Earth Mover, Sedan Crash; Pair Killed

ROBERTS, Idaho, Dec. 7 (AP)—A 60-ton earth mover and a sedan collided near this southeastern Idaho community this afternoon.

A Dillon, Mont., mother and her 14-year-old son were killed.

State Police Lt. Ervin Dunn said Mrs. Ada Dieterie, 36, and William, 14, were riding in an auto driven by the father, F. Lewis Dieterie, and carrying a daughter, Linda, 12.

The father and daughter were hospitalized in Idaho Falls and were reported in fairly good condition.

Jefferson County Coroner Norman Hall said an inquest will be called.

The Dieteries were returning to Dillon after a trip to Idaho Falls. They had intended to do some church work, but church buildings were closed.

Boilermaker, 40, Wants to Wed Girl, 17

GREENOCK, Scotland, Dec. 7 (AP)—A 40-year-old Scottish boilermaker today filed notice of intention to marry a 17-year-old runaway Dutch girl who once was the pen pal of his eldest daughter.

A big question mark hung over the wedding plans of widower John Bell and Arianette Gijbertha den Besten, who traveled here from Holland last month in defiance of her parents.

Dutch consular authorities reportedly asked the home office in London to withhold an extension of Miss Besten's British visa, which expires Dec. 13. The earliest date the marriage can take place under Scottish law is Dec. 16.

"I am madly in love with John," the tall, fair-haired Dutch girl told a reporter in this Clyde-side resort. "I am sure I will get an extension to my visa and that everything will turn out right in the end."

Greenock registrar Alexander Kirkpatrick said that if British officials declined to extend Miss Besten's visa, the marriage will not take place.

Miss Besten, whose home is at Lengerak in South Holland, first met Bell through her pen pal friendship with his 17-year-old daughter Jean.

Bell, Jean and his other daughter, June, 9, spent a holiday at the Langerak farm last summer. Apparently Jean disapproves of the match. Miss Besten indicated that she and Jean no longer speak to each other.

Guests Bound; Bandits Rob Store Leader

MARION, Ind., Dec. 7 (AP)—A store manager's wife and two guests said they were bound and held at gunpoint last night while a second gunman forced the manager to drive to the store and open the safe.

Ted Edwards, manager of Pearson's furniture store for 19 years, told police two men forced their way into his home four miles north of Marion about 9:30 p.m. One of them, he said, forced him to drive to downtown Marion to open the safe and get "several hundred dollars."

Edwards said the second gunman stayed behind and watched "The Wolf Man," a murder mystery show on television while Mrs. Edwards and the guests lay on the floor, their hands and feet tied, for two hours. The guests were Mrs. Edwards' brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Foster, Washington Court House, Ohio.

Edwards reported the men held raincoats to their faces when they entered and ordered all lights out, except for the TV. When they left in Edwards' car he said they warned the group, "You tell the right story or we'll be back."

"It doesn't make any difference to me," Edwards said one of the gunmen told him, "I'm wanted for murder already."

Pollis said he freed himself about half an hour later and called Sheriff Cary Myers.

While the safe was being opened in the store, the Community Players were on stage in the YMCA Community Memorial Building six blocks away in "The Desperate Hours." The play, a recent Broadway hit, is about an Irida family held hostage in their own home by gunmen.

The sheriff said he hasn't found Edwards' car nor the one in which the gunmen arrived.

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Ike Gets Report on 'Dudnik'

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Dec. 7 (AP)—President Eisenhower received by special courier today a short, preliminary report from the Pentagon on why the Vanguard satellite launcher blew up.

The full report the chief executive has demanded is expected next week, after Eisenhower returns to the White House.

Responding to a question, White House press secretary James C. Hagerty said he had heard no mention of the word "sabotage."

Hagerty said the initial report on what he termed "the accident of yesterday" contained little more information than was disclosed yesterday. Officials of the Vanguard control center in Washington said then the satellite launching rocket failed because of lack of thrust in the first of its three stages.

'Can't Make Public' The preliminary report, Hagerty said, did contain one or two things I can't make public for security reasons. He said they involved "some of the material within the rockets or equipment in the rocket."

Asked whether the President is scheduling any kind of meeting with satellite advisers next week, Hagerty told newsmen, "No, right now we are waiting for a full report which we will look at next week."

Hagerty said he will have to wait and see whether this report will be made public.

It was another rainy, drab day in Gettysburg and Eisenhower stuck close to the fireside at his country home.

He spent some 45 minutes on White House business with Hagerty this morning, then turned once more to his easel and paints on the glass-enclosed back porch.

Yesterday Eisenhower was busy on a portrait of a granddaughter, Barbara Anne, Hagerty was telling what the subject was today because it "is something that I believe he is making for a Christmas present."

The President usually gives reproductions of one of his paintings to friends and members of the White House staff at Christmas time.

It looks now as though Eisenhower will remain here through Monday, Hagerty said his best guess is that the President will return to Washington late Monday or early Tuesday.

Spanish Ships Near Morocco Bring Protest

RABAT, Morocco, Dec. 7 (AP)—The Moroccan government today ordered its ambassador in Madrid to protest against the presence in Moroccan territorial waters of eight Spanish warships.

The flotilla appeared off the port of Agadir early today. Rumors in that city said Spanish troops intended to land to march to the relief of the Spanish garrison surrounded in Sidi Ifni, capital of Ifni, a Spanish-ruled enclave besieged by insurgents.

There was no official confirmation of the report that Spain intended to land troops at Agadir. The Moroccan order to protest was issued after the second special Cabinet meeting of today. A communiqué also ordered the Foreign Ministry to inform all diplomats in Rabat of the situation of Agadir.

It has been difficult for the Spaniards to reinforce the Ifni garrison, 40 miles south, because that revolted enclave has no harbor. Agadir, on the contrary has a large harbor capable of receiving large ocean liners.

Spain announced today its forces have withdrawn from the villages of Tiliouine and Syboulia in the southeast corner of the 741-square-mile enclave, which the rebels have claimed to have under siege for almost two weeks.

More Moroccan sources claim residents of Ifni are in revolt against Spanish occupation forces. Spanish officials charge the attack was made by Moroccan irregular forces armed bands who roam outlying sections of Morocco out of control of King Mohammed V.

Roseburg Shoppers Invited to Copy Bible in Longhand

ROSEBURG, Dec. 7 (AP)—The Seventh-day Adventist Church here plans to invite Roseburg shoppers to help copy part of the Bible in longhand.

W. R. Riston, pastor of the church, said the four Gospels will be copied at a table set up in a store here to promote Bible reading during the Christmas season.

The copy will be bound and presented to the Douglas County Library.

Brother Lion Acquitted by Club Friends

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Dec. 7 (AP)—With a jury of fellow Lions Club members sitting in judgment and a Lion acting as defense counsel, Justice of the Peace Earl J. McClellan of Utica was acquitted this week in Municipal Court of a reckless driving charge.

McClellan was arrested last July 31 by Patrolman Maurice Maes of Mount Clemens. Maes testified the justice had been drinking and had led him on a 60-mile-an-hour chase through city streets, swerving back and forth and forcing other cars to the curb.

McClellan denied the accusation. The case was scheduled for trial Dec. 10, but was advanced and tried Thursday before Municipal Judge Malcolm Trombley.

The constable, who normally selects the jury, was out of town, so the jury was drawn by Lorre Martell, Macomb County's chief process server and a Lion's Club member. The jury of six included four former presidents of the Mount Clemens Lions Club, which McClellan also headed at one time. The other two were club members.

The defense attorney was Ivan A. Johnston, also a past Lions Club president.

Crash Fatal To 6 Persons

SEBRING, Fla., Dec. 7 (AP)—Six persons perished and three were injured tonight in a head-on collision of two automobiles on U.S. 27, about 25 miles south of Sebring.

Highlands County Sheriff Broward Coker called the crash "the worst I've ever investigated."

The dead were listed as: James A. Carr Jr., 24, of Tampa, Mrs. Carr, Two infants about nine and 18 months old, found clasped in Mrs. Carr's arms. Neither was at once identified.

L. Wayne Pike, 21, of South Miami, a banker, Marion G. Threkheld, 25, of Miami, a Department of Agriculture employee.

Three children found in the auto in which the Carrs were riding were hospitalized.

Investigators said it appeared Threkheld was riding alone in his car southbound when the crash occurred.

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
