

Hungarians' Mindszenty Policy Takes New Twist

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Jan. 16 (U-P)—First Dep. Premier Ferec Mindszenty declared today Josef Cardinal Mindszenty can stay in the U.S. legation here as long as he likes—and then he can go to heaven.

The cardinal took refuge in the legation after the Russians crushed the Hungarian revolt in November 1956. He had been freed from Communist arrest by rebels only a short time before. He is 65 years old and in good health.

Muennich's View Explained

Muennich told a visiting group of American editors: "Cardinal Mindszenty is a Catholic, a mem-

ber of the hierarchy. He is where he is because that is what the Pope wants. We are not in diplomatic relations with the Pope, but we respect him. We have no right to interfere with the hospitality of the U.S. legation."

On the other hand, he argued against the idea of giving the cardinal safe conduct out of the country, on the ground he is a

Land Question Raised

The previous official stand seemed to be that the Communist regime wanted the cardinal out of the country. It had made plain that if he simply left the legation, he would be arrested.

Muennich alleged that during the revolt the cardinal had asked for return of land that the government had taken from the Church. This, he said, had brought on him the hostility of the peasants.

"The peasants don't use church language when they speak about Mindszenty," he said. "Now they have had the land for a few years."

Those who urge an amnesty for Mindszenty are doing him a disservice, Muennich went on, because the Hungarian regime does not like to yield to foreign advice or pressure.

Newsmen on Tour

Muennich talked to a party of 11 American newsmen and women in Budapest for a three-day visit after having visited Moscow and Bucharest. The visiting reporters had asked to see Premier Janos Kadar. They got Muennich.

Muennich, who is 71, said that if the Hungarian Parliament chose him premier it would be his "patriotic duty" to serve. There have been persistent reports that Kadar would give up the job soon, keeping the more important one of first secretary of the ruling Socialist Workers-Communist-party.

Muennich added that if he became premier it would mean no change in Hungarian policy of "friendship with the Soviet Union and anyone else who wants it."

Eight Victims Of Gas Blast

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 16 (U-P)—A massive gas explosion that rocked downtown Richmond today wrecked a cold storage firm only a few blocks south of the city's principal business district. Eight persons were believed dead.

Nearly 12 hours after the blast, gas-masked rescue workers succeeded in removing only three bodies from the piles of rubble at the Merchants Ice and Cold Storage Co. on 6th St., near the local waterfront.

Firemen said it appeared only one person of nine believed to have been in the three-story brick building escaped death. This survivor was hospitalized with critical injuries.

Just what caused the explosion had not been pinpointed.

Rocket Blast Kills Boy, 11

SAMSON, Ala., Jan. 16 (U-P)—Eleven-year-old Johnny Mixon was killed late today when a homemade rocket exploded.

Johnny and a brother, Harold, 16, were attempting to fire the rocket.

Harold was injured. The boy's father, J. W. Mixon, said the youths had fired several rockets recently and that two of them reached altitudes of more than 50 feet.

Putnam Plans To Run Again

Announcing as a candidate for re-election Thursday was Dr. Rex Putnam who has been Oregon's state superintendent of public instruction for 20 years.

He has been elected five times to the nonpartisan office without opposition.

The only political candidate actually filing for a primary ballot spot Thursday at the Capitol was Ernest E. Baker, Portland labor leader. He will seek Democratic nomination in Multnomah County's south city subdistrict.

Baker is president of Portland Longshoremen's Local 8 and has been Longshoremen's lobbyist at the past three sessions of State Legislature.

Multnomah D.A. To Enforce 1928 Statute on Arms

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (U-P)—Multnomah County Dist. Atty. Leo Smith said today he will enforce a 1928 state statute which calls for additional prison sentences for persons who commit a felony with use of firearms.

The act states that anyone convicted of such a crime shall, in addition to the prescribed punishment, be sentenced to 10 years in prison.

It further states that any person punished under the act shall not be granted probation by the trial court nor shall the sentence be suspended.

Yesterday Smith said he would begin enforcing the habitual criminal act—which has a maximum of a life sentence after four felony convictions.

Eisenhowers Open Social Season At White House

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (U-P)—President and Mrs. Eisenhower opened the 1958 White House social season tonight with a "white tie" state dinner honoring Vice President Nixon and the Cabinet.

The 84 dinner guests also included top government officials, 16 senators and 12 representatives drawn from both Republican and Democratic ranks.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16 (U-P)—Edward G. Robinson, cigar-chewing "tough guy" of the movies and stage, married New York dress designer Jane Adler today. Robinson is 64, his bride 38.

The ceremony was performed by a justice of the peace in near-by Arlington, Va.

Robinson is now starring here in the stage production of "Middle of the Night." The play centers on the May-December marriage of a man with a much younger wife.

Robinson kept the marriage a secret from the company manager and fellow actors until newsmen sought him out backstage at the National Theater tonight.

Robinson posed for photographers backstage with his bride, a tall, chic brunette who now is associated with the touring company of the show.

Robinson had one previous marriage, to Gladys Cassell, of New York City, an actress whose professional name was Gladys Lloyd. They married in 1927 at Medina, Pa., and divorced in 1956.

Troops Search Little Rock School for Bomb

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 16 (U-P)—Armed National Guardsmen, their officers insisting officially that "this is a practice alert," searched integration-troubled Central High School tonight.

They apparently were looking for a bomb, despite the assertions that it was no more than a routine maneuver. Earlier, a high

National Guard officer, who would not be identified, said the troops suddenly were ordered to the school because of a "bomb scare."

Flashlights Seen

Flashlights were seen moving from room to room shortly after an estimated 36 soldiers entered the high school building at 9 p.m.

Later, city policemen ordered all newsmen out of the area and there were no immediate reports as to what, if anything, was found in the search.

A spokesman for the Arkansas Military District said the troops would stay at the school "some time." He added, "This practice alert has nothing to do with the cafeteria incident."

Soup Thrown

The Central High cafeteria during the noon hour had been the scene of a soup-throwing incident involving a white boy and a Negro girl.

Classes were dismissed for the weekend today—the holiday being granted to allow teachers extra time in which to grade final examination papers.

An hour before the troops were ordered out, rumors began to circulate that something was about to happen at the high school.

The ships are the Gen Panfilov and the Odessa, both en route to Vladivostok from Vancouver, B.C.

Earlier, the Navy said permission could not be granted until it was determined whether an emergency existed, and the Coast Guard cutter Bering Strait left on a 500-mile dash to investigate.

The Navy older Ashabula also was diverted to rendezvous with the Panfilov and the Odessa, but the Bering Strait was expected to reach them first.

The Navy granted similar permission to the British freighter Ripley without investigation. The Ripley reported her fuel and water supplies were so low from fighting the same storm she could not make another port.

Portland Boy Badly Burned

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (U-P)—Harold Rowley was swathed in bandages tonight after being burned severely—but he still managed to say "I'm doing okay."

The 12-year-old Portland boy was pouring gasoline on a trash pile he was burning near his home today when the gas can exploded.

Burning gasoline showered over his clothing.

Hospital attendants said he suffered third degree burns on his hands and legs, but was in good condition.

Tax Statements Singed

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (U-P)—A small fire broke out today in the basement of the Multnomah County Courthouse here.

County officials said the flames singed some tax statements and destroyed a number of blank paper forms.
