

Empty Dinghy Only Clue to Fate Of 3 Vessels Lost Off Florida

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 6 (U-P) — A search for three vessels missing in last weekend's storm turned up a single clue tonight — an empty dinghy believed to be from the yacht of wealthy New York publisher Harvey Conover.

Coast Guard search and rescue headquarters said the 12-foot craft was found adrift off a beach at Jupiter Inlet by a civilian who secured it and reported his find to local Coast Guards.

Jupiter Inlet is 80 miles north of Miami on the Florida east coast. The Coast Guard said the dinghy was lettered "Revonoc 37."

Conover's handsome sailing craft, Revonoc, has been unreported since Jan. 1 on route to Miami from the Florida Keys with the owner and four others aboard.

Discovery of the dinghy was not viewed as necessarily a token of disaster. Such auxiliary craft, usually kept on a towline, often break adrift in stormy weather.

Three Coast Guard aircraft scanned a 5,000-mile ocean area today and more searching is planned tomorrow for the yacht and two other missing craft.

Conover, writer, publisher and yachtsman of Mamaroneck, N.Y., set out from Key West New Year's Day in his 45-foot yawl Revonoc with his wife, son, daughter-in-law and a radio operator aboard. The Revonoc has been unreported since.

Also missing are two shrimp boats, the Wave and the Surf, with four in all aboard.

A Coast Guard spokesman said the Revonoc "was undoubtedly caught in the storm, since a port check has failed to produce any trace of the vessel."

"We figure all three boats are in a bad way,"

New Check Charge Filed Against Man

A Santa Clara man who has been held in Marion County jail since Saturday on a check charge, was arrested again Monday on a similar charge of obtaining property by false pretenses, city police said.

The new charge lodged against Harry Moulinas Walker, 27, involves an alleged \$17.95 check passed at the Shell Station, Mission and 12th streets SE, recently, officers stated. The complaint was signed by the station manager Ralph Sears, police stated.

Walker was arrested on a Marion County District Court warrant with bail set at \$500, court officials said.

He had previously been returned from Lakeview, Ore., to answer a charge of obtaining property by false pretense in connection with checks written in the Gervais area, officers added.

Salem Men Open Utility At The Dalles

THE DALLES, Jan. 6 (U-P) — A company formed at Salem to bring natural gas to the Harvey Aluminum plant and adjacent residences here, opened an office Monday.

Ed Chambers, The Dalles, former Harvey company official, was named general manager of the firm known as Northern Utility Co. Its officers are four Salem men: George A. Rhoten, Richard Fabin, Sam Speerstra and F. Keith Lind.

Chambers said the company has a contract with Harvey to provide natural gas which is available in the Northwest Pacific Pipeline Co.'s pipeline about five miles north of here.

The company must first obtain a certificate from the Public Utilities Commission.

Mel Davidson, head of The Dalles Natural Gas Co., said he still plans to tap the pipeline and bring natural gas to The Dalles. If both companies carry out their plans, two lines then would bring gas here, presumably in pipes attached to the bridge spanning the Columbia River.

Doctor Reports Red Skelton Now Out of Danger

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Jan. 6 (U-P) — Comedian Red Skelton was pronounced out of danger today by his physician but a mild case of pneumonia will keep him in the hospital several more days.

His doctor called it a moderate pneumonia of the right lung and added it is common among victims of severe asthmatic seizures.

Skelton nearly suffocated a week ago from an attack of asthma.

Supreme Court to Rule If Secret Data Use Legal in Deciding on Passports

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (U-P) — The Supreme Court agreed today to rule on whether the State Department legally may rely on secret information in deciding whether to grant a passport.

The precise question has never been passed upon by the high court.

The decision of the court was to hear the case of a cosmic ray physicist, Weldon Bruce Dayton. It means there will be a full-scale review of various aspects of the State Department's handling of passport applications.

Dayton, formerly of Corning, N.Y., and now living in California, sought a passport to go to Bombay, India, to accept a position as research assistant in the Tata Institute of Fundamental Research.

He swore to the department he had never been a member of the Communist party and had never engaged in any activities which, to his knowledge, supported the Communist movement.

The State Department, relying in part on confidential information, refused to give Dayton a passport.

In other actions today, the Supreme Court:

1. Rejected still another effort by Morton Sobell, imprisoned for atomic espionage, to win a review of his conviction. Sobell, convicted with Ethel and Julius Rosenberg, who were executed in 1953, is serving a 30-year sentence in Alcatraz Penitentiary.
2. Refused to review the conviction of Angelo La Marca, condemned kidnaper of baby Peter Weinberger of Westbury, N.Y.
3. La Marca, 32, was scheduled to die last Nov. 7 in Sing Sing Prison's electric chair but Justice Harlan granted a stay pending final Supreme Court action on a petition for review of the case.
4. Struck down the first conviction of an alien for failing to deport himself under a proviso of the 1959 Internal Security Act.
5. Justice Whitaker, speaking for a unanimous court, said the evidence against Knute Einar Heikinen was insufficient to support his conviction in U.S. District

Marion County Adults Offered Salk Polio Shots

Approximately 4,000 Salk vaccine shots are going to be made available to Marion County adult residents either free, or at cost price, said Glenn Bowman, chairman of the county polio chapter at Monday evening's March of Dimes kick-off dinner.

Clinics will be set up possibly by Jan. 15 with the help of the Marion County Health Department, volunteer doctors and workers, Bowman added. Centers are tentatively being scheduled at both Salem hospitals, hospitals at Silverton and Stayton, and the Woodburn county health center.

A six-week series of polio clinics is presently being conducted throughout the county for residents under the age of 20. Vaccine for these clinics is tax-purchased by the federal government and distributed to the various states.

Adult vaccine will be purchased by the health department with national polio foundation funds to be given free, or at cost if able to pay. The initial cost of vaccination may act as insurance against the excessive cost of treating polio cases, said Bowman.

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Clinic Searched By Burglar

A thin burglar broke out a small window in the Children's Clinic, Monday night and ransacked about ten doctors' offices in his probable search for narcotics and money, city police speculated.

Dr. Bruce Knapp of the clinic said he returned to the building about 10:45 p.m. to discover that it had been burglarized. Police said apparently no money was taken, but there was a chance that some narcotics were missing.

Apparently when Dr. Knapp came in the front door of the clinic, Mission and Commercial Streets SE, the burglar made his escape out the rear, he said.

The clinic had been unoccupied from 9:30 to 10:45 when Dr. Knapp returned, officers said.

Ike Planning Note Rejecting Non-War Pact

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (U-P) — President Eisenhower met with his top foreign policy and defense chiefs today to approve a message to Soviet Premier Bulganin which rejects Russia's call for a big East-West nonaggression pact.

The Eisenhower letter, however, was understood to move a carefully guarded step toward an East-West summit conference.

Such a top-level meeting would depend on solid progress in advance of settling disputes on disarmament and German unity.

Eisenhower discussed his reply to Bulganin's December letter at a three-hour National Security Council meeting at the White House, Vice President Nixon attended, along with Secretary of State Dulles, Secretary of Defense McElroy and disarmament chief Harold E. Stassen.

Stassen was reported to have proposed liberalization of U.S. disarmament policy.

The White House kept a tight security curtain around today's meeting but responsible authorities reported it approved the draft of a Bulganin reply which Dulles proposed.

The draft took no special note, authorities said, of British Prime Minister Macmillan's surprise suggestion over the weekend that a cold war truce "could start by a solemn pact of nonaggression."

Macmillan's suggestion obviously upset some top administration leaders.

The charge against Robertson concerns the robbery of the Richmond Service Station at 3125 Portland Rd. NE in June of 1956. A trio armed with a 38 revolver allegedly made off with about \$62 after holding up the station attendant.

Robertson and two other men were recognized the same month on a Portland television newscast by Salem police as answering the description of the robbers. Robertson had been at Monroe Reformatory at Monroe, Wash., until released Monday and returned to answer to the district court warrant. Bail was set at \$1,000.

Archbishop Orders End to Bingo, Raffles

PORTLAND, Jan. 6 (U-P) — Archbishop Edward D. Howard of the Catholic Church has ordered an end to bingo games and raffles in all Western Oregon parishes.

The games had been used to raise money.

The archbishop recommended in 1955 that the parishes discontinue the practice.

A spokesman at the chancery office said plans are being made for dinners and food sales to replace the lost income. In some cases increased regular contributions may be asked, he said.

The Rev. Martin Thelen, superintendent of diocesan schools, said the games were not a major source of income and discontinuance should not result in any curtailment of school activities.

British Drop Matter of Plane Downed in Albania

LONDON, Jan. 6 (U-P) — The British government today dropped the case of the cargo airliner forced down over Communist Albania last week.

A foreign Office statement said it was now clear the DC4 Sky-master had strayed off course in bad weather and was over Albanian territory when Albanian jet fighters forced it to land.

The statement noted that the crew of six, one a stewardess, had been well treated from the time they landed until their release. The plane and crew flew back to England Saturday.
