Boys Ordered To Memorize Dog Eulogy

Three Salem teenage boys were placed on 90 days probation and ordered to memorize 10 basic gun safety rules and "Eulogy to A Dog" in Marion County juvenile court Tuesday.

The three, ages 13 and 15, had admitted shooting a dog with a .22-caliber rifle last month in a wooded area near Roberts Avenue in Northeast Salem.

In other action a 17-year-old Silverton boy was placed on indefinite probation concerning theft of frozen food from a home locker on Thanksgiving night. Chickens, hamburger, steak and canned fruit were reported taken from the home of Frank Ditcher, Salem Rt. 2, Box 478.

Two Gervais brothers aged 10 and 11 who had admitted causing a fire at Charles Lilly Seed Co. in Gervais on Nov. 24, were placed under juvenile department supervision.

The fire of the 60-year-old wooden structure was not set, but caused from careless use of matches, said juvenile officers.

Two Salem boys, 15 and 17, were released to their parents pending additional investigation on charges of an unprovoked attack on a Salem man last weekend with a leather sap.

Reformatory Chief To Undergo Heart Operation Today

Paul J. Squier, state reformatory superintendent, will undergo an all-day heart operation today at Good Samaritan Hospital, Portland.

Suffering from an enlarged aorta, the main artery from the heart, Squier will be packed in ice before the unusual operation to reduce body temperature and the body's demand for blood. During the operation a part of the artery will be replaced.

The state reformatory is now under construction southeast of Salem.

Recovery period after the operation will be about a month, doctors said. Squier is a former warden of McNeil Island, Wash., federal penitentiary.

Guardsmen Impressed by McNary Field

Two National Guard officials from Washington, D.C., were "very favorably impressed" Tuesday with McNary Field air facilities and have agreed to work toward transferring the property to Oregon National Guard for use by Army aviation units.

After looking over the McNary site, Lt. Col. M. L. Zickelsoose, of the logistics branch and J. J. Walsh, construction engineer of the National Guard Bureau, Washington, D.C., agreed that the facilities were "most adequate for the needs of the Oregon National Guard."

They were also pleased, Col. Carl Cover of the Oregon Military Department said, that the Oregon Guard had made the request to take over the property from the Naval Air Reserve which vacated the facilities in December.

Approval of the National Guard Bureau in Washington must be granted before the lease can be transferred from the Navy to the Oregon Guard.

Cover said he expected men and planes of the Army air unit to begin moving down from its Portland base early in February after a regular inspection there of its technical standards.

Carnegie Institute Assistantship Given Willamette Student

The first Willamette University student to participate in the university's tie-in engineering program with Carnegie Institute of Technology has been awarded a resident assistantship at the Institute, it was announced Tuesday.

John Chi of Indonesia attended Willamette three years before going to Carnegie Tech last year.

Willamette has similar programs in engineering with Columbia University, Stanford, University of Southern California and Northwestern University.

Roseland Center to Include Big Market

Grocery supermarket, variety store, restaurant, service station and several shops will comprise a new \$2,000,000 suburban shopping center on Market Street, it was disclosed Tuesday by Al Isaak & Co. realtors.

Arrangements were completed this week for McKay Bros., a Eugene grocery firm with seven stores, to enter the shopping center as a principal business there.

The new business center will be in the Roseland Addition, on both sides of Market Street just east of Salem city limits. It is a 40-acre area that also includes residential streets.

Negotiations are now in progress, Isaak reported Tuesday, for a major service station on the south side of Market and for several developments in addition to the supermarket on the north side.

A second major retail store there will be a large variety store. Isaak said five firms are negotiating with him for that location.

Between the variety store and the supermarket will be smaller stores—probably including hardware, men's wear, ladies' apparel and restaurant. Under negotiation now is a drug store.

Sanitary and storm sewers have been installed in the Roseland area and a water system is now being planned. Lansing Avenue will be paved as a new street from Market north to the present improved Lansing at Sunnyview Avenue. This project and paving of a new section of Madison Street will be undertaken at the outset of the project, Isaak said.

Housing development has already started at south end of the Roseland Addition, on streets off Savage Street which extends from Market to D Street. Eighteen homes are occupied there and five others are now under construction. With size stipulated, homes are being built on Roseland lots for individual owners.

The entire Roseland area was purchased three years ago by the Andresens who moved here from

Board Approves Adding Attendant At State Hospital Criminal Ward

Addition of another attendant in the criminal ward at State Hospital and final approval of a \$134,000 building project at the State School for the Blind were granted Tuesday by the State Board of Control.

Doubling of the guard between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. at the State Hospital criminal ward was recommended by Dr. Dean K. Brooks, hospital superintendent, as a means of preventing frequent escapes. Two men escaped from the ward several days ago but were recaptured.

Dr. Brooks pointed out that some of the most criminally dangerous men in the state are kept in this ward and extra measures to prevent their escape are worthwhile.

Tests Ordered for Murderer

The state hospital superintendent also won approval to combine the medical, surgical and tuberculosis services at the hospital into one hospital unit. He based his request on the fact that the number of tubercular patients at the hospital has dwindled to 22.

The consolidation will provide over 140 additional beds for other hospital patients. Cost of the move would amount to \$2,500 for remodeling. The additional space may also be used for eye, ear and nose treatment.

Construction plans at the School for the Blind include a swimming pool, additions to the gymnasium and girls' dormitory.

In other action Tuesday the board took these steps: Decided to seek federal funds, for construction of Dammasch State Hospital.

Extended the pathological contract between the board and Dr. William Lidbeck, Salem pathologist, for another year.

Remanded three MacLaren School boys to the court on the request of MacLaren superintendent Amos Reed. The boys, who recently escaped and were re-

turned, were termed "incorrigibles." Reed said the boys were not benefiting from the program at MacLaren.

Combination Approved

The board also ordered the transfer of George Sack, convicted murderer, from the State Penitentiary to the State Hospital for tests to determine if he is mentally ill.

Sack, 63, now serving a life sentence for the slaying of his wife in Portland, was sentenced to die in the prison gas chamber several months ago but Gov. Holmes commuted the death sentence to life imprisonment.

Warden Clarence T. Gladden of the prison said that Sack, "doesn't seem able to cope with his problems."

Thieves Crack Two Safes Of Lancaster Drive Firms

Thieves rifled safes of two businesses on Lancaster Drive at Center Street during the night and made off with more than \$250, Marion County sheriff's deputies said.

The Krueger's Kash & Karry Market safe was opened by forcing the door and approximately \$250 was reported taken. An attempt to enter through the safe bottom failed, said John Zabinski, Marion County chief criminal deputy.

The intruders moved the safe to a rear storage room of the market before opening it, Zabinski added. Entrance was through a roof ventilator opening and a ceiling trap door about 15 feet above the main floor.

The C & K Lumber Yard safe was also rifled, but the unlocked safe contained no cash. However, the coin box of a soft drink machine was smashed and approximately \$1.50 taken. Entrance was made by smashing out a side window.
