New Program PCC Plans Aid Meet

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 21 (AP)—The Pacific Coast Conference will hold a meeting in San Francisco March 14-16 to consider a new program of financial aid for student athletes.

Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt said the meeting will be attended by faculty athletic representatives and athletic directors. It was authorized by the conference last December. Fred Donald, president of the University of Washington, was named chairman of a committee to draft a program covering these points:

(1) Each institution could award a limited number of grants to student athletes for tuition and subsistence in return for a specified amount of work. A scholarship record somewhat higher than present standards would be required to qualify for this aid, and off-campus employment would be prohibited.

(2) Any student athlete not academically eligible for this aid could continue to receive aid as permitted under existing rules, but would be counted in the limited number of student athletes being permitted aid at the institution.

(3) If feasible, a formula to be developed permitting fewer hours of work than required under (1), with a proportionate reduction in the amount of aid, for student athletes who so desire.

The plan would become effective Sept. 1.

Hawaii Kai Crew Awarded Trophy

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (AP)—The John W. Mulford Trophy for the outstanding contribution to power boating in North America today was awarded to L. N. (Mike) Welch of Seattle and his 10-man crew of the unlimited hydroplane Hawaii Kai III.

Jack Regas, driver of the hydro which last season set a one-mile propeller driven water speed record of over 195 mph and completely dominated competition in the biggest motor boat class, was on hand to accept the high award on behalf of crew chief Welch and the crew.

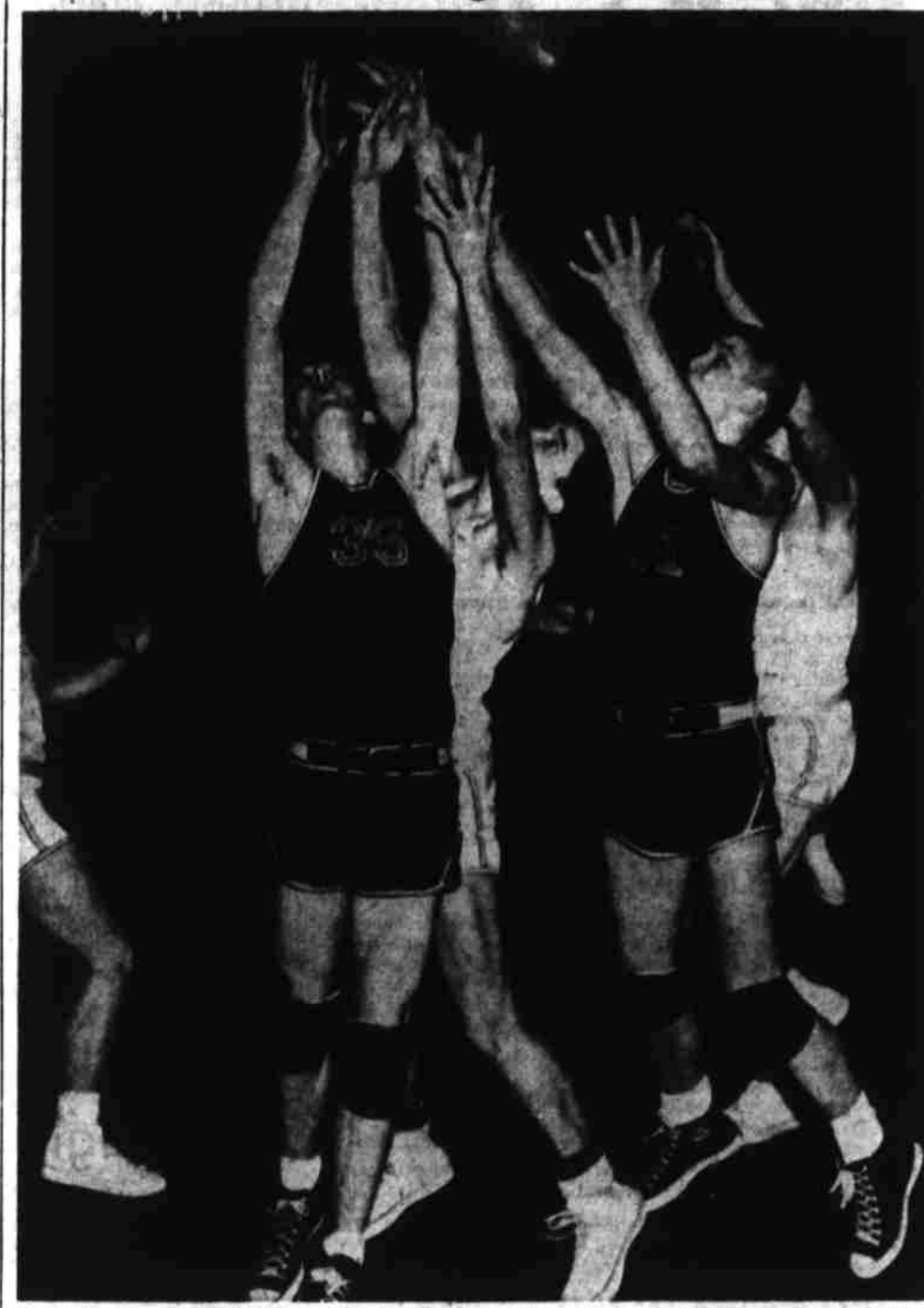

Crusaders Hold Yawama Loop Lead On 49-42 Victory; Dyck Hoops 15

Salem Academy wheeled out its long range artillery last night, shelled Yamhill for a 30-0 first quarter lead, then dog-fought it out for the last three to win 49-42. The Yawama League victory on their own floor gave the Crusaders a full game lead over idle Sherwood for top spot.

Copch Bob Fank's firemen found the Yamhill zone defense a tough pattern to dent, and began firing over their heads from 18 and 20 feet away, hitting 11 out of 20 tries in the first half for a remarkable .550 floor percentage. Yamhill was hitting 16 out of 28 tries for a respectable .428.

The Tigers lost the game at the foul line, hitting only 5 out of 14 in the first half, and 3 out of 8 in the second.

Playing with a cast on his injured left arm, Pettit did his best before a partisan crowd of 12,854 at the St. Louis Arena.

It was down to five points, 45-40 with 4 1/2 minutes to go. Howard Ediger followed through a shot missed by Roger Carter, and put Punk's fighters out to stay 47-40. Light hit a close-up jumper for the Tiger's final 42-point tally. Just as the buzzer sounded, Dale Crawford spilled Larry Dyck under the Crusader basket, and he plunked in both free throws after the game. Salem Academy also won the preliminary, 33-19.

The possibility of a tieup with the Los Angeles Dodgers is now under full investigation by the Salem Senators, it was revealed during yesterday morning's meeting of the local club's new directors.

Jim Mosell, the former major leaguer who has for many years headed the local Sears store and who is the Senators' new chairman of player relations, spent most of yesterday attempting to track down Dodger officials in Los Angeles.

"And even if I don't succeed in getting what we're after there," Mosell reported, "I'll

try other major league possibilities."

League president Jim Fleishman recently suggested the Senators investigate the Dodger possibilities, as their association in the Class B ranks ended with the folding of the Big State League in Texas.

Among other items acted upon during yesterday's meeting was the appointing of Bob DeArmond as legal advisor for the Senators. He will draw up the new partnership agreement and handle other legal affairs.

Also, it was reported that word has been sent to officials of Wascor, Cal., urging the consideration be again given the Sen-

ators as spring training period residents there.

A contact is to be made with Don Lundberg in Seattle, asking that he come to Salem to be interviewed for the open managerial post here. He managed the Wenatchee Chiefs part of last season, and was their regular catcher.

John Enger of Salem has applied for the business management, and the application has been put on file with others.

The directors are still in the process of cleaning up the 1957 indebtedness which amounted to over \$13,000. Of the 38 partners in '57, only 10 have yet paid their tabs, total of which comes to approximately \$3,000.

The triumph dropped Sweet Home from the undefeated ranks in the district, and left North Salem all alone at the top of the heap with a 3-0 record. Sweet Home is now 2-1, while South's Saxons, with this first district win, stand 1-2.

South got off to a slow start, and was behind 11-9 at the end of the first period.

It was in the second quarter that the Saxons sewed up the game. Bob Bayne scored nine points, Dan Moore and Whitley Brunkal five each. Gary Calaba three and Charles Hudkins two, and South roared into the lead at halftime, 33-22.

After that, it was a matter of holding the Huskies at bay. Sweet Home gained three points in the third period and four more in the last stanza, but was never closer than five points until center Mike Roberts hit a jump shot in the last seconds.

Scoring Led By Yardley

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (AP)—With a 27.3 point a game average, a 100-point lead and 60 per cent of the scheduled completed, George Yardley of the Detroit Pistons is having himself a whale of a good time in the National Basketball Assn.

The latest statistics put Yardley's point total at 1,301 with Dolph Schayes of Syracuse in the runner-up position at 1,101.

The Pistons star scored 31 points, his all-time high, against the Boston Celtics last Wednesday. This matched the season's top figure turned in by Bob Pettit of St. Louis against Syracuse Dec. 21. Pettit, although hampered by a wrist injury, holds down the No. 2 spot with 1,040 points.

Big Clyde Lovellette of Cincinnati is fourth with 1,018 followed by Bill Sharman of Boston, 978 and Cliff Hagan, St. Louis, 854.

Jack Twyman of Cincinnati is the leader in field goal accuracy with a .459 percentage on 294 field goals in 641 tries. Bill Russell of Boston still leads in rebounds with a per game average of 23.4.
