

West Europe Rallies to Ike Talk, But Discontent Noted

LONDON, Jan. 10 (AP)—Western Europeans tonight rallied to the spirit of President Eisenhower's statement to Congress yesterday, but with vital reservations.

Even in strongly pro-American circles there was an undertone of discontent with the State of the Union speech. Newspapers in several countries described it as lacking dramatic impact.

Moscow contributed to this feeling with its carefully timed announcement of Soviet Premier Khrushchev's new letters urging East-West summit talks early in 1958.

Stained Pillow Case Linked to Missing Boy, 5

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn. (AP)—Officers today awaited results of laboratory tests on a stained pillow case uncovered during an intensive search for missing 5-year-old boy.

The 5-year-old boy vanished Wednesday morning while playing outside his home a mile south of here. Efforts by a search party numbering up to 2,000 failed to turn up a trace of the boy.

A tracking dog led searchers to a garage a quarter mile from the boy's home this morning.

Sheriff Ed Anderson said a pillow case spotted with what appeared to be blood was found in the back seat of a car inside the garage.

Anderson said he planned to send the pillow case to the State Crime Bureau in St. Paul for laboratory tests. The sheriff added he felt the find had little meaning in the case. Anderson did not name the owner of the car.

Meanwhile, searchers planned to cover a three-mile area foot by foot in an attempt to turn up a trace of the boy.

Position for 'Lone Wolf' in Science Urged

NEW YORK, Jan. 10 (AP)—American scientists must give a place to the lone wolf researcher in spite of the trend toward teamwork in scientific attack, a leading metallurgist said tonight.

Dr. William J. Kroll told a chemical industry gathering: "The individual inventor puts his ingenuity against the financial means of his team competitors. Often a secret hand guides him to his goal."

The Corvallis, Ore., metals expert made his remarks accepting the 32nd Perkins Medal of the American Society of Chemical Engineers. The award was made for outstanding contributions in non-ferrous metallurgy.

A native of Luxembourg who became a U.S. citizen in 1952, Kroll took exception to the idea that the days of solitary war-ballooning science are finished.

"This is unfortunately a quite general conception even in our universities," he said. "The fight of the individual against the collectivity in which he lives is as old as humanity and will never cease."

Our educational system, he said, is heavily contaminated with the Freudian psychology of "no conformity." This leads to conformism and from there to an attempt to overthrow the pioneer in favor of the team.

"Spectacular Ideas" Needed

"Even if his three-part policy developed—reinforcement of American strength, tightening of political, economic and scientific ties with the Allies, and the search for total peace—it would have been good if this policy were accompanied and illustrated by several spectacular proposals."

Newspapers in Canada also complained the message lacked concrete proposals.

Wide sections of the West European press felt Eisenhower should have provided the Allies with a more powerful counter to Soviet military feasts. But government spokesmen generally were

enthusiastic in praising the President.

Italian Foreign Minister Giuseppe Pella called the speech "a grand contribution to the solution of many international problems."

In West Germany, government spokesman Felix von Eckardt praised Eisenhower's references to policy on Germany.

Eisenhower's message similarly aroused enthusiasm in papers published in Britain, France, the Netherlands and Scandinavia.

The independent Paris Journal said Eisenhower has opened "one of the most exciting debates in America's history." The Liberal Dagens Nyheter of Stockholm spoke of the President's "convincing honesty and warmth."

24 Bluebloods Caught During Gambling Raid

LONDON, Jan. 10 (AP)—Twenty-four embarrassed British Bluebloods were haled into court today after an early morning gambling raid on the swank Mayfair apartment of Lady Mary Osborne.

It was London's biggest society raid in years.

Among those arrested are: Pretty Lady Nancy Jane Marie Heathcote - Drummond-Willoughby, 23, daughter of the Earl of Ancaster and a train bearer to Queen Elizabeth II at her coronation; Lord Willoughby de Eresby, 21; Lady Mary Grace Osborne, 54; and William James Cavendish-Bentley, son of a former British ambassador to Poland.

Lady Osborne was charged with keeping a common gaming house at her apartment in one of London's smartest residential districts.

Magistrate Walter Frampton asked all 24 whether they would put up 25 pounds - \$70 - and be bound over on a promise of keeping away from gambling houses. Sixteen of them - including Lady Nancy Jane, Lord Willoughby, and Cavendish-Bentley - agreed.

Civil Rights Boss Proves Hard to Find

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—The Civil Rights Commission said today it is having trouble finding a man for its \$22,500-a-year job as staff director.

Chairman John A. Hannah said the commission submitted a list of three lawyers for consideration by President Eisenhower, but:

"The President was unable to interest the people we had on our list."

Hannah said the commission drew up another list today for recommendation to the President. He declined to give any names. The commission will meet again Jan. 25.

The staff director, a fulltime employee, is to be nominated by the President, subject to Senate confirmation.

The commission and its director are to investigate sworn charges of denial of voting rights, and are to look generally into federal laws and practices relating to constitutional rights. It was created primarily because of complaints that Negroes' rights were being violated in the South.
