NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—Ivy League football coaches were in wide disagreement today over a suggestion from Dick Colman of Princeton calling for the league to ignore the NCAA rules committee and return to two platoon football.

Giants Set 1958 Slate

Schedule Lists 77 Home Games

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20 (AP)—The San Francisco Giants released a 1958 schedule today calling for 77 baseball games at home, 22 of them in an extended welcoming stretch.

New Giant fans will get a look at five National League teams before the team heads east. The schedule shows the San Francisco Giants playing 22 of their first 25 games at home.

The Giants open here April 15 against the Los Angeles Dodgers and after three games, go to Los Angeles for a three-game opening set there. Then the former New Yorkers return to San Francisco to play through May 11.

The schedule calls for 21 night games at the Giants Stadium—expected capacity 23,000—and only two doubleheaders. Pittsburgh plays one on May 4, Chicago draws the other July 4.

There will also be two games on Sept. 1 against Los Angeles, but they will be played separately in the morning and afternoon.

Ticket manager Pete Hoffman said the double admission program was decided on in expectation of "extra big" Labor Day crowds.

On returning from the Los Angeles opener, the Giants, starting April 22, play St. Louis, Chicago, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh with a second three-game series with Los Angeles, ending May 11.

Then the Giants go on the road, returning June 3 for a night opener against the world champion Milwaukee Braves that will be Milwaukee's first appearance here.

The West Coast transfers of the Giants and Dodgers brought about drastic changes in the scheduling. The Giants will play each team 11 times at home, but the series are unevenly distributed.

He'll be a spectator at Eugene Saturday, but Lee Gustafson will have more than a mild interest in the classic he'll watch that afternoon. Gus coached both Nub Beamer of the Beavers and Jim Shanley of the Ducks when they were Shrine gamblers. . . . Gus will undoubtedly be on Beamer's side, however, for Lee has quite an Oregon State football background himself.

Then there's Bud Michaels, the former Leslie Junior High, Salem High and Oregon College (Monmouth) grinder of years gone by who now has his Powers Cruisers in the thick of the state's A-2 grid championship struggle. . . . 35 at Night LA Names Home Tilts

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 20 (AP)—The Los Angeles Dodgers, who hope to know within two weeks whether they will play in Memorial Coliseum or Wrigley Field, today announced their 77-game 1958 home schedule.

The schedule released by business manager Harold Parrott includes 35 night games. Last season the two Brooklyn Dodgers played 26, seven in nearby Jersey City.

The Dodgers open the National League season in San Francisco against the transplanted New York Giants April 14, and in Los Angeles Friday, April 15.

Three doubleheaders are scheduled, compared with the five originally booked in 1957.

The night games, none of which will be on getaway night of a series, include seven with Pittsburgh, six with Milwaukee, five each with the Chicago Cubs and Philadelphia and four each with San Francisco, St. Louis and Cincinnati.

Assistant general manager Arthur R. Reed Patterson said vice president Tom Sawyer is due in tomorrow and will go into negotiations regarding the 1958 playing site.

All indications are that the Dodgers hope to play in 100,000-seat-plus Memorial Coliseum but engineering and many other matters must be solved.

Parrott would not estimate how many advance reservation applications have been received for seats. He said it was more of an advance than in Brooklyn history but he pointed out that applications were never sought back East at this time of year.

President Walter F. O'Malley has said he hopes to break all attendance records in Los Angeles. Brooklyn for the past 13 straight years attracted 1,000,000 or more fans at Ebbets Field. The Dodgers' biggest year was 1,807,326 in 1947.

Royals Whip Warriors In Pro Basketball Mix

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 20 (AP)—Big Clyde Lovellette pored in 30 points tonight, thereby leading Cincinnati to a 99-89 victory over the Philadelphia Warriors in a National Basketball Assn. game at Convention Hall.

The Royals' victory moved them into a tie with Detroit for second place in NBA's Western division. The setback was Philadelphia's fourth in a row, and dropped the Warriors into third place in the Eastern section.

Cincinnati looked like a different team in the second half after trailing 46-39 at halftime. The Royals took command early in the third quarter, scoring 11 consecutive points for a 58-33 advantage.

In a game at Minneapolis, Rich Guerin, scored five points in the last 26 seconds, to pace the New York Knickerbockers to a 105-101 victory over the Minneapolis Lakers.

The win broke the Knicks' losing streak at five games. Guerin, who hasn't practiced for six weeks because of a broken thumb, broke a 96-98 tie with a three-point play in the last 26 seconds. The teams then traded baskets until the final horn.

The Lakers, who never led in the contest, came back from a 10-point deficit midway in the fourth quarter. With the score 90-91, Dick Garmaker scored five points in 45 seconds and Hot Rod Hundley tied the score on a field goal with one minute and three seconds remaining.

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Halfbacks Get Notice

Francis, Jones, Douglas on List

NEW YORK, Nov. 20 (AP)—In line with recent football trends, hard-running halfbacks appear to be attracting more attention than passing quarterbacks as the field of candidates for the 1957 All-American team begins to take shape.

There are twice as many halfbacks, of course, but a half dozen or so are getting highest recommendations from Associated Press regional All-American boards while few T quarterbacks receive top billing.

The Associated Press All-American team, selected on the basis of performances through the entire season, will be announced Dec. 5.

Preliminary listings include 14 halfbacks, 10-eye-catching quarterbacks and four fullbacks. Other players still are under consideration, of course, and their performances in the closing games of the season may move some of them up to displace the current favorites.

Some of the strongest recommendations went to halfbacks John Crow of Texas A&M, Walt Kowalsky of Michigan State, Bob Anderson of Army, Bob Mulgado of Arizona State (Tempe) and Bob Stranks of Colorado. Quarterbacks Lee Grosescu of Utah and King Hill of Rice, and fullbacks Jim Bakhtiar of Virginia and Jimmy Taylor of Louisiana State.

Because all-around ability is demanded and because the top teams play rugged schedules, these players aren't listed as the No. 1 offensive performers in the NCAA statistics. Anderson, Stranks and Bakhtiar are among the first ten in rushing, however; Grosescu is a strong second in passing.

Other outstanding performers on the potential All-American list include Notre Dame's Nick Pietrasante; Speedsters Dick Christy of North Carolina State, Wray Carlton of Duke and quarterback Harvey White of Clemson in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Joe Francis of Oregon State, Jimmy Jones of Washington and Jack Douglas of Stanford represent the Pacific Coast Conference.

In the Southeastern Conference there are Mississippi State's Bill Stacy and Ray Brown of Mississippi, Bobby Jordan of VMI, Mike Sommer of George Washington and Bobby Scharr of The Citadel in the Southern Conference are other outstanding Southern backs.

Also prominently mentioned are Gerald Nesbitt, Arkansas; Don Clark, Ohio State; Jimmy Pace, Michigan; Merrill Douglas, Utah; Tom Greene, Holy Cross, and John Sapoch, Princeton.

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
