up or discharge passengers at Portland and Seattle on its flights to the Orient, a service now performed by Northwest Airlines.

Pan American is authorized to fly the North Pacific tour to the Orient and make refueling stops at Portland and Seattle, but cannot handle passengers at those two cities.

Northwest had contended there is insufficient traffic to warrant duplication of its Orient route by Pan American.

Eisenhower on Aug. 2 approved a Civil Aeronautics Board recommendation that Pan American be denied North Pacific traffic rights at Portland and Seattle. But on Sept. 3 he amended this, instructing the CAB to hold up until a further check was made on traffic potential.
