State Accepts Park Grounds

A letter of acceptance of over 35 acres of Marion County land was received Tuesday from the State Highway Department, County Court members said.

The area, which stretches more than a mile along Willamette River next to Champcoy State Park, was offered by the county for incorporation into the park grounds.

A request was received from a Marion County resident to resurface a two-mile gravel road which extends from Aumsville west. The request stated that the road has no surface gravel, and has been causing difficulties to users for some time.

A letter was also read concerning some fences alleged to be across county road 957 near Mehama, allegedly holding up logging operations in the area. Both requests were taken under court advisement with no action decided.

WU Student Hauled Royal Russian Gems in Truck

By now \$80,000 in jewels and antiques secreted out of imperial Russia during the revolution are safe in San Francisco and the story of how Willamette University student Joe H. Pierre and his low-truck helped them on their way can be made public.

Czarist Baron Rodolsko salvaged the gems and silver antiques when he fled Russia in 1917 and came to Seattle. When the Baron died recently they were assigned to dealer John Christenson of Seattle to be sold in San Francisco for the estate.

Christenson left in his 1947 car, an unlikely looking conveyer of anything so valuable.

His perfect camouflage broke down literally late in the evening of Sept. 25 on the Salem-Portland freeway near Aurora. Christenson tried vainly for hours to flag down help.

Meanwhile his Lloyds of London transit protection expired at 10 when, by contract, the gems were to have been safely locked up.

Christenson and his \$80,000 treasure waited unprotected until 3 a.m. when, alerted by a state po-

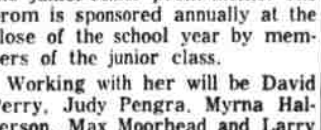

Ruling Lists Naturopathic Ad Violation

An advertisement by a naturopathic and Chiropractic Physician which does not set the professional qualifications of such practitioner in the words specified by statute is a violation of the health profession law, Attorney General Robert V. Thornton held Tuesday.

The Attorney General also ruled that an advertisement by a Chiropractic Physician which infers that superiority in diagnosis is achieved through the use of a certain instrument is cause for suspension of the violator's license by the state Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

Commissioner Okehs Snake River Dams \$15 Million Securities Issue

Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan announced Tuesday he had approved an application of the Idaho Power Company to issue \$15,000,000 of bonds and sell 225,000 shares of stock to finance construction of the Brownlee and Oxbow Dams on the Snake River.

Both dams are under construction.

Morgan pointed out that the securities to be issued by the company are for the purpose of funding more than \$30,000,000 in short term bank notes now outstanding against the Idaho Power Company. These funds have already been spent in the construction of Brownlee and Oxbow Dams, he said.

Morgan also said: "In view of the calmness with which both the U. S. Supreme Court and the Oregon Supreme Court view applicant's failure to secure a license from the State Hydroelectric Commission as required by state law before construction, and in view of the fact that the federal commissions having full regulatory powers over licensing and financing have chosen not to be concerned over questions affecting the public interest, it would appear quixotic for the commissioner with limited regulatory powers, to attempt to halt further financing until all questions have been resolved."

"Yet the unresolved questions do persist and they do have an important bearing on the public interest. They deserve attention of some public agency both alert enough to the public interest and free enough to act."
