TAFT, Jan. 7 (Special) — Salem Academy, which needed the last minute of play to beat Taft at Salem last week, had no such trouble here tonight as the Crusaders rammed to a 56-44 non-counter basketball win.

The Academy club was in control all the way, jumping off to a quick lead and building it up gradually through the first half. Dave Zweigart slipped 11 points through the net in a terrific first period that saw the Crusaders score 19 points while holding the home club to 14.

Rodger Carter, Academy's 5-6 guard, picked up six points in that first half. Salem Academy led 32-23 at the intermission.

The third period was nearly even, with Taft outscoring the visitors 13-12. However, the Crusader broke loose again in the final period to extend their margin.

Larry Dyck was the hero of the second half charge. He poured 10 of his 14 markers through the hoop to keep the Crusaders going. Gary Rosenbalm, Taft's fine forward had 11 in that half and kept the coast crew in the game.

High School Rule Changed

LExINGTON, Ky., Jan. 7 (U-P) — The nation's high school and junior college football rulemakers today approved a regulation making the removal of an injured player mandatory under some conditions.

The National Alliance football committee ruled a player must be taken out for at least one down if the clock is stopped because of the injury. And, it decided, if the injured player is treated during an official time out, such as for yardage measurement, he must be removed if he is unable to play when the signal is given to resume competition.

The ruling presumably also would do away with or curtail faking injuries to stop the clock.

The committee also reduced the length of the coaches box or area for the team bench by 10 yards, restricting it between the 35 yard lines instead of the 30's.

But, it ruled, the coach may step onto the field to confer with a player during a time out provided he doesn't stray more than five yards from the sidelines.

Senior Bowl Squads Hold First Workouts

MOBILE, Ala., Jan. 7 (U-P) — Two Michigan State teammates moved into starting positions for the North team today as both squads began intensive work for Saturday's Senior Bowl football game.

Yankee coach Joe Kuharich of the Washington Redskins had Jim Ninowski, Michigan State's slick quarterback, directing the No. 1 unit most of the time in dummy scrimmage.

Others in the No. 1 backfield most of the time were Walt Kowalsky, Ninowski's running mate; Mike Sommer, George Washington's; and Ray Nitschke, Illinois.

Two other big 18 quarterbacks, Bobby Cox of Minnesota and Jim Van Pelt of Michigan, also saw duty.

Little Jim Shanley of Oregon and Bob Stranisky of Colorado shared some halfback duty and Larry Krutko of West Virginia also got in at fullback.

South coach Paul Brown of the Cleveland Browns also began setting up his offense.

Brown appeared to favor a combination of quarterback George Walker, Arkansas; halfbacks Dick Chester, North Carolina State; and Phil King, Vanderbilt; and fullback Timmy Taylor, Louisiana State.

Although Brown has said he is considering using Ray Brown of Mississippi on defense, he worked the Sugar Bowl star on some offensive plays.

Jim Rountree, Florida; Billy Atkins, Auburn; and Jim Loftin, Alabama, also were called on during the offensive drill.

The coaches got a break from the weather and worked their squads both morning and afternoon in sunny weather. The temperature was around the 40s but a brisk wind hampered the passers.

NFL 'Star' Team Lists Four 49ers

Brown Selected On Every Ballot

The San Francisco 49ers today placed four men on the Associated Press National Football League all-star team. The world champion Detroit Lions, Green Bay Packers and Baltimore Colts had three representatives each.

Jimmy Brown of the Cleveland Browns was the only player named on all 26 ballots of the sports writers, who covered the NFL campaign in the various cities from coast to coast. The brilliant freshman received 34 votes for the fullback position and two from the left halfback post on the offensive team.

Gino Marchetti of Baltimore polled the most votes on the defensive squad, being named on 35 ballots. Joe Schmidt, the Lions' stalwart linebacker, attracted 34 votes, one more than San Francisco's Billy Wilson, who won the left end post on the offensive team, and three more than Washington's Gene Brito, who captured the right end position on the defensive team.

Every member of the 12-club circuit is represented except the Philadelphia Eagles, who placed a man on the second defensive team, linebacker Chuck Bednarik. The Browns, who won the Eastern division title but were routed by Detroit 39-14 in the championship playoff, placed only one man on the first team. So did Los Angeles, Pittsburgh, the Chicago Bears and Chicago Cardinals. The New York Giants and Washington Redskins earned two positions.

In addition to Schmidt, the Lions were represented by halfback Jack Christensen (25 votes) on the defensive unit and tackle Lou Creekmur (17) on the offensive team. San Francisco's contributions, in addition to Wilson, were quarterback Y. A. Tittle (24) on the attacking squad and tackle Leo Nomellini (18) and linebacker Marv Matuszak (17) on defense.

The Packers placed end Billy Howton (25) and center Jim Ringo (23) on the offensive team and halfback Bobby Dillon (29) on the defensive unit. Other Colts who made the first teams were tackle Art Donovan (20) and safety Milt Davis (19) on defense.

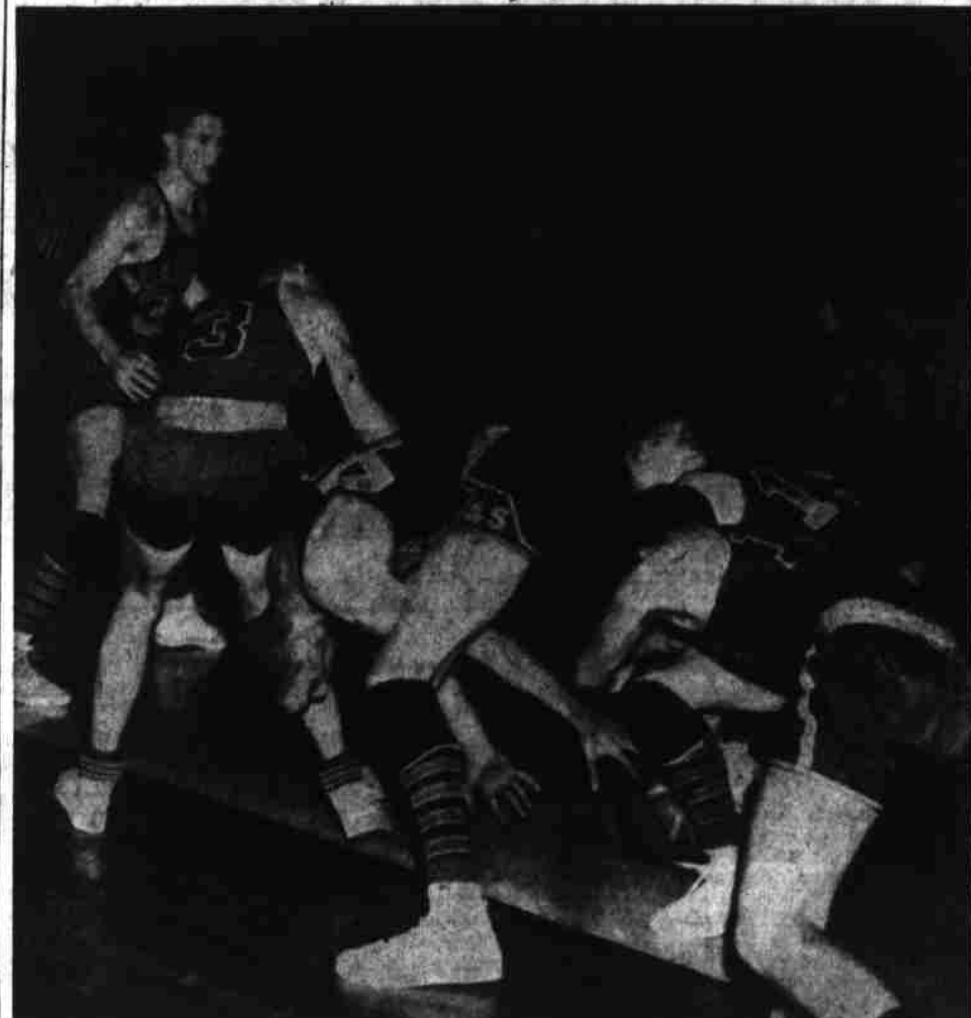
Coliseum until his \$10,000,000 stadium in Chavez Ravine was completed in 1960, has run into big drawbacks.

NCAA Offers Prep Schooling Answer

Hart Picked Over Baker In TV Fight

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 7 (U-P) — The National Collegiate Athletic Assn. council today published its solution to the ticklish problem of subsidizing preparatory schooling for Army, Navy and Air Force Academy athletes, deliberately providing an escape hatch for the service institutions.

Then the council, after wrestling with this question for several months, realized the new rule can't legally be passed for another year. It will be presented to NCAA members tomorrow as a proposal which will be offered as legislation at the next annual meeting.

Meanwhile, the council will suggest that the service academies get together with NCAA officials during the next few months and agree upon acceptable programs.

The proposed rule says, in effect, that colleges may not directly or indirectly arrange or finance pre-college or post-graduate education for athletes. These specific bans never were written into the NCAA rules although the general idea was there.

The proposal states that the council, by a two-thirds vote, "may approve procedures involving preparation for entrance into academies of the U. S. government for students who on admission are committed to" (Continued page 10, col. 9)

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Last Half Surge Nets Close Win

South Leads Most of Way

Coach Dick Ballantyne's South Salem Saxons had a basketball upset in the makings last night at South Salem, but faltered in the final quarter and came off second best, 61-59, to the Beavers from Beaverton.

For three periods it looked like South's ball game all the way before the Beavers, paced by flashy Steve Pauly and speedy Mickey Sinnerud, reared back to eke out the kings-a-clash.

South started off like they were going to run the visitors right off the floor and grabbed a quick 10-0 lead as little Jay Brack accounted for eight of the total all by his lonesome. Brack hit the first bucket after both teams had made numerous fruitless attempts from the field. Dan Moore added a tip-in, then Brack grabbed a rebound and sank a jump shot from the key, hit on a driving hooker and rang true with another jumper.

Beaverton finally tallied two on the scoreboard after 3:13 minutes had gone by. Whitley Brunkal then took over for South and in the next two minutes had gathered himself six points on three jump shots. South kept hitting and had a 29-9 first quarter lead.

Beaverton closed the gap in the second period as Mr. Pauly took things in his own hands and hooped in 12 points. The much smaller Saxons were still out rebounding the tall Beavers, but could only manage a five point lead, 33-27, at halftime.

The third stanza was nip and tuck all the way, with first one and then the other team finding the range. South Salem still had its five point spread, 44-39, at the quarter break.

Sinnerud was the hot item for the Beavers as the final chapter opened. "The Mick" hit two driving layups in a row to put the Beavers hot on the Saxons trail. With 5:34 left to play, Sinnerud made good on a pair of free throws and the Beavers had their first lead of the game, 48-47.

Brunkal put the Saxons back on top with a jump shot about the knee-line and then Pauly hit a long jumper to give the lead back to Beaverton at 50-48.

South then ran up a five point advantage as Brack sank a free throw. Dan Moore hit on a hook going away from the bucket. Bob
