

New Russ Envoy Pays Dulles Visit

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—U.S. Soviet relations today took a new and possibly significant twist involving the travels of two ambassadors and a once-obscure Polish plan for harrasing atomic arms in Eastern Europe.

It was a day that saw:

1. U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson brief President Eisenhower's Cabinet on prospects for an East-West summit conference this year, then head back by air to his post in Moscow.
2. New Soviet Ambassador Mikhail Menshikov, moving almost as fast as the 500 m.p.h. Soviet jet airliner which brought him from Moscow yesterday, swan pleasures at the State Department with Secretary Dulles.
3. The State Department speak kindly of Communist Poland's peaceful intent, but pull back publicly from a secret criticism of the European missions calling the Polish proposal "extremely dangerous."

Thompson's Russian counterpart a blue-eyed blond with a ready smile, lost no time in taking charge of the Soviet Embassy here. With unprecedented speed, he called on Dulles and arranged for a formal presentation of credentials next week to Eisenhower.

The Polish plan for an atom-free zone was the main topic at

the daily news conference of State Department press chief Lincoln White.

This proposal was first made by Poland's Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki to the U.N. last October.

The immediate American reaction was negative.

U.S. Treasury Chief Against Cut in Taxes

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Anderson said today the current economic situation "does not warrant" a tax cut.

Anderson told the Senate-House Economic Committee that tax changes should be used to stimulate the economy only when "conditions are sufficiently adverse to warrant it," and, he said, "It is our judgment that the present condition of the economy does not warrant such action now."

Although he said he would not be surprised by more "bad news" from the economic front before things get better, Anderson said he was not even prepared to discuss the possibility of enacting a standby tax cut bill, to be used if the recession goes beyond a certain specified point.

Anderson did not use the word "recession" in his prepared statement. He said he looks for a "readjustment" soon and is optimistic for the years ahead as well as for this year.

"Neither inflation nor deflation will be allowed to run a ruinous course," he said.

"In other developments:

1. Both the Senate and House Appropriations committees approved an administration request for an additional \$43,000,000 for unemployment payments to jobless war veterans and former federal employees out of work.
2. The Senate committee's action represented an unusual speedup, taken after a Labor Department official said the money is "needed immediately."
3. The House Ways and Means Committee wound up five weeks of hearings on general tax revision amid indications it will stand firm against such changes now. It heard an appeal for income tax cuts from the Council of State Chambers of Commerce.

Wasco Man New President Of Wheat Unit

SPOKANE, Feb. 7 (AP)—Floyd Root, Wasco, Ore., was elected president of the National Assn. of Wheat Growers at the group ended its convention here today.

Denver was selected as the site of next year's meeting, but the date was not set immediately.

Among resolutions approved by the delegates was one urging the Department of Defense to set up a national wheat reserve. The plan would require a minimum reserve of 300 million bushels of good quality wheat at all times.

They also urged the government to establish wheat storage facilities at world markets and went on record as favoring expansion of markets for surplus commodities.

Extension of the Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act was urged and the delegates also suggested an international growers conference to discuss world wheat trade.

The association asked that 100 million bushels of surplus Commodity Credit Corp. wheat be moved into feed use each year and that a minimum of 35 million acres of national acreage allotment be retained.

Theodore Fiedler of Colorado, who had been chairman of the association's marketing research committee, was elected secretary.

Elected vice presidents were: Verne Barbe, for Washington; Adrian Nelson, for Idaho; Jack Smith, for Oregon; George Brinkema, for Colorado; Lester Mori, for Nebraska; Patrick Paterson, for Kansas; and Harold Helebaum, for Wyoming.

Plea Heard For State to Keep KOAC

REDMOND, Feb. 7 (AP)—Only six persons showed up here today at the last of a series of hearings on whether state-owned Radio Station KOAC should be sold.

The strongest plea for the state to retain the station was made by Mrs. Stanley Tornborn.

She said that she lives on an isolated ranch in the Sisters area. There is no school for her children to attend, so she teaches them.

Mrs. Tornborn said:

And, she said, KOAC programs are a key part of that instruction. In addition, Mrs. Tornborn said, she likes the classical music the station broadcasts.

The hearings have been conducted by the General Extension Division of the Oregon Board of Higher Education.

Portion of Dead Mans Heart Saves 6-Year-Old Boy

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP)—A 6-year-old Queens boy went home today five weeks after a section of a dead man's aorta had been grafted on his heart to replace a diseased area.

David Fleming Jr. was picked up at St. Francis Hospital in Roslyn, N.Y., by his parents and two sisters. Physicians said his condition was "very good."

The operation on David took five hours during which time his heart stopped and had to be massaged for more than two hours.

A team of 15 doctors and nurses performed the operation.

Young GOP Chief Loses Ballot Spot

NEWARK, Ohio, Feb. 7 (AP)—State Rep. John Ashbrook (R-Licking), national president of the Young Republican club, was disqualified today from having his name placed on the May 6 primary election ballot, the Licking County board of elections here announced.

Miss Edith Welch, board clerk, said Ashbrook notified three of his nominating petitions himself, which is not permitted under Ohio election laws.

Ashbrook, an attorney and publisher of the Johnstown Independent, was unopposed for the Republican nomination. He is serving his first term in the Ohio House. He said he will campaign as a write-in candidate for the primary. Write-in votes are not valid in the November general election.

Extension of National Wool Act Backed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Wool growers, traders and manufacturers joined today in urging an extension of the National Wool Act.

Nearly a dozen representatives of the three branches of the industry appeared before a Senate agriculture subcommittee which is considering bills to extend the act, which expires in March of 1959.

The measure, under which certain wool import revenues are diverted for incentive payments to domestic wool producers, was called the salvation of the sheep growing industry in this country.

Ike Okehed for Quail Hunting

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—President Eisenhower has his doctors' okay to go quail hunting on a forthcoming trip to Georgia, the White House said today.

The President is still suffering from a cold and sore throat, and was hoarse when he talked with a group of Boy Scouts shortly before noon.

But plans still were in the works for the President to visit Thomasville, Ga., where former Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey has an estate, around the middle of next week.

Suggestion Saves Services Millions

DALLAS, Tex., Feb. 7 (AP)—An employee of the Air Force got a \$3,700 bonus today because a suggestion he made has saved the government about five million dollars in two years.

William H. Hermes, engine inspector assigned to the Southwest Airframe Corp., here, won the cash award for discovering that the Air Force and the Navy had been flying the same type of light bomber for 12 years without realizing that parts of the planes were interchangeable.

More Soccer Players Near Death in Crash

MUNICH, Germany, Feb. 7 (AP)—Five injured victims of Britain's soccer plane crash were believed to have only a 50-50 chance to live tonight.

A nine-man British and German commission probed the cause of the crash of the twin-engine British European Airways plane on a take off in a snowstorm here yesterday that killed 21 persons, including seven of Britain's top soccer stars.

The crippling of the championship Manchester United team was a national sports disaster to England. It not only jeopardized England's chances for the world soccer cup, British sportsmen said, but inflicted a blow from which it may take 10 years to recover.

Slow-Down Work Charge Dropped by UP

PORTLAND, Feb. 7 (AP)—Union Pacific today withdrew an injunction complaint against 71 employees accused of slowing down work in the firm's Albina yards here.

The railroad said that grievances between the company and employees had been settled and that work had resumed at the normal pace.

The dispute, which arose last Saturday, stemmed from the company's dismissal of two employees. The company contended the pair had withheld information concerning injuries prior to employment.

UP said the cases of the two men will be processed through grievance channels provided by the National Railroad Act.
