Family Farmer In Spotlight at Mt. Angel Meet

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 24 (AP)—Approximately 70 persons attended the all-day Marion County Farmers' Union meeting Friday at the Mt. Angel Legion Hall.

The national problem of the family farmer being crowded out by corporate farms was presented by Herbert Rolfe, of Portland, national vice president of the group. Rolfe, a state legislator, presented plans for the coming state convention to be Feb. 6 through 8 at the Salem Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall.

Hearings Due On Proposal To Sell KOAC

CORVALLIS, Jan. 24 (AP)—A series of public hearings will be held next month to get the public's reaction to a proposal to sell station KOAC at Corvallis.

An announcement from the Extension Division, which operates the station, said that for more than a year officials have been considering such a sale in order to divert the full efforts of the KOAC staff to development of educational TV programs.

KOAC-TV operates on channel 7, broadcasting educational programs. These are primarily for the colleges—Oregon State, the University of Oregon and Oregon College of Education—but the public also can receive the programs.

John Day Dam Site Approved

WALLA WALLA, Jan. 24 (AP)—A site for the 350 million dollar John Day Dam on the Columbia River has been officially approved.

Page said confirmation of the site is the key for the early advertising of bids for the construction of access roads.

Only one phase of planning remains to be settled, an Army statement said. That pertains to the number of skeleton units to be included in the detailed design of the dam.

Preliminary planning for the dam called for immediate installation of 12 units of 108,700 kilowatt capacity each.

Under the present design the dam will be 105 feet high with a reservoir 77 miles long extending from the headwaters of the Dalles reservoir to the tailrace of McNary Dam.

Wreck Injures Justice Douglas

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Justice William O. Douglas of the Supreme Court suffered a slightly wrenched back and a bloody nose in an automobile collision today.

He was being driven to work in a court automobile, operated by chauffeur Westley J. Pittman, when the auto was struck by a passenger car driven by a 15-year-old boy. The boy's name was not disclosed.

Douglas, 59, was thrown against the front seat. Pittman was knocked unconscious momentarily.

New Veneer Plant Due at Reedsport

PORTLAND, Jan. 24 (AP)—Officials of Cascades Plywood Corp. said today they expect to have a new \$400,000 veneer plant in operation at Reedsport by May 1.

It was not immediately plain what provoked Canzoneri. He was a former patient at Central Islip State Hospital, a mental institution on Long Island.

As police reconstructed it, Canzoneri first attacked his wife, Lucy, 63, with the hatchet, gashing her scalp. The daughter, Mrs. Caroline Calabro, 33, came to her mother's assistance and the father allegedly grabbed a kitchen knife and plunged it into the younger woman's breast.

The two wounded women fled down the stairs and into the street. Mrs. Calabro dropped dead of her knife wounds on the building's front stoop.

Meanwhile, Canzoneri apparently set out to avenge some sort of a grudge against the building superintendent. However, the superintendent was not hurt.

Dewey Linked To \$100,000 Airline Sum

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Rep. Moulder (D-Mo.) said today a House subcommittee he heads is investigating a report that Thomas E. Dewey received a fee of about \$100,000 from Eastern Air Lines in a case before the Civil Aeronautics Board.

Moulder said he is making no implications of wrongdoing.

A spokesman for Dewey's New York law firm, Dewey, Ballentine, Bushby, Palmer and Wood, said in New York that neither Dewey nor any other member of the firm had ever appeared before the CAB in Eastern's behalf.

The spokesman added the firm was retained by Eastern as New York headquarters counsel for two years but that this association ended last January.

Dewey, former governor of New York, was the Republican presidential nominee in 1944 and 1948. He is a friend of President Eisenhower's and visits the White House occasionally.

The fee mentioned by Moulder reportedly was paid to Dewey by Eastern while it had pending before the CAB an application for a route to Mexico.

Postage Price Linked With Missile Race

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—The price of postage stamps became intertwined with ballistic missiles today at a hearing before the Senate Post Office Committee.

Postmaster General Summerfield, pleading the case of nickel-letter mail, presented the committee a chart showing how much military hardware could be bought with the money his department is losing every year.

Right now, Summerfield said, the Post Office Department is operating at a loss of 700 million dollars a year. He said a two-cent increase in letter postage and other proposed rate increases would yield about 700 million.

Summerfield's chart showed this kind of money would buy any one of these military packages: 8 nuclear cruisers, 17 nuclear submarines, 300 intercontinental ballistic missiles, 700 intermediate ballistic missiles, or 87 B52 jet bombers.

Another Penguin Dies at Portland; Only 41 Remain

PORTLAND, Jan. 24 (AP)—Another member of Portland's shrinking penguin colony died here today.

This time the victim was a 70-pound Emperor, which yesterday had been put in an oxygen tent and given injections of antibiotics.

Its death, like most of the other fatalities, was caused by aspergillosis, a fungus lung disease.

Of the original 67 penguins brought to this country last year by the Portland Zoo, only 41 remain alive.

Seventeen have died here and nine in other zoos in the United States and Canada. The Portland colony now numbers 20.

Seaton Warns Of Overloading In Reclamation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Seaton today cautioned Western interests against "overloading" the reclamation program.

He told directors of the National Reclamation Assn. that orderly completion of projects on which work is already under way will take up all the money likely to be made available by Congress in each of the next three fiscal years, starting July 1.

He said that start of construction on some additional projects for which money is available this fiscal year would have resulted in a 1960-61 requirement of possibly as much as 400 million dollars to carry all forward on an orderly basis.

That would compare, he said, with a program of about 200 million proposed for 1959-60 and a peak reclamation program back in the 1930's of less than 300 million dollars annually.

"We were facing the practical problem of in 1960-61 having to ask substantially more money than Congress in all history has ever voted for reclamation in a year," Seaton said.

"We are trying to prevent overloading in 1960-61 which might mean we would have to stop work on some projects, which would be a breach of faith, or slow down all projects, which also in a way would be a breach of faith."

Holmes Points To Juvenile Court Blocks

NEWPORT, Ore., Jan. 24 (AP)—Oregon juvenile courts are handicapped by inadequate staffs and congested outdated laws, Gov. Robert Holmes said here today.

Public indifference also prevents dealing with juvenile problems more adequately, Holmes told the annual meeting of the Oregon Juvenile Courts.

"If we can dramatize and make graphic the financial costs of crime, the public will pay the money to prevent crime," Holmes said.

Juvenile court sentences are erratic, and their handling of cases inconsistent and uneven, Holmes said.

"I think a good juvenile code revision will help us make needed corrections," he told the county juvenile staffs and superior and county judges at the meeting.

The two-day meeting ends tomorrow.

While Mrs. Gladys L. Hall, 41, was doing this, Dr. C. A. Rudisill, owner of the trucking firm, had such confidence in her he left on a vacation to Europe.

"She is the most convincing con artist I have ever seen," said Asst. County Solicitor William C. McLean.

Korean War Vet Admits Killing Girl

WINNER, S. D., Jan. 24 (AP)—A Korean veteran today admitted slaying a missing 12-year-old girl he had picked up under guise of driving her to school and then throwing her nude body into a well.

Marvin Talbot, state's attorney, said he filed a murder charge against Paul Edward Huber, 26, after the bachelor farmer confessed in a tape recording that he strangled the girl when she resisted his advances.

The victim, Leslie Benedict, one of the seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Benedict of Winner, was last seen when she left for school Wednesday morning.

Huber's first confession was made to his sister, Mrs. Velma Honeman, this morning after he had spent the night at her home in Winner. It came while parties of more than 200 searchers, aided by planes, were combing the countryside for the missing girl.

Industry Said Hindered by Jobless Board

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Two representatives of private agencies have criticized Oregon's Unemployment Compensation Commission as a deterrent to industrial expansion.

Ivan Congleton, manager of the Columbia Empire Industries, said Tuesday's Fir-Tex ruling was "a severe setback for Oregon's business climate."

The ruling grants unemployment benefits to more than 100 workers who went on strike at the St. Helens Fir-Tex plant in 1955. They applied for compensation after they were replaced by new employees at the struck plant.

"This is another indication of the anti-business attitude of the present administration, which can only retard Oregon's industrial growth," Congleton said.

Slayer of Wife Given Life Term

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24 (AP)—I. Ewing Scott, 61, was sentenced to life imprisonment today for murdering his wife, who disappeared May 16, 1955.

Superior Court Judge Clement D. Nye sentenced Scott after denying a plea for a new trial. The penalty was fixed at life imprisonment by the jury which convicted Scott.

Scott's attorney, P. Basil Ambros, argued in asking a new trial that Los Angeles courts had no right to try Scott because there was no proof Mrs. Scott had been killed in this country.

Ambros said he would appeal denial of the new trial motion to the State Supreme Court.

Scott contends he last saw his wealthy socialite wife, Evelyn, then 63, when she sent him to her Bel Air home to a drugstore. He said she was gone when he returned. Scott contends she still is alive.

Pen Sentences Follow Escape Try at Hillsboro

HILLSBORO, Ore., Jan. 24 (AP)—Circuit Judge Glen Hieber has imposed seven-year prison sentences on two men who tried to escape from the Washington County jail by taking keys from Sheriff's Deputy Frank Winner.

Louis Victor Anicker, 23, Quincy, Wash., was sentenced to three years for forgery and seven for assault with a deadly weapon by a prisoner.

Herschel Lee Hobbs, 23, North Plains, Ore., was given five years for burglary and seven for assault while aiding escape of a prisoner. Both terms are to run concurrently.

Both defendants had pleaded guilty and were awaiting sentence when Anicker slugged Winner with a sap made from a bunk chain and sock, and Hobbs tried to take the jailer's keys. The escape was halted by an armed sheriff's deputy.

Funeral services for Navy Lt. William C. Brumfield, 24, Salem, who was killed Jan. 20 in a plane accident at Corpus Christi, Texas, will be held at 1:30 p.m. Monday at Calvary Baptist Church, with the Rev. W. Berkeley Ormond officiating.

Military rites will follow at Belcrest Memorial Park where interment will be made under direction of Virgil T. Golden Mortuary.

Extension Survey For 13th Street Held Up in Action

Marion County Court members temporarily tabled a request Friday to have John Anderson, county engineer, start surveys and studies for the proposed extension of 13th Street to form a couplet with 12th Street.

The request came from Marion County Planning Commission, concerning the proposed one-way couplet which would extend 13th Street south to Fairview Avenue. Part of the proposed construction would be within the city and the rest on county land.

The topic will "probably come up Monday," said commissioner E. L. Rogers. The subject was held up pending additional study of the project, he added.

Costume Jewelry Reported Stolen

City detectives said Friday that a Salem residence was burglarized and about \$2 in costume jewelry and some small change in a "piggy" bank were stolen.

'Mass Killer' Denies Charge By Yugoslavia

SURFSIDE, Calif., Jan. 24 (AP)—The man called the "Butcher of the Balkans" and "mass murderer" in the Yugoslav press lead forward and said: "I am not guilty of anything. I ordered no arrests or executions."

The Supreme Court last Monday ordered an extradition hearing for Andrija Artukovic, 58, former Yugoslav interior minister in the Nazi-supported government which ruled Yugoslavia in 1941 and 1942.

The Yugoslav government alleges that he ordered the purge of thousands and the execution of Archbishop Zimovica of Sarajevo and 23 other persons. Yugoslavia has sought his extradition since 1951.

Final Portion Of Banfield Freeway Open

PORTLAND, Jan. 24 (AP)—The widow and daughter of former state Highway Commissioner T. H. Banfield cut ribbons today, opening the final link of the east-side Banfield Freeway here to traffic.

Mrs. Margaret M. Banfield opened the east-bound lane of the highway named after her husband. Mrs. N. A. Workman, their daughter, opened the west-bound lane.

Speakers at the ceremony dedicating the 15 million dollar route included state Highway Engineer W. C. Williams, Portland Mayor Terry Schunk, and state Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan, representing Gov. Robert D. Holmes.

The route extends from the Willamette River in Portland east to Troutdale, where it joins the new water level Columbia River Highway.

\$2.9 Million Project Set at Klamath Base

PORTLAND, Jan. 24 (AP)—The Air Force today released details of a \$2,900,000 spending program which will start next spring at the Klamath Falls Air Base.

The Air Force said the lighter-interceptor base will be given high altitude navigational installation, as well as a theater and a dormitory for 133 men.

The appropriation also will pay for a 15,000-gallon fuel storage center, an ammunition storage depot, an engine shop and a lighting system for an 11,000-foot runway.

Bid calls probably will be issued in March.

Injured Bike Rider Critical

FOUR CORNERS, Jan. 24 (AP)—Eleven-year-old Barbara Preckwinkle, seriously injured Thursday morning when her bicycle collided with a car, remained semi-conscious and in "critical" condition at Salem Memorial Hospital tonight.

Barbara, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Preckwinkle, 4412 Hager St. SE, suffered a fractured skull when the bicycle she was riding collided with a car while en route to Four Corners Elementary School, attendants said.

CARS COLLIDE

BROOKS, Jan. 24.—Two cars were damaged in a rear-end collision two miles north of Brooks junction on the Portland-Salem Freeway tonight but no injuries resulted, state police said. The cars were driven by William J. Maddock, Portland, and Russell W. Large of British Columbia, officers reported.

Citizen, County Court Team to Clear Up Mud

An interested citizen and Marion County Court teamed up Friday to get rid of about 192 feet of mud on Vineyard Ave., which runs between Center Street and D Street near Hoover School.

The avenue, which has never been completely paved, is used by children in the area to reach the school and avoid the heavily congested Center Street route. But lately, the 192 feet of unpaved area have become 192 feet of pure mud.

It seems that several years ago a contractor paved the street, except for a short strip on the south end where he didn't own the property, a check by John Pierce, 765 Hawthorne Ave. NE, showed that the land was just a public thoroughfare, not under county or city authority.

E. L. Rogers, county commissioner, took the situation to the court Friday to acquire right-of-ways on the land. The plans are to convert it to county road system and perhaps pave, or at least gravel, it next summer.

A second problem of the elementary student versus the public highways will come up Monday at 10 a.m. at the courthouse, when Auburn School parents will confer with court members concerning Auburn Road from Lancaster Drive to the school.

A parents delegation has requested footpaths next to the road, which now has drainage ditches on both sides causing children to walk on the highway to reach the school. Several plans have been suggested with both the county and property owners to share expenses.
