SOS Signals Renew Hope For Plane

GUAM, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—Radio signals definitely identified an SOS renewed hope early today for finding survivors from an Air Force weather plane that vanished Wednesday in a Pacific typhoon 600 miles west of Guam. The plane had a crew of 10.

LT. Col. Richard B. Olney, commander of the 79th Rescue Squadron at Andersen Air Force Base here, said the signals monitored from the area where the plane was last reported Tuesday was definitely an SOS.

Olney said the Air Force had asked that more planes be sent from Hawaii and the search area was increased to 50,000 square miles.

The Navy said Friday listening stations at Guam, Hawaii, Anchorage and Adak picked up faint SOS signals in the general area of the plane's disappearance. Flares also were spotted yesterday by sailors aboard the Navy's ammunition ship Foredrake.

The missing WBS, a B-50 bomber adapted for weather reconnaissance, last reported its position as it headed into the center of Typhoon Ophelia, then raging west of Guam with winds in excess of 140 miles an hour. It has since died down into a relatively minor storm.

Search craft, including radar-equipped planes and ships, are combing the area. The search is being directed from Guam, where the missing plane was based.

Prohibition Days Arsenal Cache Found

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—An arsenal of 130 pistols and hundreds of rounds of ammunition was found cached today in the staircase of a North Philadelphia home.

Some of the guns were loaded and ready for use. Detectives said they may have been placed there by gangsters during prohibition days.

The arsenal included American and German-made guns of various kinds, along with palm-sized weapons. The ammunition was in 45 tin pound-size coffee cans.

The cache was discovered by Benjamin Halicki, 39, a Baltimore and Ohio brakeman in the home of his mother, Halicki found the arsenal while removing a platform at the bottom of the stairs to make a straight flight to the second floor.

Guatemalans Try to Elect New Leader

GUATEMALA, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—Guatemalans tried again today to elect a successor to President Carlos Castillo Armas, assassinated last July by one of his guards.

An election three months ago was nullified after bloody rioting. There was speculation that new political turmoil would help the outlawed Communists back into influence in this coffee-growing Central American republic.

A fight has shaped up among three main candidates—a leftist, a moderate and a rightist. Also at stake are 37 congressional seats.

The polls opened at 8 a.m. in cool, cloudy weather. Only short lines were forming at that time. First results—those from this capital city—were not expected before Tuesday.

Military Fund Jump Sought By Democrats

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—Senate Democrats are packaging a defense buildup program that could add as much as two billion dollars to the new military funds requested by President Eisenhower.

Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) said a proposed single - package amendment to the defense appropriations bill probably will call for increased production of long range missiles, the Navy's underwater-fired Polaris missile and the special submarines to launch it.

Jackson said the proposal, now in the formative stage, has yet to be cleared by Democratic leaders. But he said if agreement is reached the increased appropriations "will certainly be more than a billion dollars and may run up to two billion dollars."

The proposed amendment apparently reflects strong Democratic belief that Eisenhower did not ask for sufficient funds in his request for 14 billion in emergency money or his nearly 40-billion defense budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Bright Sun Blamed for 2-Car Crash

Bright Sunday sun in the eyes of both drivers led to a collision about 4 p.m. Sunday on Skyline Road south of Salem, State Policeman James Hamer said.

Walter Raymond Holcher, 185, Kingwood Ave. NW, and Richard Dean Murphy, Eugene, both said they were blinded by sun as they drove west over the crest of a hill.

Holcher slowed sharply and when Murphy was able to see the car in front of him he tried to stop but the brake line broke, Hamer said.

Damage was extensive but there were apparently no serious injuries to the five occupants of the two cars, he added.

Winds Whip Aussies

SYDNEY, Australia, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—Winds clocked at 93 miles per hour caused widespread damage in the metropolitan area today.

In 15 minutes the wind unroofed dozens of houses, overturned cars, brought down power lines, television aerials, big trees, walls and chimneys and capsize dozens of sailing craft in the harbor.

Venezuela Underground Calls for Strike

CARACAS, Venezuela, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—Foes of President Marcos Perez Jimenez have called for a general strike in Caracas in a frontal assault against the government.

Leaflets urging the walkout at noon Tuesday were scattered in the capital last night by an underground organization which calls itself Junta Patriotica.

Identification of its membership has remained secret, but there are reports here it comprises representatives of the Social Christian Copei party and other anti-government political parties.

The Junta's leaflet urged a general work stoppage and added: "Let us have a great day for freedom and for repudiating usurpation. People of Caracas: to a general strike. Everybody to the Plaza of Silence at 1 p.m. Tuesday!"

The Plaza of Silence is a large downtown square.

Another underground group calling itself the Venezuelan Student Front circulated leaflets calling for a strike of students and professors "from kindergarten to university" beginning Monday.

Steps Urged To Preserve Bird Refuge

CORVALLIS, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—The Oregon Wildlife Federation today urged steps to preserve the waterfowl refuge in the Klamath Basin.

A resolution at the closing session of the mid-winter meeting supported the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service recommendations for the area.

This includes opening of 10,000 acres of land at Tule Lake to homesteading, but calls for retention of all other refuge lands, plus addition to the refuge of lands in the Tule Lake, Lower Klamath Lake, Upper Klamath Lake and Hank's Marsh areas. These lands already are owned by the Federal government.

It also calls for acquisition of 9,171 acres of private land in the Upper Klamath Lake and Agency Marsh areas.

Another resolution opposed the proposed Nes Perce Dam or any other high dam on the Snake River downstream from the Salmon or Imnaha rivers.

Charles C. Collins, Roseburg, executive vice president, was elected president. The vice president's position is to be filled later. Jack Williams, Portland, was named secretary, and Rosal M. Groves, Lebanon, was re-elected treasurer.

Bits of Plane Found in Gulf; Four Missing

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 19 (U.P.)—Searchers today found parts of wreckage of a Navy anti-submarine plane that crashed in the Gulf of Mexico early today while on a routine training flight. The Navy said the four reservists on board were presumed dead.

The SP-7 guardian was based at nearby Callender Field and was part of the reserve squadron.

A Navy spokesman said the cause of the accident had not been determined. He said members of an oil rig crew reported seeing the plane crash about 12:20 a.m.

Bits of the wreckage were spotted by Navy and Coast Guard planes and helicopters taking part in the search.

The wreckage was located about 65 miles south of New Orleans. Navy officials said the pilot of the plane was Lt. Cmdr. John H. Laughlin of Shreveport, La. Co-pilot was Lt. James G. Falls of Baton Rouge, La.

The other two crew members were listed as Chief Forest G. Smith of Mobile, Ala., and Seaman Hayward J. Daigret, of Kenner, La.
