

Researcher Finds That There's Much Variety In Italian Dish

With all the recipes for pizza, and the ready mixed and canned varieties, my ladies still want recipes—and I always have to look around frantically before I remember to look in the most logical place my recipe file.

Some want them to use slow yeast dough, some want them instantaneous, using buns or rolls. Some want hamburger, others fish, or pork. By that time the pizza is a long way from its native Italy, but a very good tidbit withal.

Here, then we have a pizza of the old style.

Pizza

Dough

- 1/2 package granulated or 1/4 cake yeast
- 1/2 cup lukewarm water
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Filling

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Mozzarella cheese
- Tomatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- 8 anchovy fillets
- Parmesan cheese

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Sift flour with salt onto board and add yeast. Knead thoroughly for 15 minutes then add the 1 tablespoon oil, knead again

until dough is smooth. Work into a ball. Cover with a cloth and set in a warm place until doubled in bulk.
Roll or stretch dough into a large circle, 1/4 inch thick and a little thicker at the edges. Lay on a generously oiled baking pan, cover dough generously with 1/4 inch slices of the Mozzarella cheese, sprinkle cheese with 1 tablespoon oil and cover with tomatoes that have been peeled and cut into 1/2 inch slices. Sprinkle with oregano, salt, pepper to taste. Cut anchovy fillets into small pieces or the tomato slices and sprinkle the remaining 2 tablespoons oil over the whole. Bake in a 400-degree oven for 20 minutes or until a golden brown. Sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese and serve very hot.

Those Americans who are speeding up their homework with a pizza, this time with pork.

American Pizza

- 1 pound bulk sausage
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme
- 1/2 clove garlic
- 2 cups biscuit mix
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup grated American cheese
- 1 1/2 cups canned tomatoes, drained

Brown sausage in fry pan; drain off fat; add thyme and garlic. Combine biscuit mix with milk to make a soft dough. Roll out to fit a 9-inch pie pan. Fit dough in pan, crimp edges. Pour in meat, add cheese and tomatoes and bake at 450 degrees for 25 minutes. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese before baking if desired. Makes six servings.
