

Ike Readies Record \$74 Billion Budget

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—President Eisenhower held a series of top-level conferences today preparatory to wrapping up the new federal budget—reportedly a 74-billion-dollar package—for presentation to Congress.

James C. Hagerty, the President's press secretary, announced late in the day that the budget is not yet in its final form, although the White House is nearly through with it.

Under questioning, Hagerty said the huge new missile program is one item still under discussion.

The President saw Secretary of Defense McElroy, Dep. Secretary Quarles and Secretary of State Dulles this afternoon. He also conferred with Sherman Adams and other White House aides. Hagerty said the President discussed both the budget and his State of the Union message with the Pentagon people but that he didn't know what was taken up when Dulles arrived later.

Included on the list are a number of perennially best-dressed women—Mrs. William Paley, wife of the board chairman of the Columbia Broadcasting System; the Duchess of Windsor; Countess Mona Von Bismarck, the former Mrs. Harrison Williams.

Fishing Boat Sinks; 2 Men Said Rescued

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 2 (AP)—The fishing vessel Rose and Joe sank in the Gulf of Mexico about 70 miles north of the Yucatan Peninsula today. But the Coast Guard said another fishing boat rescued the two crewmen.

A Coast Guard spokesman said the Rose and Joe listed its home port as Savannah, Ga., but was working for the Tingle Shrimp Co. of Tampa, Fla.

The Coast Guard said the Sunbeam fishing vessel reported all survivors rescued.

The vessel sent out a distress signal at 10:25 a.m. and sank a short time later, the Coast Guard said. The Coast Guard listed the Rose and Joe's captain as James Singleton. His home address was not known.

Meanwhile, planes and cutters searched another area in the Gulf, northwest of Oregon, Mexico, for the fishing boat Captain Rex. The Captain Rex was reported sinking last night.

The Coast Guard said it had little information on the vessel except for a brief emergency message reporting the trouble which was relayed over marine radio.

If no trace of the vessel is found today, a Coast Guard plane will resume the search tomorrow morning, the Coast Guard said.

Nine Killed in 2-Car Crash

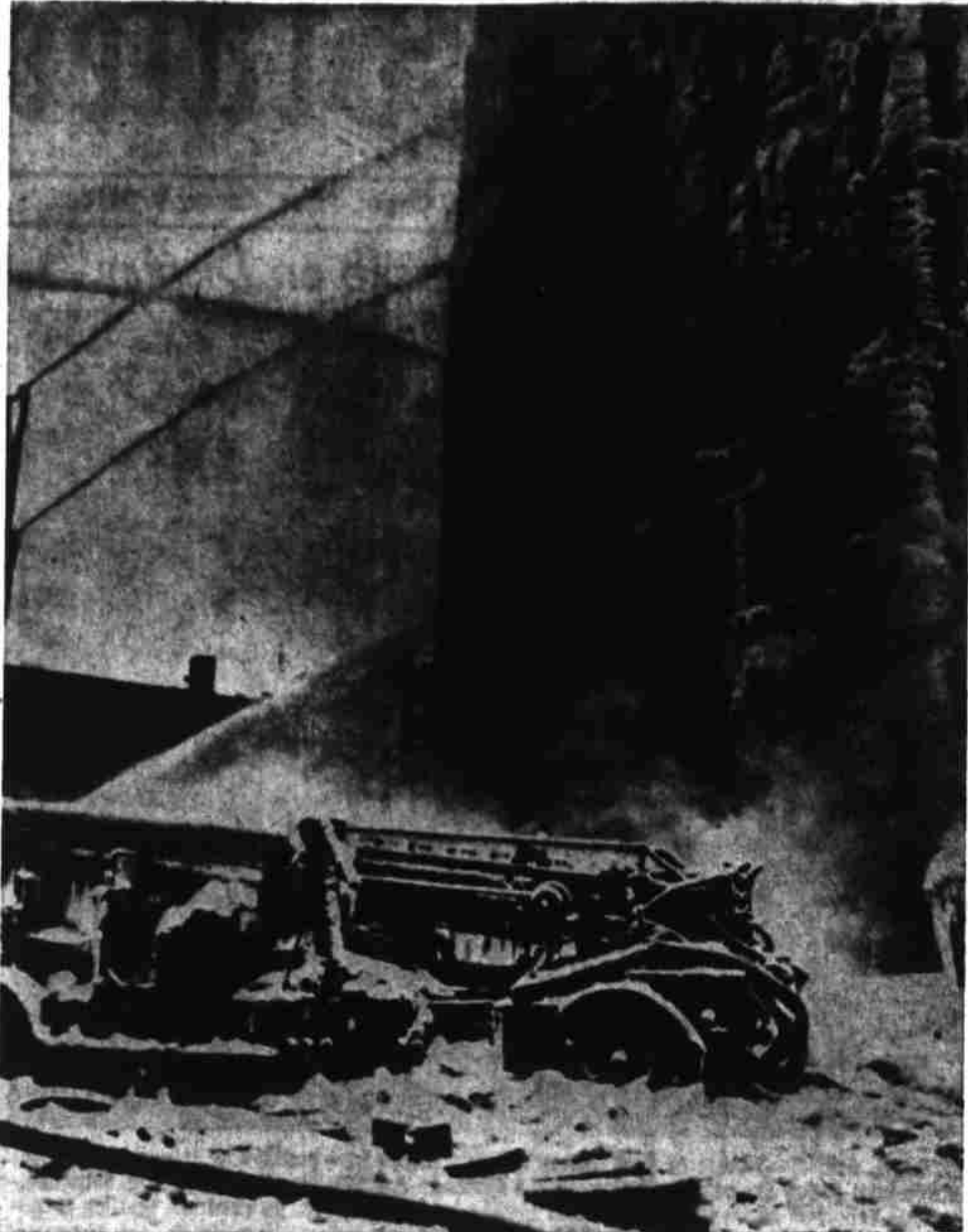
EUREKA, S.D., Jan. 2 (AP)—Two cars slammed together on a moonlit highway shortly before midnight last night, killing nine persons including six members of a farm family.

The head-on collision, 3 1/2 miles west of this north central South Dakota community on State Highway 16, left the two wrecked machines locked together on the road shoulder in zero weather.

Killed were: Walter Beck, 45, his wife, 42, Eureka farm residents, and four of their seven children, Harold, 18, Ruby, 11, Priscilla, 3, and Doris, 2, who were returning home from a New Year's Day visit.

Marvin Neuharth, 18, driver of the other car, and two passengers, Larry Wiedmer, 15, and Clyde Klein, 16, all of Eureka, were injured in the crash.

Science Envoy Plans Revived

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The United States may soon send perhaps a dozen science diplomats to posts around the world to help keep closer tabs on foreign scientific advances and promote the flow of information.

State Department officials said their science attaché program, lifeless from lack of funds and personnel since 1955, would be revived with a \$200,000 appropriation under President Eisenhower's proposed new budget.

5 Girls Flee Hillcrest, One Apprehended

Five inmates ranging in age from 14 to 17 ran away from Hillcrest Girls School Thursday night by forcing a lock and fleeing down a fire escape, school officials said.

One of the girls, 15, was apprehended by state police two hours later on a tip from a nearby resident who became suspicious after the girls asked to make a phone call. The others eluded capture with the help of thick fog, officers said.

The girls, including three Indians, fled about 8:15 p.m. from the second-story day room of the administration building, where they had been watching television.

In a break believed well planned, the girls made the dash for freedom under the eye of a house mother whom they had previously tried to draw away from the scene with false cries about smelling smoke, reported officials.

School Supt. Marjorie McBride said the girls apparently jumped in advance the lock on a window leading to the fire escape.

Miss McBride said three of the group were new inmates, and the others returnees, one of whom had given considerable trouble on previous occasions.

Sheriff's Lt. Tom Isbell said the missing girl is mentally retarded and has a speech defect but can call out loudly enough to be heard.

Albanians Silent on Plane Crew

LONDON, Jan. 2 (AP)—British officials today vainly sought information concerning the future of a cargo airliner with a crew of six Britons forced down in Communist Albania by Red jet fighters.

The plane, a Skymaster DC4, was held at the coastal town of Vlone, formerly a Nazi U-boat port and now reported to be a Russian submarine base ringed by fighter airfields.

Only fragmentary reports have filtered through from this sensitive tip of the Iron Curtain since Tirana radio announced Wednesday night that the plane was forced down for violating "Albanian air space."

The plane carried a crew of six, including a hostess. There were no passengers.

Receives Information

The foreign office said it had received information from the French legation in Tirana that the crew was "safe and well."

Officials of Independent Air Travel, Ltd., the British company owning the plane, said attempts to reach the crew by long distance telephone had failed.

The plane left Duesseldorf, West Germany, the day before New Year's for Singapore with a cargo of machinery including aircraft spare parts.

A French Foreign Ministry spokesman said in Paris that France's minister to Albania, Louis Keller, had protested to Albanian authorities and had started negotiations for a quick settlement of the incident.

No Diplomats

Britain has had no diplomatic representation in Albania since 1946.

Britain and Albania quarreled in 1946 when two British destroyers were mined in the Corfu channel. Albania has refused to recognize a Hague court ruling awarding Britain compensation for damage and loss of life.

Father, Four Children Die In House Fire

OKEECHOBEE, Fla., Jan. 2 (AP)—A young father and his four children were burned to death tonight in a fire which destroyed their two-story frame house.

The cause of the blaze was not determined immediately.

Firemen did not receive the alarm until the fire was well under way. They did not know anyone was in the house until the flames were put out and the ruins were investigated.

The dead are J. W. Shoffner, about 30, and Mary, 5, Randy, 4, Jerry, 2, and Gary, 6 months old. Shoffner's wife was absent at the time of the fire. She could not be located immediately.

Two other Shoffner children are away visiting a grandmother in South Carolina.

Firemen reported the charred bodies of Mary and Jerry were found in the kitchen. Shoffner, Randy and Gary were found in a bedroom.

A coroner's jury was impaneled to investigate the blaze.
