

British Paper Says U.S. Grabs Credit For Taming H-Bomb

LONDON, Jan. 26 (AP)—A national newspaper here today accused Americans of attempting to steal the thunder from British scientists in the creation of Zeta—the machine carrying hopes of taming the H-bomb for industry.

This was the only source note in the unveiling here of the apparatus used in taking a step toward control of thermonuclear fusion as the pride of Britons rose to a height unexceeded since the days of World War II.

Zeta—zero energy thermonuclear apparatus—came as a shot in the arm to a people sensitive to recent criticism from abroad—and even heard at home—that Britain was lapsing into a second-rate power.

Man Shoots Clay Birds, Then Himself

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (AP)—A man walked into a shooting gallery just off bustling Times Square today, fired 17 shots at clay pipes and tin ducks, then turned the gun to his head and killed himself.

Police identified him as Charles Hauck, 34, a chauffeur, of Elmhurst, Queens.

Among his papers, police said, was a note to his wife, Georgette, dated Friday, saying, "You and the children will be better off without me."

The note also told of his exasperation with frequent hospital stays.

Police said the man walked into Hubert's Museum, a 42nd St. amusement center half a block from Times Square, bought two clips of 22 caliber rifle cartridges at 25 cents a clip and fired 14 times at targets. He paid for a third clip, fired three times, then put the rifle to his temple and fired the fatal shot. The rifle was chained to the gallery counter.

The shooting gallery is located at the rear of the center, which contains dozens of games and machines. One other customer was standing at the gallery counter when the man killed himself, but there were from 50 to 100 persons on the premises at the time.

Klan Leader Plans New Maxton Rally

MARION, S. C., Jan. 26 (AP)—The leader of the North Carolina Ku Klux Klan said today the KKK will hold another rally soon in Robeson County, N. C. and "this time there will be more Klansmen than Indians."

"The overall picture will be a lot different," said the Rev. James Cole, South Carolina preacher who bills himself as the chief of the KKK in North Carolina.

"We don't expect to be broken up again," he said at his home here. "This time there will be more Klansmen than there will be Indians. I don't expect any trouble from the Indians."

The Klan's last meeting in Robeson County, near Maxton, on Jan. 17 was broken up by gunfire from angry Lumbians. The Klansmen, outnumbered by hundreds of tribesmen, scattered like quail as whooping Indians fired hundreds of rounds of ammunition into the air and the ground.

At the Indian community of Pembroke near Maxton, Simeon Oxendine—son of Pembroke's Indian mayor, and leader of the Indian raid on the Klan—listened in silence to a report on Cole's statements.

He said that, did he? Well, we'll just wait and see," Oxendine said.

Cole is now fighting extradition to Robeson County on a charge of inciting to riot. The charge was made by Robeson Sheriff Malcolm McLeod, who said he warned Cole the Indians were angry over reports the Klan was planning the rally to warn Indians against mixing with whites.

Record Meal Helps Pay for Nursing Home

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 26 (AP)—The 2nd annual ham dinner to help pay for the \$35,000 Benedictine Nursing Home attracted 2,700 today, believed to be a record meal for Mt. Angel.

With more than 1,500 advance tickets sold, sisters announced that they were prepared to serve 2,000 but planned for 2,500. Like the proverbial fishes, the ham held out, but unlike the proverbial leaves, the cake ran short and cookies had to be substituted.

Sister Mary Regina said profits would exceed \$3,000.

S. B. Eshleman Taken by Death

Samuel B. Eshleman, former Salem contractor and past president of Willamette Eagles Aerie, died Sunday morning at Salinas, Calif., where he was taken ill while on a vacation trip. He was 67.

Eshleman, 494 Winter St. SE, was a carpenter in Salem for 35 years, part of the time as a contractor and in recent years as a foreman for Johnston Construction Co. He and his wife were traveling to Florida with a house trailer when he was taken ill at Salinas about a week ago.

He was born June 29, 1890, at Yale, Mich. He moved to Salem from Montana about 1923. He was a member of Jason Lee Methodist Church.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Elsie R. Eshleman, Salem, he leaves two daughters, Mrs. Charles Roberts, Salem, and Mrs. John Mitchell, Portland; three sons, Samuel and Dr. Donald B. Eshleman, both of Salem, and Army Capt. Earle B. Eshleman; two sisters, Mrs. J. W. Cavanaugh, Madison, Wis., and Mrs. Nettie Grey, North Battleford, Sask., Canada; three brothers, Bert B. Eshleman, Salem; David B. Eshleman, Escadada; Herbert B. Eshleman, Plant City, Fla.; 13 grandchildren.

Arrangements are pending at Virgil T. Golden mortuary, Capt. Eshleman, notified of his father's illness, was expected to arrive in California this morning by plane from Okinawa.

Youth Rescued From Mountain

NORTH BEND, Wash., Jan. 26 (AP)—Clark Phillips, 18, of Seattle was rescued tonight from a dangerous position on a steep slope of Mount Si.

A party of 19 experienced climbers reached him late tonight and succeeded in getting ropes to him. Phillips had been trapped on a rockslide at about the 3,500-foot level of 4,000-foot Mount Si. He and two companions had attempted to scale the mountain on its treacherous west face. They started their climb this morning. It was about noon when Phillips stepped into the loose shale from a mountain scar.

Methodist Home Building Dedicated

PORTLAND, Jan. 26 (AP)—A new \$1,275,000 addition to the Methodist Church's retirement home near Milwaukie was dedicated today.

It is the Willamette View Court retirement home, which is connected to Willamette View Manor by a covered, heated walkway. The new building has 127 patients.

Three Children Burned to Death

NORTHWOOD, Iowa, Jan. 26 (AP)—Three children of a family of 11 died today when trapped by fire which burned their two-story farm home to the ground.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Abrahams, and four other children escaped the inferno. Two other children were not at home.

The dead are Roger, 4, and two sisters, Barbara Eileen, 8, and Sharon Kay, 13.

Abrahams, 47, and his daughters, Mary, 16, and Shirley, 15, were brought to a Mason City hospital, 10 miles south of here. Mrs. Abrahams was treated at the hospital and released.

Bend Flaming Cross Mystery

BEND, Jan. 26 (AP)—State police said today they have not learned who put up a flaming cross on Pilot Butte last night. The cross was visible to all Bend while it burned about 20 minutes.

Police and officials said they regarded it as a prank. They said they know of no Ku Klux Klan group or any racial trouble in this area.

School Boys Fire Rocket At 700 MPH

HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 26 (AP)—A group of Houston school boys yesterday fired a \$10 rocket equipped with recording instruments two miles high at a speed of 700 miles per hour. They called it "a perfect strike."

The rocket was launched by the Rocket Research and Development Society, a 3-year-old organization which has tested 87 ballistic missiles.

The site was a swampy field about 15 miles south of downtown Houston.

The object, 30 inches long and 2 inches in diameter, was carefully positioned on its launching platform by Denis Ashton, 16, a high school student and president of the society.

It weighed five pounds and contained two pounds of fuel—zinc powder mixed with sulphur—with a primer of black gunpowder.

Fifty seconds after the rocket was launched it landed with a loud thump next to a tree in back of the launching platform.

"It worked exactly as we'd predicted," Ashton said. "As far as I'm concerned it was a perfect shoot."

"The accelerometer is in excellent condition," he said. "The rocket reached a speed of 700 miles an hour and went up two miles better than we'd expected."

Ashton said the firing was part of "a large project we're working on now which has the code name RID. It's a rocket five feet long and three inches in diameter."

Car Found But It's Bad Deal For Owner

A car reported stolen Saturday night in Salem was found early Sunday morning undamaged with two \$1 bills lying on the floor but it was still a losing deal for the owner, police said.

The convertible reported stolen by Arlo William Kimball, Salem, Rt. 4, Box 80, about 9:30 p. m. Saturday from the 300 block of State Street was found by state police about 1 a. m. Sunday in the 200 block of Court Street.

But Kimball was arrested later in the morning on charges of driving a car with switched license tabs and not having a registration card, police said. Besides posting \$30 bail on the two charges he had a bill to pay at the towing service which held his car until he claimed it, they pointed out.

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Father Fears 18-Year-Old Girl Kidnaped

WEBB CITY, Mo., Jan. 26 (AP)—A police lieutenant reported today that his attractive 18-year-old stepdaughter has been missing since she left home on a movie date Jan. 8.

Lt. Lewis Eppright said he fears she was kidnaped.

The girl is Norma June Keithley, a senior at Webb City High School.

Norma is a level-headed girl who isn't at all the kind who would run away from home, Eppright said.

Money Left Behind

Eppright figures Norma didn't intend to run away because, he said, she left behind two of three \$5 bills that were in her purse, \$75 in the bank and a check she had coming from a store where she works; a pair of new shoes she had never worn; and a new suede jacket worn only twice.

Eppright said he knew only this much about what happened:

Norma left home at 6:30 p. m. Jan. 8 with a friend. They said they were going to a movie in Joplin, six miles from Webb City in the southwest corner of Missouri.

She failed to return at 11 p. m. when she had promised to be home.

Receive Phone Call

At 5 a. m. the next day Eppright and his wife received a telephone call from Atton, Okla. A man identified himself as Norma's date and said he and Norma had got married.

"I asked him to put Norma on the phone," Eppright related, "and he put Norma—or a girl's voice—on. I said, 'Norma, is that you?' The girl said 'Yes,' real slow. I asked her what was going on, and her voice answered, and I told him again to put Norma on the phone. He wouldn't let her talk. She was only able to say 'Yes.'"

Later in the day, Eppright said, he found Norma's date in Joplin. The youth related that after he picked up Norma, they picked up two friends of his, one of whom owned the car he was driving.

Friends Were Drunk

The friends were drunk, the youth related, and they made him get out of the car after he suggested to Norma that she let him take her home in a taxi.

Eppright quoted the youth as saying his friends mentioned going to Texas. On the strength of that, Eppright said, he made a trip to Dallas, but neither city nor county police there could help.

Idaho Spuds in Maine No Surprise

LIMESTONE, Maine, Jan. 26 (AP)—The director of material at Loring Air Force Base said last night he wouldn't be surprised if Idaho potatoes were being shipped into the base, which is located in Aroostook County, the center of Maine's potato industry.

Lt. Col. James T. McNeely said, "There is no control over the buying of foodstuffs here. All potatoes, as well as other foods, are delivered by the Army Quartermaster Corps' regional office in Boston."

Sen. Smith (R-Maine) protested yesterday that Idaho potatoes were being eaten at Loring and demanded an accounting from the Air Force.

A. K. Gardner, consultant for the Maine Potato Commission, said he told the nation's only lady senator that Idaho potatoes shipped to Maine cost \$2.00 per hundredweight, plus three per cent tax, more than local spuds.

Lebanon Union High Dedicated

LEBANON, Jan. 26—More than 1,000 persons attended dedication exercises at the new Lebanon Union High School this afternoon.

Speaker was Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction who said that "school buildings will serve to solve problems of the present and future."

"No tangible missiles are possible without training, and furthermore of education is the most tangible type of missile," he added.

Among those attending was Charles D. Schmidt, superintendent of Salem schools, and Linn C. Tugman, editor-publisher of the Reedsport Post-Opportunity Courier.

Program included an open house at the school, which opened its doors to more than 1,000 students last fall.

EUGENE, Jan. 26—A line-up of professional journalists and educators will feature the 39th annual Oregon Press Conference on the campus Feb. 14-15, according to Conference Chairman William M. Tugman, editor-publisher of the Reedsport Post-Opportunity Courier.

"A Free, Creative and Responsible Press" is the 1958 Allen Memorial address, to be given by Dr. Ralph D. Casey, director of the school of journalism in the University of Minnesota. Dr. Casey, a former member of the Oregon journalism school, will speak on Friday afternoon.

Speaker at the Friday noon faculty-press conference luncheon will be Dr. Raymond Mikesell, Miner professor of economics in the university and a former consultant to the President's Council of Economic Advisors.

Judge A. T. Goodwin of the Circuit Court in Lane County, will discuss factors concerning press-judicial relationships in the Friday night banquet address.

The annual Press Conference is sponsored by the university's journalism school and the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' Association.

Radio Station Manager Injured

Three Youths Face Train Wreck Counts

CHILLICOTHE, Ohio, Jan. 26 (AP)—Three Ohio University students were arraigned today before U.S. Commissioner Willard C. Walter and ordered held for the grand jury under \$20,000 bond each on charges of trying to wreck trains.

The youths, James Jon Oeder, 19, of Rocky River; John Earl Hamm III, 18, of North Olmsted; and Gerald Baxter Hinkley, 18, of Fairview Park, all Cleveland suburbs, were released on bond posted by their fathers to allow them to take semester-end exams at the Athens school.

Walter said the youths paid when he read the possible punishment for the charges, a maximum \$10,000 fine and up to 20 years imprisonment or both.

Quaker Plans To Sail Ketch In Bomb Area

NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (AP)—A Connecticut architect said today he will fly to Los Angeles tomorrow to prepare a 30-foot ketch to sail into the Pacific Ocean nuclear bomb test area. He said he'll remain there "come what may."

Albert Bigelow, 51, of Cos Cob, Conn., said the purpose of the trip is to encourage the United States to halt nuclear bomb tests.

Bigelow, a Quaker, represents a pacifist group, some of whom entered the Nevada proving grounds during an A-bomb test last August. They were arrested for trespassing but received suspended sentences.

Bigelow said the ketch would sail Feb. 10. He will be accompanied on the voyage by William R. Huntington, 50, of St. James, N.Y., and two other persons, yet to be chosen, he said. Bigelow and Huntington are architects.

"Instead of competing in horror with the Soviets, let us challenge them to a crash program of health," Bigelow said at a news conference here.

The nuclear bomb tests are scheduled near Eniwetok in April. Bigelow estimated that the trip from the West Coast to Eniwetok would take about six weeks. The ketch is named Golden Rule and the entire voyage will cost about \$20,000, half of which he said had been raised by friends.

Flower Talks Scheduled At Silverton

SILVERTON, Jan. 26—Persons interested in growing and arranging flowers for the annual Silverton Flower show will be given an opportunity to hear authoritative speakers on the subject at a general meeting in Silverton in April. The Jay-C-Elites, who sponsor the show, are also sponsoring the meeting.

The club also will hold a white elephant sale at the same meeting to raise funds to help put on the show.

Mrs. W. L. Williams, president, has announced that a six unit Sky Rucker for the children's play area in the Coolidge & McClaine municipal park has been bought and will be put together by members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce before spring park playtime.

General Feared Dead in Crash

PRINCE, Frederick, Md., Jan. 26—Bits of wreckage from an Air Force plane which had been reported missing with a brigadier general and a major aboard were found today in Chesapeake Bay near here.

The Maryland Civil Air Patrol said there was no sign that either occupant had survived the crash.

They were Brig. Gen. Charles D. Jones, 46, deputy director of legislation and liaison for the Air Force, and Maj. Jess H. Gifford Jr., 35, a pilot instructor at Andrews Air Force Base, Md.

CAP Col. Robert J. Quinn said wreckage from the plane was spotted by one of about 50 aircraft searching the area off Cape Point, about 30 miles southeast of Washington.

The bomber had been scheduled to land at Andrews AFB, near Washington.

Refrigeration Can Bring Back Human Life, Russ Says

MOSCOW, Jan. 26 (AP)—Soviet scientists have brought dogs and monkeys back to life and are now working on bringing humans back from death through artificial refrigeration, Prof. V. A. Negovsky says.

He said dogs have been revived an hour after their hearts have stopped beating. With monkeys, he said, the scientists have managed to do it up to 20 minutes after the animal's so-called clinical death.

"I am firmly convinced," he said in an interview published today by the magazine Ogonyok, "human beings under artificial refrigeration can also be brought back to life not only five to six minutes after their clinical death but a great deal later."

75th Birthday of Civil Service Recalls Evils of Spoils System

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—This is the 75th birthday of some of Uncle Sam's closest relatives. They're the two million people who work under civil service.

It was in January 1883, that Congress decided the time had come to emancipate the poor old federal worker from the shackles of the traditional spoils system.

Year's Salary Paid for Job

Until the passage of the first Civil Service Act many a man was forced to fork over a year's salary for the right to hold a four-year job in Washington. Political parties imposed special levies against officeholders.

There was a veritable army of coming and going when administrations changed. When President William Henry Harrison took office in 1841 some 40,000 persons surged into town seeking work. Unfortunately, there were only 23,700 jobs to go around.

Going back to the beginning, George Washington insisted that federal workers be judged on savvy and merit—and not by the hue of their politics.

Thomas Jefferson, assuming the presidency under the Republican—now Democratic—banner in 1801 astonished his supporters by practicing a bit of Jeffersonian democracy in refusing to fire Federalist party officeholders.

Madison, Monroe Follow Course

The two James—Madison and Monroe—followed the same course.

In 1828, Congress enacted legislation declaring many federal offices vacant after four-year periods.

Hagerty Says 17 Defense Points Backed Solidly

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (AP)—Presidential press secretary James C. Hagerty said today President Eisenhower and all members of the administration agree with a 17-point defense program recommended last week by a Senate subcommittee.

Hagerty, interviewed on the CBS-TV program, "Face the Nation," was questioned about the 17-point program made public Thursday by a Senate Preparedness subcommittee headed by Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.).

The subcommittee, after more than 100 days of hearings, proposed stepped-up programs in missiles of various types, in anti-missile missiles, strategic airpower, submarines, warning systems, and civil defense. It also proposed more exchange of information with other nations and reorganization of the Defense Department.

Hagerty said all but four or five of the committee's 17 points "are now in the works."

"Almost all of them," he added, "were incorporated in public speeches made by the President earlier, such as his State of the Union message and his budget message to Congress."

"I know of no one, the President included, who doesn't believe in the right of Congress to conduct investigations. I also know of no one, the President included, who doesn't believe that public debate and discussion strengthens the country's ability to take action."

Camp Pendleton, Calif.—Marine Pvt. David M. Wheelhouse, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Denny, Stayton, Ore., recently took part in an air-ground landing exercise by units of the First Marine Division at Camp Pendleton.
