

U. S. Court Frees 11 Convicted Reds

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Eleven persons convicted of Communist activities in violation of the Smith Act were freed today by a U. S. Court of Appeals. The decision said the act had been reduced to a "virtual sham" by the Supreme Court.

The 11 include Joe Hall, right hand man in Hawaii of Harry Bridges, the West Coast longshore boss.

Judge Richard H. Chambers wrote that the Supreme Court decision of last June "leaves the Smith Act, as to any further prosecution under it, a virtual sham."

Two other judges concurred in reversing the convictions.

Not Sufficient Ground

Last June, the Supreme Court ruled that mere membership in the Communist party was not sufficient ground for Smith Act convictions. The decision said "preaching abstractly" was not a crime under the act.

The decision was based on the conviction of 14 persons, including Oleta O'Connor Yates, in California, and freed five of the 14. The federal government then asked dismissal of charges against the other nine.

Changes Asked In Federal Law On School Funds

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration asked Congress Monday for changes in the laws which provide federal aid to school districts where enrollments are swelled by federal activity.

The changes would mean a cut of an estimated 80 1/2 million dollars in the appropriations estimated to be needed for the 1959 fiscal year beginning July 1. Without the cuts, it was estimated the funds would total 211 million dollars.

Elliott L. Richardson, assistant secretary of health, education and welfare, went before a House Education subcommittee to explain administration proposals.

In his budget message, President Eisenhower said the federal aid program should be modified. He said many of the communities for which grants have been made no longer have problems as acute as those suddenly generated by expansion of the defense effort during the Korean crisis.

The program should be continued, the President said, but restricted to instances where the federal personnel both live and work on federal property. Grants on behalf of people living on taxable property should be gradually reduced and then ended, he said.

Richardson echoed that position. He said defense-related population shifts are no longer occurring in the proportion experienced during the Korean War.

Youth Stabs Secretary of U.N. Delegate

NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (AP)—The Secretary of a United Nations delegate was stabbed in the back in Central Park today by a knife-wielding youth.

Mrs. Odile Villars, 28, discovered she was bleeding when she arrived at her office shortly after the attack. Police said she had apparently been struck with a penknife. Her condition was not serious.

Mrs. Villars is secretary to Guillaume Georges - Picot, France's permanent representative at the U.N. She was en route across the park from her home to the French delegation's office when attacked. She told police that a boy, about 16, approached her from the back and pushed her. Mrs. Villars turned and said "You must be crazy."

A moment later she felt something strike her back, which she told police she thought was a snowball.

Mrs. Villars was taken to a hospital for treatment. Officials said that back muscles were penetrated by the knife but the wound was not serious.

State Doctors Request Extra Money Expense

LONDON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Doctors working in Britain's state-run health service want the government to give them extra money for automobile expenses and decorating their offices. They also ask paid vacations of six weeks annually. A royal commission is looking into it.

Graduates Work

TOKYO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Communist North Korea disclosed it sent more than 80,000 high school graduates to work on cooperative farms in 1957. This was embodied in a report, broadcast by Radio Pyongyang, saying the grain harvest was a record 3,200,000 tons.

INNSBRUCK, Austria, Jan. 20 (AP)—Braving heavy snow storms, a small private airplane arrived tonight just in time to save the life of a local snake farmer who was bitten by a cobra.

Stick of Dynamite Found In Little Rock High School

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 20 (AP)—A stick of dynamite, uncapped and unused, was found in an empty locker at integrated Central High School today. Supt. Virgil Blossom called it a weapon of terror "to force us to close the school."

The dynamite, relatively harmless in its unfused, uncapped state, was found after a 30-minute search by city police and federalized National Guardsmen. An anonymous telephone call to a local radio station manager, Ray Bartlett, started the search.

Bartlett said the caller told him there were two sticks of dynamite planted in the basement of the 2,000-student school "in a locker"

At the hospital were Eugene Cox Sr., 38; Terry, 4; Marilyn, 3; and Ricky, 2.

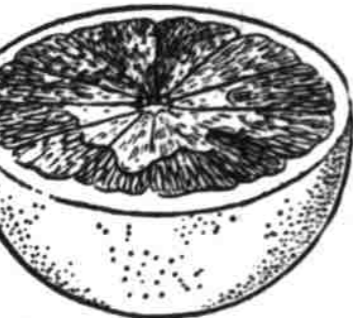
