

Army's Missile Leader to Retire; Raps U. S. System

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—Lt. Gen. James M. Gavin, the Army's missile chief, said tonight he plans to retire from the Army because "I can contribute more to national defense" outside than in.

"I haven't been able to get much done, the system being what it is," Gavin told a reporter. He declined to explain what he meant by this, saying he hopes to leave the Army "with some good will."

There were conflicting reports that Gavin had asked retirement because he advocated abolishment of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Gavin, head of the Army research and development, recently told the Senate Preparedness subcommittee investigating the missile program that the Joint Chiefs of Staff ought to be abolished and a new command setup put into effect to eliminate rivalry among the services.

Gavin, a famed paratrooper who is now 50, denied that his decision to quit was prompted by opposition to his suggestion before the Senate subcommittee. He said he was mulling over retirement before then.

Egypt Gives Boot to Yank For 'Threat'

CAIRO, Jan. 4 (AP)—The Egyptian government confirmed today it expelled an American shipping pilot and charged that he posed a threat to the operation of the Suez Canal.

An official statement issued by Saad Afra, director of the Egyptian Information Department, said: "The Egyptian government has canceled the residence permit of Raphael Patrick Kenel. The action was taken after exposing that he was exerting all efforts in arousing discontent as well as disobedience to the directives and instructions of the Suez Authority among other employees."

Laws 'Disregarded'

The statement said the pilot "disregarded the laws of the country by holding meetings of canal pilots and the employees union without previous consent of the authority, thus violating its statutes."

"His intention," the statement charged, "was to obstruct the process of navigation in the Suez Canal, but Egyptian employees refused absolutely to come under his influence."

Kenel, of the Bronx, N.Y., said this week in Rome he was ousted from Egypt last week after Egyptian police forced him to leave his Ismailia home barefooted.

Kenel said he was given no explanation for the action and so far as he knew there could be only two reasons. He said he had been elected to the 11-member committee of the Suez Canal Employees Syndicate, which opposes pay reductions he said the Egyptian government's Suez Authority is trying to impose.

Hope to Put Fear

"Perhaps by kicking me out, they hoped to put fear into the Egyptian members of the syndicate board," he said.

Kenel also said that some time ago he wrote a letter to the editor of the Egyptian Gazette "protesting against the hate America campaign in Egypt." He said the letter was never published.

Tumble Fatal To Polio Victim

WOBURN, Mass., Jan. 4 (AP)—Six-year-old Paul Buonanno, a polio victim, died of a fractured skull Friday a few hours before he was scheduled to pose for Woburn's official March of Dimes poster.

Paul, stricken two years ago, toppled down the front steps of his home yesterday while practicing walking with new leg braces.

Snow Yields Bodies of Two

PONTE DI LEGNO, Italy, Jan. 4 (AP)—The bodies of Italian diving champion Maria Luisa Levati, 23, and her fiancé were found buried under snow today, police said.

Police said Miss Levati and her 31-year-old fiancé, Antonio Castoldi, were buried by an avalanche while skiing on the Pizzo dei Tre Signori peak on Dec. 30.

House Burns, But Valuable Fiddle Saved

DALLAS, Jan. 4 (AP)—Eighty-one year old Ben C. Young, who has won numerous old-timers' fiddling contests across the country, stood crestfallen in front of his blazing rooming house here today.

Inside the house was the case containing his beloved fiddle.

"My fiddle is almost a part of me," he told Battalion Fire Chief E. D. Rodgers. "I have played a fiddle all my life — always by ear. Every Tuesday night we play at the city park. Mostly it's old folks and we play nothing but square dance break downs and waltzes — none of this rock 'n' roll stuff."

When firemen were able to enter the blackened ruins of the rooming house they found his charred violin case and brought it to him.

He opened it up and found the fiddle apparently undamaged.

Beaming, he told the firemen "this fiddle is a German model of a real Stradivarius. Twice I have been offered \$500 for it but as I said, it is a part of me. It has a most beautiful tone."

East Germany Fights Strikes

BERLIN, Jan. 4 (AP)—A West Berlin newspaper said tonight a series of strikes hit Communist East Germany recently.

The Telegraf said the strikes involved factories in Magdeburg, Wildau and East Berlin and a rail yard in East Berlin.

Disaffection with wage cuts, low Christmas bonuses, and new restrictions on travel to Allied-occupied West Berlin were given as reasons for the walkouts.

No source was given for the newspaper's reports.

Copter Landing Pad Added Near Home of Nixon

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—The Defense Department said today a helicopter landing pad has been built near Vice President Nixon's home as part of "Operation Alert."

This is the program for evacuating officials to emergency headquarters in the event of an enemy attack.

Although the department said the pad in northwest Washington is operational and ready for use, it has not been used.

Helicopters of the Army, Marine Corps and Air Force are used in the annual operation alert tests and are assigned, on rotating basis, to stand by for emergency use.

Air Force helicopters also are assigned for use by President Eisenhower in getting from the White House to the airport when traffic conditions otherwise would delay an automobile trip.

Three party leaders are top contenders in an election today for State Democratic Central Committee chairman, Marion County Chairman Cornelius C. Bateson said Saturday.

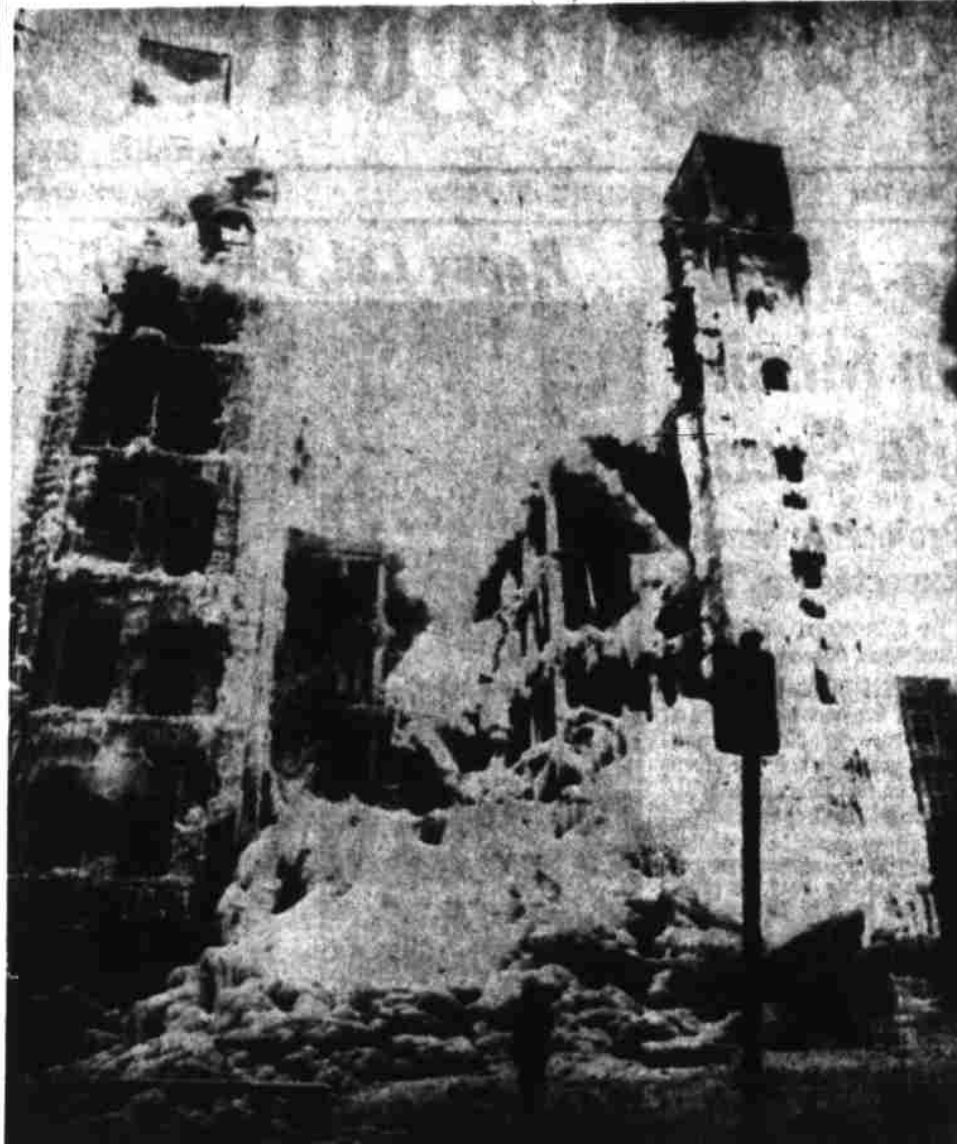
They are Richard A. Groener, Clackamas County chairman, Leon S. Davis, Washington County chairman, and Dave Epps of Sweet Home.

Christian Science Monitor Proved Critics Were Wrong

Editor's Note — Boston's famed Christian Science Monitor was founded 50 years ago amidst predictions of failure for the novel journalistic venture. Confounding such prophets, the Monitor has flourished exceedingly—and with-out compromise of its tenets.

BOSTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—When Paul S. Deland quit his newspaper to join the newly founded Christian Science Monitor, his managing editor told him he was being silly.

"That thing," said he, "won't last six months. I'll hold your job for you."

This was half a century ago. Today Deland, who has been with "that thing" since its first issue of 1908, is the Monitor's associate editor and one of the men who make the remarkable enterprise hum.

People who predicted failure for the church-owned daily in its cradle days—and several publishers found their crystal ball to have been singularly opaque.

Celebrating its golden anniversary today, the flourishing Monitor reaches 120 countries with a circulation of about 180,000. And it has built this far-flung readership without local mass circulation in Boston itself—90 per cent of it being outside. In the profession, this is considered an unusual feat indeed.

Monitors are delivered by camel in African wastes, dog sleds in snowbound lands and native runners in tropic isles. In some remote localities readers pay up to \$400 for airmail annual subscriptions. (The regular rate is \$18.)

Throughout its career, the Monitor has resolutely eschewed sensationalism, flamboyance, and advertising from sources it declines on principle — tobacco, liquor, medicinal remedies.

Winner of 89 national and international awards and tributes extending to all phases of its operation, the Monitor is presided over by Edwin D. Canham, 57, its graying, friendly-eyed editor, who himself holds a dozen awards for

And, touching on another remarkable aspect of the Monitor's operations, Canham added: "The relationship the Monitor has always had with most of its readers — it reaches them after they have already had the spot news — is now the relationship of nearly all newspapers, though all have not yet realized it. Thus we feel we have done some useful pioneering."

The Monitor was founded by Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy who—as far back as 1883—declared that a "newspaper edited and published by the Christian Scientists has become a necessity." Later she added: "Through a paper of our own we shall be able to reach many homes with healing, purifying thought."

Yet while it is one of the few daily newspapers owned by a church, its principal aim is not devotional nor church membership work. And many of its employees are non-Scientists.

Reflecting its religious persuasion, the Monitor prints no regular obituaries — though it does report deaths of prominent persons in accordance with the news value of the event. It prefers to use the phrase "passed on" for "died."

It covers the medical field sparsely, treats crime news with restraint and never carries "cheesecake pictures" — showing pretty girls in alluring poses. It has no society pages.

Five Killed in Fiery Crash

ATLANTA, Tex., Jan. 4 (AP)—Five youths were killed early today in a head-on crash in which three died in a burning car, another was thrown free and a fifth crushed behind the steering wheel of his auto.

The cars met on U.S. 59, 2½ miles north of Atlanta, in north-east Texas about 2:30 a.m.

Highway Patrolman Bill Dowd said a preliminary investigation indicated the car in which the three were riding was traveling north on the wrong side of the highway.

Beirut Blast Fatal to Three

BEIRUT, Lebanon, Jan. 4 (AP)—An explosion rocked an apartment house today, killing three persons including a 9-year-old boy.

The apartment house was owned by Nabih Mimeh, brother of a Syrian army officer accused in Damascus of plotting with the United States to overthrow the Syrian regime.

The brother, Capt. Mahmoud Nimeh, escaped from jail in Damascus shortly before his trial opened last month and is being tried in absentia with a number of Syrian army officers on a charge of plotting with U.S. Embassy officials in Damascus to change the regime. The United States has denied the plot charge.

Farm Officials to Discuss Mouse Outbreak in State

BEND, Jan. 4 (AP)—Ways to control the mouse outbreak in Oregon will be discussed at a meeting of farm officials from seven counties Jan. 9.

Most of the discussion will be on ways of getting and using federal aid, said James McAllister, Deschutes County extension agent.

The outbreak of mice is estimated to have caused farm crop losses of five million dollars in Central and Southern Oregon.

Representatives are expected at the meeting here from Klamath, Lake, Harney, Wasco, Crook, Jefferson and Deschutes counties.

Ride Only Offered To Nixon, AF Says

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—The Air Force said today it has offered Vice President Nixon a ride in a special jet tanker plane but hasn't assigned the swift craft to Nixon.

A formal statement was issued a few hours after Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) wired Secretary of Defense McElroy protesting against what the senator called conversion of a "vitally needed Boeing KC135 jet tanker into a taxi" for Nixon.

The Air Force said: "Considerable misunderstanding has resulted from a report that an Air Force KC135 has been assigned to Vice President Nixon. This report is entirely without fact."

Winter Holds East; Storm Hits Southeast

Cold air clung to the East Saturday and a storm whipped into New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle.

Despite widespread sunshine, temperatures in the daytime ranged from the 30s in Georgia to the teens farther north and to a few degrees above zero at Burlington, Vt., and Caribou, Maine.

New York State had its coldest weather in a year. Low readings early in the day included -24 at Old Forge and Tendara in the Adirondacks, -17 at Boonville, -16 at Lowville, -8 at Olean and Utica, and zero at Albany.

The central states also had a bright morning, but the cold began to abate. Thermometers registered lows of -10 at Rockford, Ill., and Lone Rock, Wis., -6 at Grand Rapids, Mich., and Madison, Wis., and -1 in Milwaukee.

The storm in the Southwest covered the area with heavy snow, sleet rain and fog. Snow piled up eight inches between Muleshoe and Morton, Tex., in the Texas Panhandle. Muleshoe measured four inches.

Snow and sleet fell in most of West Texas, the South Plains and the Panhandle. Temperatures remained at near freezing.

Although the storm snarled traffic farmers and ranchers in the area welcomed the moisture.

4-Legged Defector Returned to East Germany Zone

LUEBECK, Germany, Jan. 4 (AP)—Mopsi defected to the West today. Mopsi is a four-legged defector. He's a bear—a tame one.

Mopsi ambled across the border without hindrance from the tough Communist guards and tried to join some children at play.

The children ran. Mopsi tagged along. Police came running and put him on a leash.

The officers learned Mopsi belonged to an East German farmer on the border who had raised him as a pet.

Mopsi was led to the frontier and turned over to Communist guards—something that never happens to two-legged defectors.

Sanders died yesterday afternoon after a heart attack at his home. He was 53.

He was born April 25, 1904, at Boring, son of William J. and Minnie Sanders. He and Elsie Virginia Miller were married Nov. 7, 1925, at Portland.

He lived in Dallas from 1910 to 1925, then moved to Tillamook but returned to Dallas in 1941.

Besides his widow, he leaves his mother in Salem; three sons, William Alvin, Alvin Jack, Donald Keith Sanders, all of Dallas; five sisters, Mrs. Elva Stocker, Portland; Mrs. Laura Willis, and Mrs. Minnie Griffin, both of Albany; Mrs. Vera Holt and Mrs. Marjorie Schultz, both of Salem; two brothers, Dana Sanders, John Day, and Donald D. Sanders, Salem; two granddaughters and one grandson, all in Dallas.
