

Morocco Charges Spain With Bombing Area During Squabble

MADRID, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Morocco today charged Spanish planes bombed her territory during fighting in the Moroccan civil war, reported to have delivered a formal protest to the Spanish foreign minister.

Morocco King In Texas for Ranch Visit

KINGSVILLE, Tex., Nov. 30 (U.P.)—The King of Morocco, Mohammed V, flew into this south Texas city today en route to a weekend visit at the fabulous King Ranch.

His plane touched down at the Kingsville Naval Auxiliary Air Station at 5:26 p.m. as a crowd of about 500 civilian and naval personnel watched. It was a beautiful, cool day.

King Mohammed, looking rested and in native dress, stepped from the plane to be greeted by Adm. Ralph S. Clarke, chief of naval air advanced training, Capt. William A. Sullivan, commander of the station, and Richard M. Kleberg Jr., head of the King Ranch and the King's host for the weekend.

Moroccan Anthem

The Corpus Christi Naval Air Station band struck up the Moroccan national anthem. Then King Mohammed inspected the Marine honor guard.

Immediately afterward the King was driven to the ranch by Kleberg.

Earlier, the King gave newsmen the slip to tour Dallas accompanied only by an aide and Secret Service men.

The King and his party of Moroccan and U.S. State Department officials originally planned to leave Dallas about 9:30 a.m.

However, a spokesman said the King wished to rest and postponed his trip until 3 p.m. But before 10 a.m. today, the King and his party left their quarters in a downtown hotel for further forays into the city.

There still was no comment from Mohammed or the high Moroccan executives with him on several key questions involving his nation which have occurred since he arrived in the United States last Monday.

Involved Fighting

These involved fighting in the tiny Spanish protectorate of Ifni which the Moroccan government reports has caused attacks on Moroccan territory, and rejection by France of an offer by Tunisia and Morocco to mediate the fighting between French forces and Algerian nationalists.

Wagner Sees Demo Victories, Won't Seek Presidency

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—New York's Mayor Robert Wagner today observed that Democratic victories in 1958 and 1960 wouldn't surprise him.

The Democratic executive arrived for Monday's opening of the 34th annual congress of the American Municipal Assn. Asked the possibility of his seeking the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination, the mayor told reporters: "I've just been re-elected mayor of New York and that is my main concern right now."

Turning from politics, the mayor told the San Francisco welcoming committee: "Take care of our Giants. We hate to lose them, but Horace Stoneham—president of the baseball club—wants to move to San Francisco and I couldn't stop him."

Car Chase Brings Arrest of Youths

Two teen-age youths were arrested about 3 a.m. Saturday on a charge of auto theft after a chase on North River Road in the St. Louis area, state police said.

Others have been arrested near Newberg in connection with the same charge involving cars stolen at Canby and Oregon City, they added. Further details were unavailable.

Misses Death

PLAINFIELD, Wis., Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Officers of three counties converged on the secluded farm of admitted killer-ghoul Edward Gein today after the discovery of another skeleton in a garbage pit raised the possibility of additional slayings.

Sheriff Frank Series of neighboring Adams County said that it was "very possible" a skeleton unearthed yesterday by Portage County Sheriff Herb Wanserski was that of a mysterious, money-flashing stranger who vanished with an Adams County acquaintance while hunting five years ago.

State Atty. Gen. Stewart H. Hoek placed in several charge of the investigation last Monday by Gov. Vernon Thomson, said this afternoon that the finding of another body "is not inconsistent" with some of the information drawn from Gein during extensive lie detector tests.

Cat Found, Linked With Lost Hunter

SANDPOINT, Idaho (U.P.)—Discovery of a black cat, last seen with a man who has been missing since Wednesday, spurred some 50 volunteers Saturday in their search of a rugged wooded area about 13 miles east of here.

The cat was seen following Floyd Couch, 58, when he left his Trestle Creek area home to go hunting. The animal showed up today, hungry, but otherwise apparently in good shape.

Searchers backtracked on the cat's prints and at night were still out looking with the aid of floodlights. The cat's tracks in the snow were followed about two miles up a hill, but no trace could be found of Couch.

The animal's prints were also spotted at other points, but disappeared on patches of hard, crusted snow.

Flu Prevents Adenauer Trip

BONN, Germany, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Influenza today forced West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer to put off his visit to London next week.

The 81-year-old chancellor was to have conferred with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan in preparation for the Dec. 15 NATO heads of governments conference in Paris.

He was also due to lunch with Queen Elizabeth II and address the British Parliament.

Adenauer has stayed at home for the past three days with a head cold. His office announced he had developed influenza and ruled out any possibility he would go to London before the NATO meeting.

Arab Liberation League Organized Within Russia

LONDON, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—A league of Arab students has been formed in Russia to promote Arab "national liberation," Radio Moscow said tonight.

A broadcast in the radio's Arabic service said the league was formed this month by students at Soviet Universities and institutes. They come from Egypt, Sudan, Syria, Iraq, Algeria, Tunisia, Morocco, Lebanon and Jordan.

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Admission of the Polish Catholic Church would be an unprecedented move by the council, which is composed entirely of Protestant and Eastern Orthodox groups.

Acceptance of the two denominations will be decided at the council's triennial general assembly opening tomorrow night.

The Polish National Catholic Church was formed in 1904. Its members broke away from the Roman Catholic Church in a dispute over parish administration and ownership and control of church property.

The Most Rev. Leon Grochowski, prime bishop of the denomination and its spiritual leader, made the application for membership in the council.

Admission of the two denominations by the week-long assembly here would give the council a roster of 32 constituent churches with nearly 38 million members.

The Polish National Catholic Church of America has 41 churches and some 100,000 members.

The council's General Board adopted a record budget of \$19,226,150 for 1958.
