Portland City Council Urges Defense of Earl

PORTLAND, Jan. 17 (AP)—The Portland city attorney should defend City Commissioner Stanley Earl against a million-dollar damage suit, the Portland City Council decided yesterday.

Arthur Bradley Williams, a former reporter for the Oregon Journal, filed the suit last week asking \$500,000 general damages and \$500,000 punitive damages because of statements he said Earl made at a council meeting last March.

City Atty. Alexander Brown said it would be proper for the city to defend Earl since Earl's remarks were made at a council meeting and "as an official part of his office."

Earl has filed a \$300,000 damage suit against Williams and the Journal, contending Williams supplied untrue information about Earl to columnist Drew Pearson.

Disability Pay At \$6,545 in New Program

Social security disability insurance payments in Marion County during the first six months of the new program amounted to \$6,545 as 85 persons receiving benefits, according to O. L. Donaldson Jr., assistant district social security manager.

Inaugurated in July 1957, the new benefit program is for persons between the ages of 50 and 65, who are so seriously disabled as to prevent the pursuit of gainful work. This includes mental or physical impairment. Majority of those drawing benefits are residents of the State Hospital, Donaldson said.

To qualify, persons must have social security credit for at least five years before his disability was incurred including 1 1/2 years of the three years just prior to disability. Applications for benefits can be made at Salem social security office, 547 Court St. NE.

Right-of-Way Incorporated For Road Job

Marion County Court members signed an order Friday incorporating a right-of-way to be used in connecting McGilchrist Street from Pringle Road to 12th St.

The streets are south of Salem between Liberty Road and Southern Pacific Railway tracks. Work on the extension, which will tie in with development in the area, is expected later in the year.

Court members also instructed John Anderson, county engineer, to draw up specifications for a front-end loader to be added to the county road crew equipment. The loader was approved in the last budget.

Uranium Closet Blaze Quelled

LONDON, Jan. 17 (AP)—A closet containing some natural uranium caught fire Thursday in a laboratory at Harwell, the British atomic research center, near London, but the center's own fire brigade put out the fire and no one was hurt.

"There was no release of radioactivity," officials said.

Merchants Battle Citizens' Traffic Group to Standstill in Parking Issue

Downtown Merchants Association again battled the Citizens' Advisory Traffic Council to a standstill over the downtown parking problem during a special meeting Friday at City Hall.

Meeting 2 1/2 hours of discussion, with the merchants remaining staunch for their two-hour parking meter proposal, the CATC agreed to seek advice from the State Traffic Engineer in drafting a downtown parking proposal to Salem City Council. The state agreed to conduct a quick survey.

Immediate plans call for a map study of downtown area with relation to meter spaces and customer parking use. The CATC and downtown merchants hope to meet again this month to further consider the problem.

Several alternate proposals were offered the merchants who are asking two-hour meters with rigid time limit enforcement. All were refused with the exception of one, which was later modified.

Following a proposal by Alderman E. C. Charlton for two-hour parking meters in the downtown area which would charge five cents for each half hour, Ernest Culp of J. C. Penney Co. agreed that his group might accept the proposal if the five cent charge was limited to meters on State, Court and Liberty streets.

One-Hour Meters

Alderman E. S. Ritter proposed the city keep one-hour meters in the area bounded by State, Commercial, Chemeketa and Court streets, area where merchants want two-hour meters. But at designated places the space charge be five cents for one-half hour.

These latter places would be in front of quick service downtown stores such as drugstores, fountain, etc.

Along with this plan, Ritter suggested that meters in the outlying downtown area be changed to two-hours. Thus by walking not more than a block and one-half the shopper would have a space and two hours time, he said.

All meter time limits would be rigidly enforced to prevent meter feeding, according to the plan. Ritter called his plan, "an effort to meet the merchants half way."

Ike Said to Favor Wool Payment Law's Extension

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—Sen. Barrett (R-Wyo.) said today the Eisenhower administration favors his bill to extend the wool payments law.

The bill would extend for four years a law which otherwise would expire March 31, 1959. It provides incentive payments to domestic wool producers.

Barrett said both the Department of Agriculture and the Bureau of the Budget have submitted favorable reports to the Senate Agriculture Committee.

He expressed hope the committee will hold hearings soon.
