

# Board May Fill Salem Senators Managerships Early This Week

Who is to guide the Salem Senators from both the front office and the Waters Field playing area may be named this week as board members scurry into the difficult task of hiring a general manager and a playing manager.

Thus far applications for the posts have been few, but only because it was not until last Friday night that the decision was formally reached to begin a field team in the Northwest League.

Senators chairman Elmer Berg and his staff of vice chairman Al Loucks, secretary-treasurer Vern McMullen and board members Ken Poets and Bill McMahon are to meet this morning at 7 o'clock at the Senator Hotel to further plans for the coming season.

But it is not likely they will name the general manager or manager during this confab. They feel that investigation of other possibilities is in order and, despite knowing of the shortage of time existing between now and the start of the 1958 season in April, do not intend being too hasty.

The board is to meet on an every-other-day basis for the next couple of weeks in an attempt to solidify advertising and season ticket selling campaigns and to come to a conclusion on who will occupy the positions held by Bill Brenner and Carl Gunnarson last season. Gunnarson, now a Salem resident, has applied for the business managership.

Since league president Jim Fiehsman last Friday told of a possible hookup with the Los Angeles Dodgers, the Senators chiefs are in the process of investigating it thoroughly. Were the Dodgers to install a working agreement here, they might also insist upon placing the manager of the club.

This type of arrangement exists at Westacbe where the Cincinnati Redlegs have a full working agreement with Bert Haas as the manager.

Legal forms for the new operating partnership for the club are being drawn and will soon be circulated for signatures of those who have pledged to become members of the partnership. A total of 98 have so pledged, but the directors are hoping to sign even more than that number so that individual percentages will be less than one per cent.

PALO ALTO, Calif., Jan. 20 (AP)—Oregon State's Beavers remained in the thick of the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race tonight by defeating Stanford 68-59.

The well-drilled Beavers of Coach Stas Gill posted their third conference victory against one defeat, leaving them behind Cal and UCLA which each have 5 and 1 records.

Stanford dropped to a cellar tie with Washington State with one win and five losses.

Oregon State broke the game open early. Trailing 7-0, the Beavers tossed in seven straight shots from the floor, including three by Dave Gambee to take a 20 to 10 lead. Oregon State continued to pick Stanford's defense apart and increased its lead to 43-25 at halftime.

Reserve guard Mike Tipton led a Stanford rally in the second half. The Indians drew to within seven points of the Northwest team 54-47, with nine minutes to play. Then Beaver forward Ken Nanson rolled in eight straight points to again put the visiting Beavers out of reach.

Gambee and Nanson topped OSC's scoring with 19 points each. Guard Lee Harman played an outstanding floor game for the Beavers and scored 14 points, 12 of them in the first half.

Mike Tipton was almost perfect in his brief appearance on the floor, hitting 3 out of 4 field goal attempts and 7 out of 7 free throws to lead Stanford with 13 points.

## South Tries For Initial League Win

The South Salem Saxons will try to prove the third time is a charm, and North Salem fans will get a chance to see their favorites in action against college freshmen in local basketball action tonight.

The Saxons take on Sweet Home in the Linn County city and will be trying for their first league victory after successive losses to Corvallis and North Salem.

The task this time promises to be as difficult as before. The Huskies stunned Corvallis 53-51 last week after beating Lehighon in their first league outing. They have a 9-2 season's record, compared to 1-11 for South Salem.

South coach Dick Ballantyne said Monday night he expects to start the same lineup that gave North Salem a battle for the first half of Friday night's game, with one possible exception. That exception is 5-9 guard Jay Brack, who suffered a charlie horse Friday and hasn't been able to work out since.

If Brack isn't ready, he will be replaced by either 5-9 Dale Wolf or 6-0 Bob Bayne. The other four starters will be 6-2 Dan Moore, 6-0 Gary Laha, 5-11 Charles Huddins, and 5-7 Whitey Brunkal.

Coach Lou Scriven is expected to start the same lineup that up-

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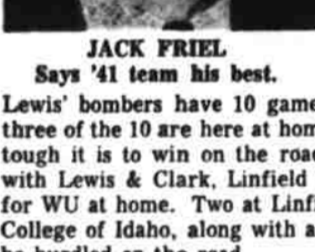

# West Virginia Keeps Lead in AP Hoop Poll

West Virginia's Mountaineers, hustling harder than ever after their one close call this season, racked up their 13th straight basketball victory last week and took a firmer grip on first place in the weekly Associated Press ranking poll.

Before taking 10 days off from competition while they face mid-year examinations, the Mountaineers whipped Pittsburgh 71-64 last Wednesday. It was their second decisive victory after a one-point squeaker against Villanova Jan. 8. They return to action next Saturday against Furman.

In the voting of 97 sports writers and broadcasters in the AP poll, West Virginia drew 71 votes for first place and 13 for second. Kansas, returning to second place in the balloting with the return of Drew Chamberlain to the lineup, drew seven first place votes. Cincinnati also drew seven.

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# At Tijuana Harrison Wins Open

TIJUANA, Mexico, Jan. 20 (AP)—E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, the elder golfing statesman of the crowd, slipped in quietly with his fourth straight sub par round today while the gallery was trailing the young players and walked off with victory in the \$15,000 Tijuana Open.

The 47-year-old Harrison, a native of Arkansas who plays out of St. Louis, with good but less spectacular rounds of 71-71-69, added another 20 today for a 72-hole total of 288, 10 strokes under par for the distance.

Dutch, whose attractive wife kidded him about being the old man of the field, finished earlier than the supposed hotshots, who had attracted the major galleries during the day.

When the final shout echoed from the 18th green, the runner-ups included Bo Winger of Odessa, Tex., Fred Palmer, El Paso, Tex., Arnold Palmer, LaTrobe, Pa., and Jerry Barber, Los Angeles, all tied at 281.

Harrison's quiet-life finish was in contrast to the blowup of 22-year-old Gossie, a most refreshing young pro trying for his first PGA victory.

Gossie was the co-leader with Stan Leonard going into the final round over the 7,400-yard long par 36-36-72 Tijuana Country Club.

And it was Gossie by one stroke over Fred Hawkins going into the final nine holes.

But J. C. went to pot on the 16th with a double bogey, and scrambled on with 36-38-74.

Harrison, meanwhile, with his 36-33-69 virtually unnoticed, was

# Akins Slated By DeMarco

BOSTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—Virgil Akins and Tony DeMarco, two of the welterweight division's most explosive punchers, meet tomorrow night in a scheduled 15-round bout which shapes up as a repeat performance of their terrific slugfest three months ago.

Akins, a 29-year-old church deacon in St. Louis, will be defending the Massachusetts version of the world's 147-pound championship which he won by knocking out DeMarco in the 14th round last October.

DeMarco, who turned 26 a week ago, finds himself at the crossroads needing a decisive triumph to stay among the top contenders and to continue as one of Boston's greatest ring attractions.

Akins also has plenty to lose—a probable shot at the title to be recognized by the National Boxing Assn.

The NBA recently gave title sanction to a bout between Isaac Logari and Vince Martinez, who defeated Gil Turner for the opportunity, and ruled that the Logari-Martinez winner must give Akins, or any fighter who beats Akins, a championship fight.

# Pro All-Star Tilt Tonight

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 20 (AP)—West coach Alex Hannum is doing some "hard thinking" about how to win the National Basketball Assn. all-star game tomorrow night over an East squad which he admits is superior.

The burly St. Louis Hawks coach said there is no doubt the East has superior personnel. The East has won five of the previous seven games.

"They've got us in size, offensive punch and defensive skill," Hannum said. He said he hopes his team "goes all out to win."

The East squad, coached by Red Auerbach of Boston, will have three members of the Celtics in the starting lineup, which is the limit under the rules.

They are Bob Cousy, two-time most valuable player in the seven previous all-star games, speedy shooter Bill Sharman and 6-foot-10 Bill Russell.

The other East starters, chosen in a poll of sportswriters and broadcasters, will be Dolph Schayes of Syracuse, a 10-year veteran who ranks as the leading all-time NBA career scorer, and big Willie Naulls of New York, chosen for the first time. Schayes and Cousy were picked for all seven all-star games.

This imposing five averages an even 100 points a game, topped by Schayes at 24.5 and Sharman at 23.5. Russell (17.7) leads the NBA in rebounding and shot-blocking.

West starters will be Bob Pettit (25.0) and Slater Martin (24.4) of St. Louis; George Yardley (22.7) of Detroit, the NBA's top scorer; Maurice Stokes (16.4) of Cincinnati and Dick Garmaker (16.3) of Minneapolis.

# Death Takes Cage Coach

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Jan. 20 (AP)—Ward "Piggy" Lambert, who put together the main ingredients of modern basketball—the big man and the fast break—died today after a 50-year sports career that embraced 29 years as Purdue's head basketball coach. He was 69 years old.

An embolism was blamed for his death in Home Hospital.

Admirers of the lean, shock-haired Lambert contended he got more mileage out of a basketball team and a coaches' bench than anybody else in the business.

He scooped back and forth on the bench, exhorting his boys to run—and they ran. Purdue was one of the first college teams to play a point-a-minute basketball and it won or shared 11 Big Ten titles while Lambert was coach.

Piggy introduced one of the first tall men to college basketball, Stretch Murphy, in 1928. Stretch was 6 feet 7—a common height in a modern lineup.

# Bruton's Knee Better; Spring Training Out

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 20 (AP)—Billy Bruton's right knee, operated on last October for torn ligaments, "seems to be all right" an Oklahoma City bone specialist who performed the operation, said today.

Dr. Dan O'Donoghue examined the Milwaukee Brave outfielder here today. He said that Bruton is "progressing but it's still to early to tell how soon he'll be able to play baseball. He won't be ready for spring training when it starts."

# Scanlon Wins Award

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Undefeated lightweight Bobby Scanlon today was named Northern California's boxer-of-the-year for 1957 and winner of the Russ Newland Memorial Award of the Society for California Boxing.

Runner-up for the award was Luke Easter, also a lightweight.

WOODBURN, Jan. 20 (Special)—The annual March of Dimes church basketball game between the Willamette University freshmen and the Woodburn Jaycees will be played at 8 o'clock Wednesday night at the Woodburn High School gym.

The Jaycees team is composed of former Woodburn High players. On the WU freshman team this year is Philo Gammis, also a former Woodburn star. A preliminary game will match St. Luke's and Washington grade schools of Woodburn.

Admission prices are 60 cents for adults, 25 cents for unescorted children, and 10 cents for children accompanied by adults. The game is sponsored by the Jaycees.

# Webb Knocks Out Calhoun

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Middleweight Spider Webb, knocked down for 9-counts in each of the first two rounds, surged back in the fourth to score a knockout over favored Rory Calhoun in the Cow Palace tonight.

A crowd of about 10,000 saw Calhoun, weighing 160 and hailing from White Plains, N.Y., stam Chicago's Webb, a pound and one-half lighter, to the canvas with right hand shots in the first and second rounds of the scheduled 10-rounder.

The muscular Calhoun had built up a commanding lead until midway in the fourth when Webb caught him with a terrific right to the jaw and Rory went down.

He barely made it to his feet as referee Jack Downey reached the count of nine.

Webb slammed back into Calhoun with a flurry of lefts and rights to the head and Rory went down helpless. Downey called a halt without the full count in 2:21 of the fourth.

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# Machen, Folley Matched for San Francisco Bout

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20 (AP)—Heavyweight boxers Eddie Machen and Zora Folley, the number one and number two ranking contenders for Floyd Patterson's crown, today were signed to meet here on March 17 in a 12-round go.

The National Boxing Assn. through its secretary Fred Sady, had proposed a Machen-Folley bout as a means of determining a logical challenger for Patterson.

Machemaker Benjie Ford announced that Machen, of Redding,

Calif., and Folley, of Phoenix, Ariz., had been signed for a \$15,000 guarantee each, or 25 per cent of the gate for their bout at the Cow Palace.

At this time, no TV or radio is planned for the Monday night fight.

Machen takes an undefeated record standing at 25-0 against Folley who was 29, lost two and fought one draw. Simultaneous with the announced signing came an offer from George Parnass, matchmaker at the Los Angeles Olympic Auditorium.

Parnass said he would guar-

antee Patterson \$250,000 to defend his title against the winner of this match with the fight to be held in Memorial Coliseum at Los Angeles.
