

Beavers Again Face Road 'Jinx' Friday

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 28 (Special)—Sudden plagues by a road jinx that has seen them lose two of three games on enemy courts in Coast Conference basketball play this month, the Oregon State Beavers will again be face to face with this issue Friday night.

Coach Stas Gill takes his Beavers to Eugene for the first conference clash of the season between the arch rivals.

First signs of the road whammy came in mid-month when the

Beavers went to California to play both Cal and Stanford. They were then sporting a fine record of 10 wins, 1 loss, and the only setback had been in an overtime game against Iowa at Iowa City.

But the Berkeley Bears downed the Beavers. Then OSC defeated Stanford before returning home last week to wallopp the Washington Huskies in a one-sided 81-58 Friday night. This impressive win kept the Beavers' record at home spotless.

It was back in the rut Saturday night at Seattle, however, as the Huskies turned in a surprising 45-42 upset win.

Oregon has been showing definite signs of being able to make it tough on any team in the conference. Coach Steve Belke's improving Ducks thumped the Washington State Cougars 63-45 at Pullman on Friday, and then dropped a narrow 81-76 decision to the strong Idaho Vandals at Moscow Saturday. Prior to those two, the Ducks upended the

Washington Huskies at Eugene. With things shaping up as they are in the conference race, Friday's mix is practically a "must win" item for the Beavers. They now have a record of 42 in the conference and trail Cal and U.C.L.A. both with 5-1, and Idaho, with 5-2. Oregon's current mark is 2-4.

The Beavers return to Corvallis Saturday night to face Stanford. The Stanford club then plays Oregon at Eugene on Monday night.

Campanella Hurt In Car Accident

Broken Neck May Finish Career

GLEN COVE, N. Y., Jan. 28 (AP)—Roy Campanella's brilliant career as one of baseball's greatest catchers appeared at an end today. An auto accident broke his neck and left him temporarily paralyzed.

A seven-man team of surgeons worked over the Negro star of the Dodgers for four hours and 20 minutes in an attempt to repair the damage to his husky frame and relieve paralysis from the chest down.

Afterward, Dr. Robert W. Sengstaken, head of the surgical team, termed the operation a success and said the paralysis is expected to disappear. But it may be six weeks before Campanella is up and around.

Dr. Sengstaken, who said the injury came within an inch of killing the player, did not rule out the possibility that Campanella might play baseball again. But the future, nevertheless, was bleak for the heaviest hitting catcher in the history of the sport.

The doctor said complete recovery might require months or even years. With age a factor in baseball, Campanella could not spend too much time away from the game if he is to continue.

"In my opinion," the surgeon added, "he would be foolish if he tried to continue playing baseball. But he's not my patient and I won't advise him."

Dr. Sengstaken was called in on an emergency basis to direct the operation.

PORTLAND, Jan. 28 (Special)—Portland State handed Oregon College of Education its seventh straight Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball defeat here tonight, 51-40.

The winless Wolves have now dropped 11 games this season, 11 of the third consecutive win for Portland State, which lost its first four league tilts.

The Vikings led all the way, but pulled away in the final minutes on the shooting of Johnny Winters, who collected 14 points for the evening. Winters, held scoreless in the first half, picked up seven points in the last four minutes.

The score was 36-29 at the four-minute mark, when the Wolves broke out of their zone in an attempt to get the ball. The month-mouth club closed the gap to 44-40 with about two and a half minutes left.

At that point Winters broke loose for seven consecutive points to ice the game.

Francis Gets Grid Award

PALO ALTO, Calif., Jan. 28 (AP)—Stanford all-American Ernie Werner, presenting the 1957 Pop Warner award to Oregon State's Joe Francis tonight, called Francis "one of the greatest backs ever turned out on the Pacific Coast."

Never presented the award at the Palo Alto annual banquet. The award is made by a poll of sports writers and broadcasters to select the Pacific Coast's most valuable college football player.

"If Pop Warner were here Joe Francis of Honolulu is just the kind of player he would want to coach. Joe can kick, pass and run and play defense."

"Football players like that are hard to find," Werner said.

In accepting the gold football award Francis said "this is a night I will never forget." He gave credit to his coach Doc Prothro "who gave me a chance to learn some football and of course to my teammates too."

Chuck Taylor, who retired from coaching to become Stanford's assistant athletic director, said of Francis:

"He's one of the reasons I decided to give up coaching. There's no defense for a player of the capabilities of Joe Francis."

Francis ran and passed for 274 yards in Oregon State's 24 to 14 victory over Stanford.

Beavers Back In 20th Place

West Virginia's basketball team, beaten for the first time this season just after being ranked No. 1 in the nation for the sixth straight week, gets an extra chance to put the pressure on its rivals before the next ballot is taken.

West Virginia took the top rating in the weekly Associated Press college basketball poll, based on games through last Saturday, by a wide margin over Kansas. The votes of sports writers and broadcasters were counted Monday and a few hours later Duke knocked the Mountaineers out of their unbeaten status by a 72-68 score.

West Virginia's next start comes Friday against Florida State in a game scheduled only a couple of weeks ago to give the Mountaineers a test prior to an important meeting with still-unbeaten St. John's of Brooklyn in New York, Feb. 6. Meanwhile, most of the other top-bracket college teams will see plenty of action this week.

Two others ranked in the first 10, Oklahoma State, No. 6, and Kentucky, No. 8, were beaten Monday night and both will have chances to recoup later this week. Kansas, the No. 2 team, remains idle until its big one against fourth-ranked Kansas State Feb. 3.

Oklahoma State, beaten 70-64 by unranked Houston and knocked out of the Missouri Valley Conference lead, meets St. Louis Saturday. Kentucky, the 71-52 upset victim of Georgia Tech, continues its tour, meeting Georgia Wednesday and Florida Friday.

Cincinnati, which edged out Kansas State for third place in this week's ratings, gets two chances to improve its position and scoring record. The Bearcats meet Miami of Ohio Thursday and Duquesne Saturday.

Bethea Liked In Video Tiff

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (AP)—Two hard-swinging, if unheralded heavyweights, Wayne Bethea of New York and young Jack Johnson of Los Angeles, trade punches in a nationally televised 10 rounder at the Chicago Stadium tomorrow night.

Bethea, 24, who works in a Bronx tomato packing plant, is a 7-5 favorite over Johnson, 29, who holds knockout victories over Zora Foley, current No. 2 heavyweight contender, and former champion Ezzard Charles.

The match will be viewed over ABC-TV at 7 p.m. PST, in the Wednesday night fight series. It will be the 26th pro start for both Johnson, who stands 6-3 and weighs 204, and the 5-11 Bethea, who also tops 200 pounds.

Johnson is a substitute in this rematch for Chicago's Bob Satterfield, 8th ranked heavyweight, whose career has ended because of an eye injury.

Bethea owns a 16-7 record and has scored 6 knockouts. Johnson, who has had trouble getting bouts—having only one start last year—has a 19-8 record, including 8 knockouts.

Sneed Blasts Pro Golf Regulations

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—The professional golf tour has become a stereotyped, push-button operation without much of its oldtime glamor, Sam Sneed said today.

The hillbilly professional from White Sulphur Springs, West Va., in town to be honored by Metropolitan golf writers tonight, added that he felt tightening rules and regulations were robbing the game of its individualism.

"If you try a practice putt you may be fined \$50. If you use a little polite profanity you get stuck for \$75 or \$100. Get sore and break a club and it may cost you \$500."

"It's a good thing they don't have live readers on the course. I'd go broke in fines."

Sneed made his criticism of golf's "new look" in the presence of Ed Carter, tournament director of the Professional Golfers Assn., and the man who helped install the new directives.

"Why, if these rules were in effect in Walter Hagen's day he'd probably have been thrown out of golf for some of his antics—arriving late at the tee and so forth. But the people loved him for it and he became a character."

Sneed also criticized the PGA method of selecting its Ryder Cup team as well as the present system of figuring low scoring averages.

"Pro golf has become an attendance contest," he said. "Players are given points for showing up. There have been occasions when the Ryder Cup team had a man on it who had not won a tournament in the two years involved."

Sneed received the gold teardrop award tonight at the annual Metropolitan golf writers dinner. The award is for meritorious service to golf over the years.

Hogan Will Enter Three Golf Meets

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 28 (AP)—Ben Hogan announced today he will play in three golf tournaments this year. He will attempt to win the Masters tournament for the third time and the Fort Worth Colonial and U.S. Open titles each for the fifth time.

Hogan, who will be 46 in August, now heads a firm here which manufactures golf clubs bearing his name.

Austrian Skiers Pay Compliment to Werner

BAD GASTEIN, Austria, Jan. 28 (AP)—Two Austrian skiers who are the best in the business paid Buddy Werner of Steamboat Springs, Colo., the supreme compliment today.

"He is just as good a skier as we are," said Toni Sailer and Anderl Molterer.

Werner is the United States' only logical hope for one of the four men's world Alpine championship titles to be decided in this highly fashionable Old World resort Feb. 1-9.

Skiing follows form even more closely than tennis and based on form other American men here are several degrees behind the Werner-Sailer-Molterer class. American skier rate as the championship dark fillies.

Shaw Quits AF Position

Business Press Brings Decision

DENVER, Jan. 28 (AP)—Lawrence T. (Buck) Shaw, 60-year-old college and professional football veteran, was released today from his contract as coach at the Air Force Academy.

Although Shaw was not available for comment, it was reported as he did not want to spend as much time at the academy as school officials wished. Shaw has business interests in California.

Shaw's five-year contract had three years to go. He has been the first regular coach at the Nation's newest service school which hopes eventually to play Army, Navy, Notre Dame and other football titans on even terms.

Col. George R. Simler, director of Athletics at the Academy, announced the parting. Shaw is in California on business. He is vice president of the Royal Container Corp. of San Francisco.

Simler declined comment on financial arrangements but it was reported Shaw has agreed to accept one-half of his salary for the remaining three years. His salary was \$100,000 a year.

Johansson Wants 'Pat'

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 28 (AP)—Sweden's Ingemar Johansson, the forgotten man in the heavyweight picture, today challenged world champion Floyd Patterson to meet him in a title fight. His challenge was promptly rejected by Patterson's manager.

Johansson, the undefeated European champion, risks his crown against Erskine, the British Empire ruler, at Goteborg, Feb. 21. Joe Erskine appears set to meet Patterson in London in June if he defeats Johansson.

"I am willing to meet Patterson any time but I have a feeling I am altogether left out of this British-American squabble over title fights," said the 25-year-old Swede.

Johansson, winner of all 18 of his pro fights, made his comment yesterday that Cus D'Amato, Patterson's manager, and a British promoter Harry Levene, had "agreed in principle" on an Erskine-Patterson title fight providing Erskine conquers Johansson.

In New York, d'Amato said Johansson doesn't figure in his current plans.

"He's a latecomer," said d'Amato. "It's the first time he's expressed himself in this direction. I haven't heard his voice raised prior to this. Now everyone wants to get into the act."

Eagles Choose Jack Crabtree

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 28 (AP)—The Baltimore Colts, already loaded with talented quarterbacks, dipped into the National Football League college player draft bag today and came up with quarterback Ray Brown, hero of Mississippi's Sugar Bowl winner.

Baltimore, armed with the first choice at the selection meeting as the result of a previous deal with the Chicago Cardinals, selected the 21-year-old Brown even though the Colts own such fine quarterbacks as John Unitas and George Shaw.

The 12 NFL clubs, gathered here for their annual four-day winter meeting, selected 312 players through 28 rounds of the draft. Today's drafting began with the fifth round of the annual 30-round pickings since the first four rounds were held last Dec. 2.

Green Bay, selecting second in the fifth round, grabbed Joe Francis, 195-pound triple threat halfback from Oregon State. The Packers indicated they would use the Pacific Coast single-wing tailback, star of the 1957 Rose Bowl, as a T-quarterback. Packer coach Sanders UCLA head coach Red Sanders of UCLA rated Francis better than any tailback he had ever coached.

The Rams, in an effort to strengthen their line, selected Francis Woldick, six-foot four, 250-pound Buffalo tackle with a choice acquired from Pittsburgh, and then took 300-pound John Baker, North Carolina college tackle.

The New York Giants named Dick Day, a 245-pound University of Washington tackle capable of playing either offense or defense and with a choice obtained from Baltimore, selected Bobby Conrad, a defensive halfback from Texas A & M.

The Browns picked up a pair of offensive ends, Farrell Fumston, a "sleeper" from the College of the Pacific and Jim Gibbons, a third-team All-America from Iowa.

The Philadelphia Eagles also reached into the smaller college ranks for their fifth choice, naming Bob Mulgoad, halfback from the unbeaten Arizona State Eleven.

Bob Jewett, Michigan State end who was named the outstanding player in the North-South Shrine Game at Miami when he caught 14 passes, was the choice of the Chicago Bears.

The Washington Redskins selected Mickey Hag, a quarterback from the University of Texas. The Redskins' choice was a defensive star, while San Francisco coach Alvin Karpis, the leading groundrunner for Auburn, the nation's No. 1 football team of 1957.

Yardley Tops Pro Scorers

NEW YORK, Jan. 28 (AP)—George Yardley of the Detroit Pistons and Dolph Schayes of the Syracuse Nationals are in a tight race for individual scoring honors in the National Basketball Assn.

Through 48 games Yardley has a total of 1,313 points and an average of 27.4 a game official figures disclosed today.

Schayes has 1,221 points and a 25.4 average. But he is hitting at a 905 percentage on free throws, level with the record set by Bill Sharman of Boston last season.

Yardley has more free throws than Schayes, 451 to 427, but he has had 85 more attempts.
