

Portland Symphony Orchestra Shows Admirable Precision

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The Portland Symphony Orchestra, led by Theodore Bloomfield, demonstrated its mid-season achievements last evening in the Willamette University Auditorium. We were treated with admirable technical precision and a noticeable mellowing of tone since the first S-tem concert near the opening of the season.

Smetana's Overture to The Bartered Bride opened the concert, with the strings in particular crackling like a whip. Next, every part of the orchestra was exposed in the demanding Petrouchka by Stravinsky. Five players were peeping in and out of the limelight.

light with split-second timing. For the closing Pathétique Symphony of Tchaikovsky the orchestra figuratively regrouped itself into a blend that was just right. One listens to the Petrouchka ballet music objectively and asks

for no sustained mood. Following the composer's advice, one only observes emotion. Along the way there were countless interests. There were plain tunes of direct appeal, perhaps by one, or a pair, or a group of instruments. There were odd high tones, and odd low tones. There was humor one moment, and pathos the next moment. Mr. Bloomfield was waving his arms as if he were skittering from one circus tight wire to another one, but he obviously knew his way, for he safely led his players through mazes of irregular episodes.

It is remarkable that in spite of one's self a person is carried away by the Pathétique Symphony. The genius of Tchaikovsky doesn't allow any cool reception. Credit Mr. Bloomfield and his players for not overdoing a good thing. They were wise to treat the old chestnut with moderation. I couldn't at first adapt myself to the change from Stravinsky to Tchaikovsky, but with the bang of the development section in the first movement I was captured. Give me, though, more light-footedness in the second movement.

Thanks are due Dr. James S. Hart for the thought-provoking program notes. Too bad that it was necessary to omit the professional practice started in the year's first program of including the names of the orchestra personnel.

Sinatra Seeks FCC Approval Of KXL Sale

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—Singer Frank Sinatra and associates today asked the Communications Commission for authority to acquire three radio stations in the Pacific Northwest for approximately two million dollars.

The stations involved are KJR, Seattle; KNEW, Spokane, Wash., and KXL, Portland, Ore. They now are operated by Mount Rainier Radio and Television Broadcasting Corp., owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln Deller and Mr. and Mrs. Lester M. Smith.

Patriots Back Venezuela's New Regime

CARACAS, Venezuela, Jan. 28 (AP)—The patriotic junta of civilians that triggered the revolution against ex-dictator Marcos Perez Jimenez climbed off the fence today and gave its full support to Venezuela's new regime.

Fortified by this civilian support, and with the all-out backing of the armed forces, the ruling junta swung into a nationwide purge of the government machinery.

The patriotic junta, headed by the youthful newspaper reporter Fabricio Ojeda, previously had refused to take a stand behind the rebuffed junta which seized the government last week.

Apparently satisfied the new regime was not attempting to impose a new dictatorship, the civilian group declared it was giving its full support. However, it called for general elections as soon as possible and urged political parties to observe a truce in the meantime.

Venezuela appeared to have settled down to comparative peace. Newly appointed governors in 20 states and two territories took over from ousted Perez Jimenez appointees in the oil-rich republic.

Under arrest was Maj. Juan Perez Jimenez, brother of the exiled dictator, who was held for investigation on charges of official corruption. He was seized when the dictator refused to hold his plane for him, and fled to the Dominican Republic.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—The United States today recognized the new government of Venezuela. The State Department said in a statement that Charles R. Burrows, U.S. charge d'affaires at Caracas, has been instructed to inform the Venezuelan government of provisional recognition.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—Ruth A. Marshall, 17, of Corvallis, Ore., is one of 40 high school seniors named today as finalists in the 17th annual national talent search.

Her prize is an expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., to compete for \$34,250 in scholarships and awards during a five-day Science Talent Institute beginning Feb. 27.

Some 25,029 students entered the talent search, sponsored by the Westinghouse Educational Foundation, supported by the Westinghouse Electric Corp.

Gov. Joe Foss Candidate For Congress

PIERRE, S.D., Jan. 28 (AP)—Gov. Joe Foss, World War II flying ace, changed his mind today and said he will be a candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress from South Dakota's 1st District.

The seat now is held by Rep. George McGovern, a Democrat. Foss, 42, said he decided to become a candidate "because of the growing threat to the nation's security" and after insistence of South Dakotans "from both parties" who believe his military background will be helpful in the efforts of Congress to strengthen the defense organization.

The governor, a Medal of Honor winner, said last September he would retire from politics this year because of family considerations.

Master Degrees For Three State Colleges Approved
PORTLAND, Jan. 28 (AP)—The curriculum committee of the state Board of Higher Education has approved a program calling for the state's three colleges of education to be permitted to grant master of education degrees.

The committee also approved expansion of courses offered at Portland State College.

John Richard, chancellor of the state System of Higher Education, recommended the curriculum changes.

Research Funds Goal of Group

PORTLAND, Jan. 28 (AP)—Oregon's chancellor of higher education says he will set up a committee to help the state's colleges get a larger share of federal government research projects.

John Richards said most research projects in the state now go to the Oregon medical and dental schools. Oregon State College and the University of Oregon. Within 10 years, Richards told the Oregon Board of Higher Education, research projects should be spread through smaller state-supported and private colleges.

Government research programs now contain serious "imbalances," Richards told the board. Too many colleges get too small a share of projects, he said. Richards also criticized the creation of government and military laboratories where scientists are retained in too tightly by security measures.

At its meeting today, the board named Dr. John Swarthout, the new dean of faculty at Portland State College.

Swarthout has been head of the political science department at Oregon State College.

The board deferred calling bids on the third unit of a new women's dormitory at the University of Oregon until its March meeting.

Ex-Patient Charged in Bizarre Case

FORT SMITH, Ark., Jan. 28 (AP)—A former mental patient today was charged with killing and decapitating his mother in what he told officers was an ancient Aztec ritual.

Within approximately four hours Bobby Joe Burns, 28, was found, arrested, questioned, charged with first degree murder and sent to the state hospital at Little Rock for mental examination.

The sequence climaxed a bizarre murder case which unfolded Monday with the discovery of the severed head of Mrs. Edna Burns, 58, in a Catholic church. Officers later found her beheaded body in the kitchen of her home.

Burns, found walking on a nearby highway, was brought to Fort Smith and turned over to police.

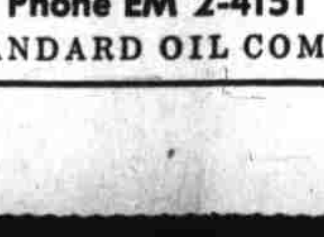
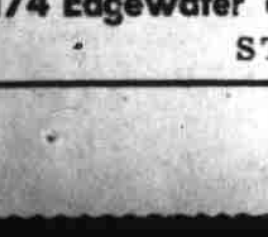
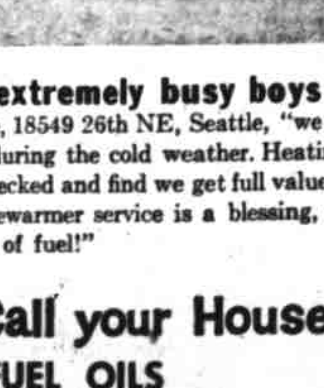
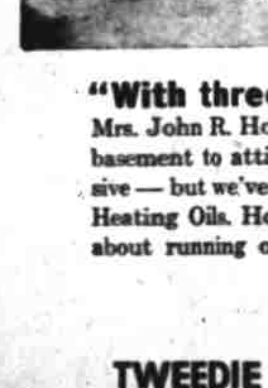
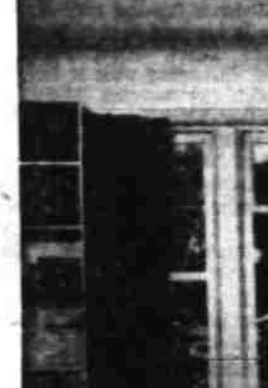
Salem Man Bound To Federal Jury in Mail Theft Case

Bail for Cain was set at \$2,500. The hearing was held before U.S. Commissioner Claire Mundorf. Money orders were taken from Gervais postoffice Dec. 7.
