## Lauberhorn Classic Captured by Werner

WENGEN, Switzerland, Jan. 12 (AP)—Buddy Werner, a shy, 21-year-old from the mountain town of Steamboat Springs, Colo., scored American's first great victory in Men's Alpine Skiing today when he won the combination title of the Lauberhorn Climb.

The slim, U.S. Army enlisted man whipped the almost unbeatable Austrians and every other top class Alpine skier with the best average performance in the downhill and slalom races. His points were 1.92.

Jose Rieder of Austria was second with 2.36 points.

Several American men have won titles in European skiing since 1950, and numerous American girls have won Olympic championships.

But Werner's is the initial major title for males and it crowns a long, expensive and patient program conducted by the American Skiing Assn. to produce a winner. The association bi-annually sends large men's and women's teams to Europe for four months of first competition and training.

The freckled-face Coloradan placed second in the downhill yesterday and third in the slalom today with a time of 1:37.2. Rieder won the slalom today in 1:33.4 but was tenth in the downhill.

Triple Olympic gold medal winner Toni Sailer of Austria, the downhill champion here and unquestionably the world's best skier, had a bad day.

He fell on his first slalom run and could do no better than sixth. Anderl Molterer, who along with Sailer and Rieder make up possibly the finest trio ever developed in one country, had an even worse day. He ran off the course and was disqualified.

## Bums May Soon Know About Bowl Board Will Get Details Tuesday

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 12 (AP)—Negotiations between the Los Angeles Dodgers and Pasadena city officials for use of the Rose Bowl for the Dodgers' 1958 and 1959 home baseball games entered the final phase today.

Dick Weisk, administrative assistant to Dodger President Walter O'Malley, and Harry Walsh, club attorney, conferred with city manager Don C. McMillan, with indications that a decision might be forthcoming by next Tuesday at the latest.

Reports of engineers who surveyed the Rose Bowl, including cost estimates involved in transforming the football stadium into a baseball park, were being discussed. O'Malley did not attend the session but was in touch with his aides.

If a satisfactory arrangement can be worked out by tomorrow, it can be presented to the Pasadena board of managers Tuesday at its regular weekly session for ratification or rejection.

There have been rumors that the cost involved in altering the Rose Bowl may be a bit too steep for the Dodgers, but O'Malley has declined to comment.

If the Rose Bowl negotiations break down it seems likely the Dodgers will reopen discussions with the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum Commission for use of the 101,000-seat coliseum. These talks bogged down when the commission declined to go along with O'Malley's insistence that he be allowed to have home plate at the west end, thus chopping up the turf on the football field.

The commission bluntly told him he would have to install home plate at the east or partially open peristyle end of the coliseum, which was erected for the 1932 Olympic games.

In neither the Rose Bowl nor the coliseum would the Dodgers be able to sell beer.

They collected \$1,633 each. Defending champion Jay Herbert of Sanford, Fla., shot only a 285 in the pro competition but he and his partner, Los Angeles attorney Roger Kelly won the best-ball crown with a 66 today and a 260 total. That earned Herbert \$2,000.

Casper teamed with former Stanford football star Bob Reynolds for a best-ball 65 today and a 261. At 286 among the individual pro came Cary Middlecoff, Tommy Bolt and Bob Harris.

Casper's victory which he termed the best of his career, made him golf's leading money winner this year to date since he pocketed \$2,200 at the Los Angeles open. Last year he won about \$40,000 including \$12,500 from six victories in a television series yet to be released.

In other actions at the final session of a three-day meeting, the committee voted to:

1. Change the penalty for out-of-bounds kickoffs.
2. Permit ineligible receivers to move downfield as soon as the ball is thrown.
3. Put new teeth in an existing rule against defensive teams "jamming" opponents offensive signals.
4. Limit players to making contact with only one arm and hand in their blocking assignments.

Both the scoring and substitution rule changes had a price, however. Hereafter the conversion play will start three yards from the goal line instead of two, a concession to the defense. And each team will be allowed only four free timeouts instead of five, giving them one less opportunity to make substitutions without drawing a penalty for delaying the game.

The conversion rules change was the first in the scoring system since touchdowns were changed from five points to six and field goals from four to three 52 years ago.

**UCLA, Ohio State Set 1961 Contest**

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 12 (AP)—UCLA will meet Ohio State University in a football game at Columbus Oct. 7, 1961, it was announced today.

The schools have agreed on a home-and-home exchange but the date of the game at Los Angeles is to be set later.

A UCLA spokesman said the Ohio State game "is the first of several big intercollegiate games we are going after for the 1961 season."

Since the Bruins figure to play four games in the Pacific Coast Conference that year, they probably will go after five more intercollegiate to round out a 10-game schedule.

The world championship is under the auspices of the F.I.S., (Federation Internationale de Ski).

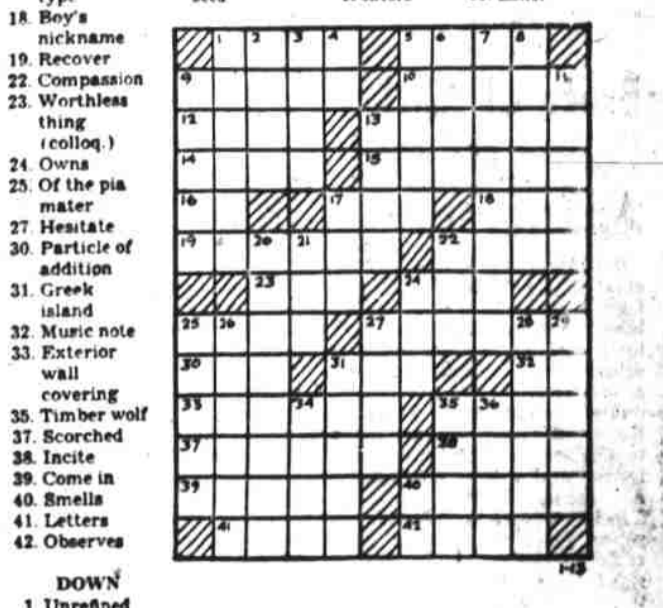
## Portland Beavers Get New Catcher
