

'Mark of Stark' Wins Club License Renewal

PORTLAND, Dec. 5 (U)—Nate Zusan, who calls himself the "Mark of Stark," today won City Council approval of renewal of his nightclub license at a stormy Council session.

The session was marked by an exchange between Portland Mayor Terry Schunk and Commissioner Stanley Earl.

Zusan, who operates The Desert Room nightclub on Stark Street in downtown Portland, told the Senate committee earlier this year that he was known as the "Mark of Stark" because he was an easy mark for people who are in trouble.

Earl opposed the license renewal on the ground that underworld figures have frequented the place.

But Schunk said he was not going to be a party to fighting in the underworld. He said "The Elkins boys have bragged they are out to put Mr. Zusan out of business."

This was a reference to Portland gambler Big Jim Elkins whose decision to talk touched off a year-long vice probe. Elkins accused Schunk of permitting gambling when he was sheriff.

Schunk's remarks angered Earl who demanded an apology from Schunk. "I'm not one of the Elkins boys and you know it."

Schunk refused to apologize, but said he did not consider Earl part of the underworld.

The commission voted 3-2 for renewal of the license. The matter now goes to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission, which has final say on granting the license.

Sheriffs, DAs Open Confabs At Portland

PORTLAND, Dec. 5 (U)—The Oregon State Sheriffs Assn. and the District Attorneys Assn. of Oregon convened here today for their annual conventions.

Dr. Homer Harris of the Oregon Medical School spoke before the prosecutors on the subject of qualifications of county coroners.

Tomorrow the group will hear a discussion on Oregon laws relating to district attorneys engaging in private practice. They also are to review salary schedules.

The sheriffs heard a talk by William H. Williams, agent in charge of the Portland FBI office, on bank robberies.

George Kane, director of the Bureau of Identification and Investigation for the state police, is to talk at tomorrow's session.

Amos B. Reed, new superintendent of the MacLaren School for Boys at Woodburn, addressed a joint luncheon meeting of the two organizations and of the Oregon Prison Assn.

Reed said he had abolished two forms of punishments used at the school, "squats" and "on the bones." Squats consisted of having a boy squat until he fell. The other punishment required the boy to crouch on knees and elbows for an extended period.

Bank Holdup Suspect Caught

VANCOUVER, Dec. 5 (CP)—A bank holdup suspect was flushed from the basement of a house in Vancouver's Kingsway district Thursday, minutes after the robbery of a branch of the Toronto Dominion Bank.

Police used a tear gas grenade to make the man surrender.

It was not immediately determined how much was stolen.

Squads of police converged on the bank. They followed the trail of the bandit to a house half a block away.

The bandit held up a bank teller with a toy pistol and snatched a revolver from the hands of a policeman as he ran from the scene.

Grain Growers Hear Plan for Cattle Feeding

PENDLETON, Dec. 5 (U)—Development of a state cattle feeding industry to aid Oregon's grain growers was proposed here today by Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

Addressing the opening session of the Oregon Wheat Growers League's annual meeting, Holmes said he plans to ask the state Department of Agriculture and Oregon State College to study cattle feeding possibilities.

He also suggested research on the reason for importation of 70 per cent of Oregon's pork supply.

Holmes said he is interested in bringing new industries to the state but does not want smelly stacks substituted for wheat fields. Rather, he said he favors a program for increasing use of the Oregon grain crop.

The governor also supported a continuation of the present federal grain export program.

Floyd Root, Wasco, vice president representing Oregon on the board of directors of the National Assn. of Wheat Growers, said the domestic wheat parity plan is winning favor among wheat producers. He told the league growing support for the plan was indicated at a field crops committee meeting last week at Omaha.

The Oregon Wheat League has supported the plan for several years.

Salk Work on Cells Linked To Cancer

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (U)—Dr. Jonas Salk, polio vaccine discoverer, is working on basic cell research that has a relationship to human cancer, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis said today.

The foundation said Salk's research will contribute to future work on cancer because of its basic nature—cell disease.

Spokesmen for the foundation said details of Dr. Salk's work would have to wait publication of the latter part of this month in a scientific journal, Science.

Dr. Salk called certain published reports of his work "grossly inaccurate." In fact, the foundation indicated, it was the premature reports that brought on their explanatory description of Dr. Salk's work.

The foundation said: "Indeed, work in any disease, if it is to be worth doing, must include research that is so basic in nature that it may be expected to benefit the progress of medicine on a broad scale."

In the course of his work on the Salk polio vaccine, Dr. Salk became convinced of man's resistance to diseases. Some cancer researchers have expressed hopes that some day they may be able to find the elements which would provide resistance to cancer.

Dr. Salk's paper will deal with certain techniques used in his laboratory "which may conceivably contribute to future work on cancer," the foundation said.

Buyer Says Check for Car Made to Beck

SEATTLE, Dec. 5 (U)—The purchaser of a used 1952 Cadillac around which Dave Beck's grand larceny trial revolves testified today he paid for the car with a \$1,900 check made out to Beck personally.

Martin B. Duffy, a beer truck driver, told the King County Superior Court jury he was under the impression the four-door sedan was owned by Beck.

Beck, 63-year-old president of the giant Teamsters Union, is accused of keeping the \$1,900 instead of turning it over to the Western Conference of Teamsters, the rightful owner.

Witnes Called

Duffy, called as one of 21 prosecution witnesses, was asked by Prosecutor Charles O. Carroll how he got the idea the Cadillac belonged to Beck.

"It was given to me by that fellow at Sunset Automotive that it was Mr. Dave Beck's car," Duffy replied. "I was satisfied it was Beck's car."

The luxury-type sedan had been put up for sale in January 1956 at Sunset Automotive Service, a garage operated by a close friend of Dave Beck Jr.

Duffy said he wrote out the check for the car on Jan. 30, 1956 in the office of Beck's secretary, Mrs. Marcella Guiry, and he never talked to Beck or saw him during the transaction.

Check Admitted

"I've never spoken to Mr. Beck in my life," said Duffy, a member of the Teamsters Union.

Duffy's check was admitted in evidence. It bore an indorsement stamp of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, but the indorsement appeared to have been scratched out.

In an opening statement to the jury yesterday, Dep. Prosecutor Charles Z. Smith said the state would prove Beck deposited Duffy's check in one of his own personal accounts and never reimbursed the Western Conference.

Search Renews For Climber

MT. RAINIER NATIONAL PARK, Wash., Dec. 5 (U)—Partly clearing weather today enabled ground parties to renew the search for the body of Lowell Linn, 23, inexperienced mountain climber missing since last Saturday on Mt. Rainier.

Chief Ranger Al Rose said all hope of finding Linn alive on the snow covered mountain has been given up. A blizzard swept the mountain last weekend and there are now 48 inches of snow in the search area between the 7,000-foot and 5,500-foot level. Linn was last seen at about the 7,000-foot level of the 14,400-foot mountain Saturday morning just before the blizzard struck.

A Coast Guard helicopter is standing by to go over the area if the low clouds and fog which have blanketed the mountain the last few days lifts.

Portland Jeweler Named To Oregon Liquor Board

Gov. Robert D. Holmes Thursday appointed Karl Greve Jr., Portland jeweler, to the state liquor control commission.

He succeeds Barney Lucas, Gearhart, for the Republican vacancy on the three-member commission. Lucas resigned, and the term runs until Jan. 1, 1960.

Greve was born in Portland Nov. 14, 1909, and attended the University of Oregon for three years. He has been in the jewelry business in Portland for 26 years.

He is a member of the Masonic lodge, Scottish Rite and Shrine, has held offices in the Red Cross and United Fund drives, and belongs to the Episcopal church.

The other members of the commission are Hugh Kirkpatrick, Lebanon, chairman; and Martin Buchanan, Milton-Freewater.

Trio Sought in Disappearance Of Young Girl

SYCAMORE, Ill., Dec. 5 (U)—Warrants were issued today for three men police said they want to question in connection with the disappearance of 7-year-old Maria Ridolph.

Police Chief William Hindenburg identified them as Irvin Eugene (Peanuts) Shott, 21, and Arlis Arch Davis, 22, both of Sycamore, and Laverne Rosenthal of Shannon, a northwest Illinois community.

Hindenburg said Shott and Davis left for Florida Tuesday, the day Maria was reported missing. The chief said a friend of the two men told him the trip had been planned for some time.

Seen Recently

Hindenburg said Rosenthal was reported seen recently in DeKalb County, but he did not disclose the circumstances that brought Rosenthal into the investigation.

Rosenthal, located in DeKalb County, is 50 miles west of Chicago.

Meanwhile, some 300 volunteers continued a search today for little Maria or some clue to her disappearance.

"Nothing, not a thing at all was turned up," Hindenburg said.

"We're not going to give up until the girl is found," he added.

A posse estimated at 500 persons organized for another all-night search of the countryside.

Playing With Friend

The child was last seen playing with a friend, Cathie Sigman, 8, when a man approached and offered both a ride.

Cathie ran home to get her mittens. When she returned Maria was gone.

The neighbor girl told police the man called himself "Johnny."

Commies Plan Civil Baptism For Atheists

VIZILLE, France, Dec. 5 (U)—The Communist Municipal Council of Vizille has decided to provide "civil baptisms" for atheists.

Mayor Gustave Fournier introduced the resolution and it was approved unanimously. It provides that the mayor shall sign the baptism certificate and that sponsors may be named.

In the religious ceremony, the godparents agree to take over the raising of the children and see that they are educated as Christians if the parents die.

In the Communist baptism, the parents place their children under the protection of republican equality. The sponsors agree to take over in case of death of the parents and raise the child "in the cult of the union and of human brotherhood."

Vizille is a village of 5,000 in the mountainous Haute Savoie Department of east-central France.

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Ike Caravan Gives Lift to Serviceman

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Dec. 5 (U)—With a lift for a hitch-hiking serviceman, President Eisenhower motored up from Washington on ice-spotted highways today for a long week-end of continued recuperation from a mild stroke.

Five or six inches of snow mantled Eisenhower's 500-acre country estate. But roads were almost clear, except for a few stretches of slush and ice, and the 2½ hour trip was uneventful.

A few miles north of Frederick, Md., the President spotted a thumb-wagging chap in uniform and ordered that he be picked up by one of the White House cars. It turned out to be Airman 2C Jerry Beswick, on his way from his home at Brandywine, Md., to the Syracuse, N.Y., Air Force base.

Eisenhower left the White House at 1:45 p.m. EST, shortly after lunch, and entered the gate of his farm at 3:59. Mrs. Eisenhower came later, after attending a luncheon of a naval officers' wives club.

Berry Farmer Taken by Death

Abe Hickman, 71, a berry farmer for the past 20 years at 1812 Baxter Rd. SE, died unexpectedly Thursday night at his residence, apparently of a stroke.

Hickman was born in Cahutta, Ga., April 10, 1886, and moved to Oregon about 49 years ago.

He married Elma Wiley in 1912 while stationed at the Vancouver Barracks, Vancouver, Wash.

Hickman was employed by Southern Pacific Railroad Co. in Ashland, Ore., for several years before moving to Salem in 1937.

For the past 20 years he has grown berries on his small farm south of Salem, except for the past two years when he retired.

He was a member of the Liberty Christian Church.

Survivors besides his widow are daughters, Mrs. Bessie Hawks, Kingston, Idaho, Mrs. Versa McCarthy, Portland, and Mrs. Shirley Enser, El Cajon, Calif.; sons, Melvin Hickman and John Hickman, both Kellog, Idaho, Howard Hickman, Wenatchee, Wash.; another son, Russel Hickman, died of an illness aboard a Navy ship during World War II.

Services will be Monday at 1:30 p.m. at Clough-Barrick Chapel. Interment will be in Belcrest Memorial Park.

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HONOLULU, Dec. 5 (U)—The crippled Greek freighter Margarita Chandris, escorted by a Coast Guard cutter, was making its way slowly toward Honolulu today after narrowly escaping disaster in Hurricane Nina.

The freighter has 31 men aboard. The cutter Winnebago, which came alongside 500 miles from Honolulu, reported 30-knot winds were blowing up 20-foot seas.

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Baldock Freeway Pact Let

PORTLAND, Dec. 5 (U)—Kuckenberg Construction Co., Portland, won the contract here today to grade 2.7 miles of Baldock Freeway extension into southward Portland at a meeting of the State Highway Commission. It offered a bid of \$1,142,972.

The board also awarded contracts totalling \$4,005,190 for 18 highway construction projects.

In other action the commission: Appointed P. M. Stephenson, bridge engineer for the state Highway Department, as assistant state highway engineer effective Jan. 1. He succeeds W. W. Stiffler who is retiring.

Authorized Installation of Receiving Unit at Weather Bureau Station

Authorized installation of a receiving unit at the Weather Bureau station so road reports and weather conditions can be transmitted to the public by newspapers, radio and television.

Authorized installation of a bronze marker at Neahkahnie Mountain to commemorate the legislative action in the governorship of Oswald West which placed beach areas along the coast under permanent public ownership.

Approved immediate start on a survey of a westside bypass at Klamath Falls.

Authorized for early start highway improvement in the Roberts Mountain section of the relocated Pacific Highway in Douglas County. The project will cost an estimated \$450,000.

Decided to prohibit parking on both sides of the Highway in the Government Camp area of Mount Hood.

Public Hearings Set

Set public hearings at Grants Pass and Rogue River Dec. 18 on proposed construction projects on the Redwood Highway interchange and on the Pacific Highway in the vicinity of Grants Pass.

Tomorrow the commission will hear a number of delegations including the "Housewives for 42" who came to Portland in a caravan of five busses today to continue their campaign for improvement of State Highway 42 between Coquille and Roseburg.
