The Vikes, who will be shooting for their fourth win in a row, are up against a team which also has a winning streak going. Beaverton has won its only two games thus far, downing Oregon City 66-51 and turning back Albany 71-45.

Play Opens In Yawama

In their pre-league games this season the teams have strongly indicated the rebuilding jobs facing every coach in the circuit. Defending champion Dayton has lost three in a row, two to Woodburn and one to Canby. Sheridan has also lost three, two to Taft, one to Sandy. Sherwood has lost twice to North Marion. Banks has been downed by Vernonia twice. Yamhill finished second best to Corbett and Jesuit. Philomath has dropped its first two starts and Amity has lost to Gaston.

Only Salem Academy and Willamina have been able to win pre-league contests. The Crusaders beat Gervais but lost twice to Serra Catholic. Willamina beat Oakland but lost to Nestucca and Central HI.

In view of the rebuilding, this season's race should be a wide-open sort of thing.

Returning breadwinners of last season are scarce throughout the circuit. Bob Funk's Salem Academy boasts such as Dave Zweigart, Larry Dyck and Dick Voth who scored 144, 132 and 64 points, respectively, last season. But the Crusaders have lost Larry Merk (180) and Tom Reimer (160).

Ben Schaad's Dayton lost big Paul Budke (244), Bill Hedgecock (176), Cecil Smith (105) and Class A-2 second team All-Stater Don Nuttbrock (105), and has back only Dick Vest (131) and Lynn Walther (56).

Chief Star Held to 17

Thriller Decided In Final Moments

Beautiful defensive work by Dave Gambee and Gary Goble held Seattle's great Elgin Baylor to 17 points here tonight as the Oregon State Beavers upset the Chieftains 63-55.

The Beavers won it in a wild windup to what otherwise had been a good, tough, but not particularly thrilling ball game.

Baylor showed his all-around ability by playing an excellent floor game, but it wasn't one of his finer nights in the scoring department. Gambee, and then Goble after Big Dave came in danger of fouling out, kept the ball away from the 6-4 "Rabbit" or forced him to pass off.

The leaping All-America candidate also picked up three fouls in the first 18 minutes of the ball game. That forced him to play it carefully, and although he never did foul out, his effectiveness on the boards and on defense was cut down.

At that, he picked off 12 rebounds to tie with the Beaver's own 6-0 jumping jack, Ken Nanson, for honors in that department. However, the Rabbit hit on only five out of 19 field goal attempts and missed five out of 12 free throws, three of them in the last two minutes when the Chieftains were only three points behind.

Gambee, in addition to doing a whale of a defensive job, was high point man for the evening with 18. Lee Harman and Nanson had 16 and 14, respectively.

Oregon State had a 32-28 half-time lead and built it to 36-30 early in the second half, before a brief Seattle rally pulled them ahead 37-36. From that point, the lead saw-sawed back and forth until the

Pin Tourney Ends on TV

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Don Carter of St. Louis threatened today to turn the first World's Invitational Bowling Tournament into a rout.

Carter, 31, and winner of three all-star bowling championships, won two matches today. He rolled a 854 four-game series, including a 288 game, both high for the meet.

After 40 of the scheduled 64 games, Carter held a 8.16 Petersen point lead on the runner-up, with a total of 201.16 points.

The world bowling meet will end Friday night, replacing the usual evening boxing match on national TV and radio.

Ed Lubanski of Detroit, who split a pair of matches today, was second in the men's division with 193 points, and Carter's teammate, Tom Hennessey, third with 190.12.

In the women's division, both Mrs. Marion Ladewig, the 43-year-old Grand Rapids, Mich., grandmother, and Dee Wroblewski, of Detroit, moved further ahead of the field.

After 20 games of a scheduled 32, Mrs. Ladewig, six-time all-star winner, has 98.13 points, 3.20 points ahead of Miss Wroblewski.

Miss Wroblewski lost her first match of the day to Dottie Crouch of Los Angeles, but defeated Gladys Dempsey, Detroit.

Mrs. Ladewig's 266 game and 487 series are high for the women in the finals.
