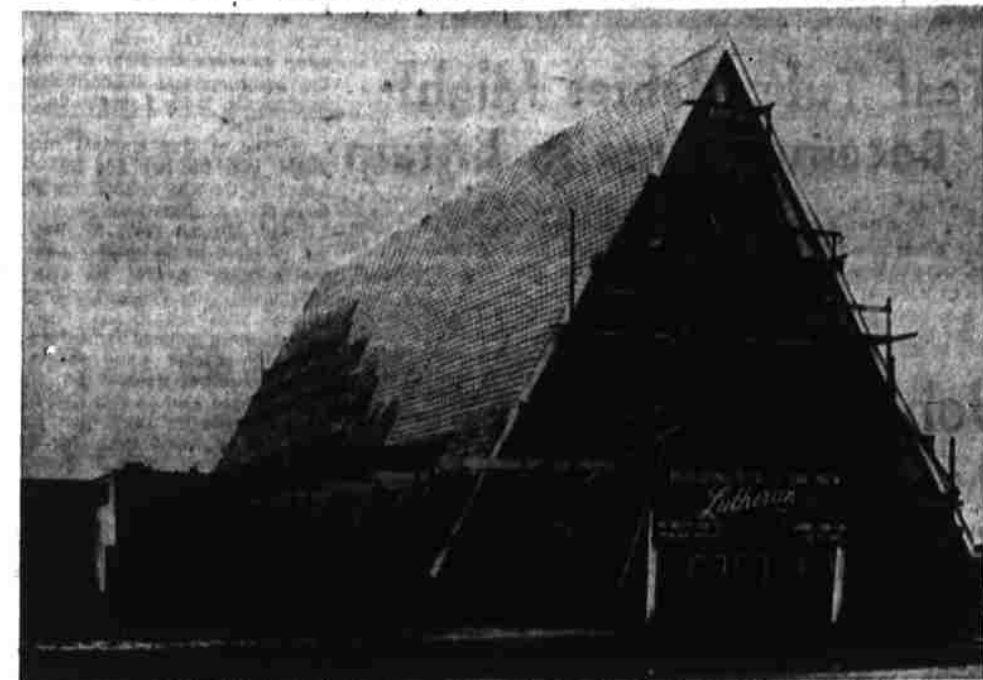

Christian Church Plans State-Wide Convention

Salem area Christian Churches will begin registering members Sunday for the annual North American Christian Convention July 9 to 13 in Portland.

The annual inspirational convention is being held in Portland for the first time in its history. Christian Churches throughout Oregon will hold kick-off regis-

tration this Sunday in an effort to sign up 3,500 Oregon delegates as the main underwriters of the convention.

Outstanding ministers and speakers will deliver inspirational messages throughout the five-day meeting. The Rev. Harold Lyman, minister of Court Street Christian, said.

The event has drawn nearly 2,000 delegates in some of its eastern meetings.

"God's Word for God's World" is the theme of the convention. The Rev. Jess Johnson, a native of Salem and now minister of the St. Johns Christian Church in Portland, is local arrangements chairman. The Rev. Alger Fitch, minister of the Milwaukee Church of Christ, is platform chairman.

Capitol Bible Training School Starts Monday

The spring term of the Capitol Bible Training School will open Monday evening, Feb. 3 at 6:30 for registering and the first class session will follow at 7.

The school offers five classes at this term including Bible doctrine, pedagogy, Sunday School work, church history and exposition of Hebrews. The first three courses when completed will offer the certificate of credit leading to the preliminary diploma, by the Evangelical Teacher Training Association of America.

The registration fee will be \$3 and a maximum of three classes can be taken.

The school is inter-denominational.

Berry Growers Forming Group For Bargaining

WOODBURN, Jan. 31—Organization of a cooperative bargaining organization by western Oregon berry growers is scheduled at an all-day meeting Monday at the new Woodburn army on Park Ave. Sessions will open at 10:30 a.m. and continue until about 4 p.m. Andy Anderson of Yakima, Wash., will be the speaker.

A board of directors and a 25-man advisory committee for the Northwest Berry Growers association formed last summer, is planned. Herb Steiner of Beaver Creek is temporary president.

The association was started last summer when berry prices ran below cost of production. More than 500 growers now are affiliated with the organization and it is expected that 800 growers will belong before the start of the 1958 berry season.

Lyons Phone Firm Drops \$30 Subscriber Assessment

MEHAMA, Jan. 31—People's Co-operative Telephone Association at Lyons has voted to drop a \$30 assessment, originally assessed four years ago for line repair when the system was converted to dial phones.

Elimination of the financial charge enables new patrons to buy membership for \$11, plus cost of phone and installation. More new members and regular dues will offset loss of the assessment, it was claimed at the company's recent meeting.

Being a co-operative, no stock can be owned in the company. Business is transacted by a board of directors who serve without pay. Members are elected by subscribers. Newly elected this year were George Nydiger and Don Huber, who serve with three other directors, Harley Scott, Ray Roberts, and Dale Crandall.

People's Co-operative Telephone Company is among the lowest dial phone rates in Oregon. Dues at \$3.20 a month, with toll free calls to Stayton, Mill City, Scio, Astoria, and Turner.

Stayton and Mill City will be tied directly into service lines when the two towns convert to dial equipment.

Telephone calls placed through the Lyons system average over 1 per minute on a 24 hour daily basis. Four pay stations were installed, resulting in a net profit of almost \$1,000, so far.

The phone system started in 1925 as a farmers communication system, and has grown until today it handles approximately \$28,000 yearly.

Smorgasbord At Perrydale Next Saturday

PERRYDALE, Jan. 31—Perrydale Community will hold its sixth annual smorgasbord and ham dinner on Feb. 8 in the school gymnasium. Last year over 800 people were served.

Profits from the smorgasbord have been used by the PTA for the school. Some of the items purchased have been new stage curtains, dishes and kitchen supplies, library supplies, outdoor lighting, electricity in the school, band instruments, playground equipment and home economics supplies.

Dinner will be served from 5 to 9 p.m. Tickets will be sold only at the door. Dinner music will be played on a Hammond organ and movies will be shown to children during the evening.

Death of Early Day Sublimity Man Noted

SUBILITY, Jan. 31—Louis Schott, Spokane, Wash., resident, has died there. He is survived by a son, Bernard. His wife, the former Mary Prange, died several years ago.

Schott was the last member of the pioneer Schott family who resided at Sublimity many years ago. He moved to Spokane about 40 years ago.
