

Morgan Gives Up Jurisdictional Fight Over Portland Fares

PORTLAND, Jan. 29 (U-P) — Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan today gave up the present at least, jurisdiction over bus fares and apparently eliminated the threat of Portland losing its only mass transit system.

The Rose City Transit Co. notified the City Council earlier this week that unless it was granted permission to raise fares 5 cents — to 25 cents a ride — it would pull its busses off the streets Feb. 27.

Morgan had said state law provided him with the final say on fare increases. As a result of this, one member of the city council refused to vote for an emergency ordinance permitting the increase and the situation was deadlocked — with Rose City Transit threatening to halt service and the City Council unable to grant fare increases on an emergency basis.

Fare Raise Possible

Morgan's statement today, giving up jurisdiction, would appear to clear the way for the council now to grant the emergency increase and keep the bus system operating.

Early today, in an apparent effort to get out from under state control, Rose City took all its electric trolley busses out of service. The city attorney said that the Public Utilities Commission might have control over them, but that he did not have jurisdiction over gasoline-powered busses.

Morgan said today he was not permanently abandoning his claim to jurisdiction.

Action Called Fantastic

"However, in view of the fantastic action taken by the company in destroying its trolley bus system in an attempt to establish a legal point and the even more fantastic action of the City Council in approving such destruction, I shall be guided by the obvious desires of the majority of the council and will not interpose objections to the proposed ordinance to raise fares unless my power to do so is expressly affirmed by the courts or by the attorney general," Morgan said.

Morgan added, however, that the law clearly defines street transportation in cities of more than 50,000 persons as a utility and subject to regulation by his office.

State Suspends Driver License Of Elkins' Pal

The driver's license of Raymond F. Clark, associate of Portland gambler James Elkins, was ordered suspended Wednesday by James F. Johnson, state director of motor vehicles.

Clark's traffic record was checked after he was found hiding in a box in a panel truck operated by Elkins near a Portland area Safeway store.

Investigation revealed that there have been three traffic violations since Clark's license was reinstated last February after being suspended in 1956 on a reckless driving charge. He has had 14 accidents and 14 convictions on traffic violations since 1939, Johnson added.

Boy Scouts Name Town Day 'Officers'

Michael S. Campbell has been named to take the place of Salem Mayor Robert F. White during "Run The Town Day," Feb. 10.

On that day 14 Salem-area Boy Scouts will take the reins of city hall officials, at least theoretically, to get a taste of city governing.

Similar youth government days, under the sponsorship of Cascade Area Boy Scout Council and city officials, are being planned for other valley towns, said Bryson L. Lusch, chairman of the Salem scout activity.

City Manager Kent Mathewson will step aside for scout Keith Mischke, City Engineer Harold Davis will pass his multiple duties to Robert Merritt, Welding Municipal Judge Douglas B. Hay's gavel will be Clifford Harris.

Other Scout officials will be Mark Wallig, city attorney; Jerald Seeger, police chief; Bradford Francis, fire chief; Larry Kemper, city recorder; Darryl Donaldson, finance director; Richard Yunker, parks superintendent; Robert Hill, administrative assistant to city manager; Ronald Schuh, city librarian, and Gerald Silke and Donald Teasdale, division engineers.

The day will start with oath of office at 9:30 a.m., followed by a welcoming address, tours of city departments, lunch and individual conferences with real-life department heads, ending at 7:30 p.m. with a City Council meeting, according to assistant city manager Donald Hiltman, who is coordinating the affair.

Pentagon's Space Agency Almost Ready

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (U-P) — Secretary of Defense McElroy said today the Pentagon's new outer space and weapons unit — the Advanced Research Projects Agency — will be officially set up in a day or two.

"We thought it best to have the agency actually set up before appropriations are voted for it," McElroy said in an interview at the Capitol.

He had just completed a second day of closed-door testimony before the Senate Appropriations Committee. It is considering a \$1,410,000 emergency money bill aimed at speeding up the missile-satellites and other urgent defense projects.

Salem Man Arrested On Check Charge

Contractor Takes Fifth Amendment

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (U-P) — A Chicago contractor, Stephen A. Healy, ducked behind the Fifth Amendment today and balked at saying whether he made payments of \$228,923 to President William E. Maloney of the International Union of Operating Engineers.

Members of the union run cranes, bulldozers and other equipment on construction projects.

Healy, 69, rejected appeals to patriotism and conscience and told the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee upwards of 30 times that answers to questions about finances and union officials might be incriminating.

Grant School Club Announces Date For Ham Dinner

A public ham dinner prepared by the men of Grant School Mothers and Dads Club will be held on the evening of Feb. 11, club president Donald Graves said Wednesday.

The dinner was planned at a Tuesday evening meeting at which Secretary of State Mark Hatfield was interviewed by club member Travis Cross concerning income tax structures, federal aid to schools and the coming campaign for governor in which Hatfield is a candidate for the Republican nomination.

Demos Plan Substitute Science Education Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 (U-P) — President Eisenhower's education bill came in for a strong Republican attack today as two Democrats announced they would offer a substitute.

Rep. Gwinn (R-N.Y.) denounced the Eisenhower proposal, designed largely to step up science education, as a political scheme to get votes. Gwinn prepared his indictment for a speech in the House, but adjournment came before he got the floor, so he put it in the record.

Three Convicted Of Mail Fraud

PORTLAND, Jan. 29 (U-P) — Three persons today were convicted of mail fraud in promoting the now-defunct Bailey Lumber Co. at Eugene.

A U.S. District Court jury returned the guilty verdicts against Richard G. Bailey, 36, Eugene, the firm's former president; Norman R. Egginan, 45, Portland, an accountant; and Mrs. Laurel Macy, Springfield, Ore., a bookkeeper.

The three were charged with using false invoices to obtain more than \$200,000 from two Oregon banks.

Judge Gus Solomon set March 4 as the sentence date.

Eight persons originally were ordered for trial. Three others pleaded guilty and were placed on probation.

The remaining three were convicted of 25 counts of mail fraud and one of conspiracy to use the mails to defraud.

FBI, City Police Arrest Man on Check Charge

Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and city detectives arrested a Salem man Wednesday on a charge of interstate transportation of fraudulent checks, they said.

Charged on a U.S. Federal Court warrant was Maurice Gene Schultz, 2485 Claude St. SE. Bail was set at \$1,500.

Officers said the charge involves checks written in Wyoming and cashed in other states in 1956.

Police said Schultz was arrested on this charge in 1956 and was scheduled to appear in Portland for sentencing last Dec. 30, but failed to do so.

Two Cars Collide At Intersection; Two Persons Hurt

Two persons were injured when two cars collided at the intersection of Court and Winter streets NE about 10 p.m. Wednesday, city police said.

Treated by first aidmen for lacerations were June Florence Underwood, Portland, and Robert L. Helenthal, Seattle.

Officers said the cars were driven by Susan Cummings Snyder, 1610 Court St. NE, and Miss Underwood.

Salem Home Burglarized

A Salem home was burglarized early Wednesday morning and city police said the person or persons stole about \$25 in cash.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Bert James Carr, 1510 25th St. NE, was entered by ripping off a screen and opening the unlocked window, detectives said.

Dresser drawers in the bedrooms were ransacked and clothes were strewn over the house.

Police said the Carrs returned home shortly after midnight to discover the break-in.

Supreme Court Suspends Lawyer From Practice

A Portland lawyer, Claude Johns Jr., was suspended from practice for one to two years Wednesday by action of the State Supreme Court.

The action was based on a federal court conviction on a charge of willfully neglecting to file income tax returns on which Johns had pleaded guilty.

The court also affirmed a Linn County Circuit Court judgment upholding Nathaniel Irwin in a suit for specific performance of a contract to make a will. The court upheld a decision by Linn County Circuit Judge Victor Oliver.

BOY PUT ON PROBATION

A 16-year-old Salem boy was placed on home probation Wednesday by Marion County juvenile officers after he was arrested on a charge of drunkenness on city streets Tuesday afternoon, city police said.

Pederson, a senior majoring in education, is a 1954 graduate of Salem High School.

Search for Child Leads To Chickens

A midnight search for a man reported to have beaten his wife and left the house with a gun and his 2-year-old son ended with discovery of 71 stolen chickens in the trunk of his car, Marion County sheriff's deputies said Wednesday.

The freshly dressed fryers were found by deputies checking out a complaint by Mrs. Hazel Wilson, 2670 18th St. SE.

Robert Lee Wilson, McMinnville, was arrested on a charge of being drunk in a public place when he was located in a car at 12th and Hoyt streets in Southeast Salem, said Deputy John Zabinski. The child was returned to his mother.

But finding the chickens led to investigation which resulted in burglary charges against Wilson and Lawrence Edward Ebbs, also of 2070 19th St. SE, Zabinski said. The birds were reportedly stolen from the E. D. Jones Poultry plant at 3310 Center St. NE, where Mrs. Wilson is employed.

Wilson, who was bruised from a fight with Ebbs sometime during the evening, was fined \$10 Wednesday in district court on the drunk charge.

Both Ebbs and Wilson appeared on the burglary charges which were continued to Monday at 9:30 a.m. to allow the pair to decide whether to request preliminary hearings. Bail was set at \$2,500 each.

Plea Heeded For Freeway Restrooms

The State Highway Department stands squarely behind the motorist in his plea for adequate restroom facilities along the freeway, it said Wednesday before the Traffic Safety Commission.

Traffic Engineer F. B. Crandall said one is being planned for a location near Wilsonville along the Salem-Portland Freeway and two more will eventually be put up south of Salem near Sautin Bridge and between Albany and Eugene.

Allowing service stations to be set up on access and front roads near the freeway will also provide restrooms, he said. One recently opened up near Woodburn.

The Highway Department's policy on freeway reststops is one per an hour's driving distance or about 40 miles. The Safety Commission agreed with it.

But Crandall said he didn't think the lack of such facilities between Salem and Portland was a valid excuse for speeding, as some pinched motorists have claimed.

Eagles, Elks Plan 'Dimes' Drive Dances

The annual Salem Eagles March of Dimes benefit dance will be held Saturday night starting at 9:30 at Eagles Hall.

The dance has been a yearly affair for over 10 years, bringing an average of \$200 a year for the aid of polio victims.

A dance for the same purpose is scheduled for Friday from 9 p.m. to midnight at Salem Elks Club.

Dancing will be in three locations at the Elks dance, with music provided by Salem Musician Union 315.

Exposure Reported

A Salem father notified police that his 8-year-old daughter was followed home from Garfield School shortly after 4 p.m. Wednesday by a man who exposed himself in her presence, officers said.

The girl described the man as young with reddish brown hair, six feet tall and dark blue trousers and coat.

Alumnus of Willamette Appointed

The appointment of Dr. Glenn A. Olds, well-known alumnus of Willamette University, as president of Springfield College, Springfield, Mass., was announced Wednesday. It is effective July 1.

A co-educational college of about 1,100 students, Springfield is the training school for YMCA secretaries and social workers.

Dr. Olds was graduated from Willamette in 1942 magna cum laude and received an honorary doctor of divinity degree in June 1955 at commencement services.

Salem Minister

From 1940 to 1942 Dr. Olds was associate minister of Salem First Methodist Church. He has been chaplain of the University of Denver, associate professor of philosophy and religion and ethics at Garrett Theological Seminary in Illinois, visiting professor of philosophy at Northwestern University, and assistant in instruction in philosophy at Yale.

At Cornell University

He is presently Director of Cornell United Religious Work at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y., in charge of 17 full-time chaplains of many different faiths.

The author of numerous published works in the field of religion and philosophy, Dr. Olds conducted psychological research on the relation of religion to mental health at Oregon State Hospital for one year.

He is a native of Sherwood.

Young Slayer of 10 'Crack Shot, Mad at the World'

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 29 (U-P) — A swaggering good — for — nothing in blue jeans and a black motorcycle jacket, mad at the world, devoted to comic books...with but one major accomplishment: an eve that sweeps across a sunlit sure as radar and hands dead-end with a gun.

Questioned

This is the way his family sees Charles Starkweather, 19, accused of the mad-dog slaying of 10. Starkweather's appearance is unusual, but hardly impressive. He stands only 5-feet-5, weighs 140 pounds, has green eyes and dark red hair cut short on top. There's a short scar over his right eye. He is very bowlegged and a little pigeon-toed, but he walks with a swagger in black and white cowboy boots.

In a sudden rage, a sister-in-law says he would lean from the cab of a garbage truck on which he worked and shout, "Go to hell!" at strangers.

Kicked From School

He was "kicked out of grade school because he had too many fights," kicked out of his home after a quarrel with his father and later locked out of his room for non-payment of rent.

"Chuck would lounge in the cab of my husband's truck and read comic books while my husband did all the work," Mrs. Starkweather said.

He was "so worthless on his job that his brother demanded that he be fired," she added.

Mrs. Starkweather recalled: "Rodney once told us something that scared me a little bit. 'He said that when he and Chuck went hunting and Chuck was using an automatic rifle, he could not pull the trigger. 'He would shoot crazy-like and empty the gun at no target at all.'"

Always Shot in Head

But Rodney himself said Charles was also a "crack shot—the game he shot always were shot in the head."

Eight of nine persons whose death figured in the hunt for Starkweather had been shot in the head.

The red-haired, trigger-happy 19-year-old had picked for his steady girl—plump, jean-favoring Carol Ann Fugate who was only 14 but was well developed physically and might have been taken for 18. They had been going steady for 18 months.

"I don't know whether they planned to get married or what," said Carol's father, William Fugate. They went together over the objections of Marion Bartlett, the man who married Fugate's former wife.

Ordered Away

Bartlett, like his wife one of the nine slaying victims, had told Charles to stay away from the Bartlett home about 10 days ago, Fugate said.

Charles had left school at 16 after completing the ninth grade. Carol was an eighth-grader.
