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Tunisians
Tell French
To Get Out

TUNIS, Feb. 12 (U.S. News)—Tunisians demanded today the evacuation of all French forces as the price of restoring French-Tunisian friendship. The government underlined its demand with a display of increased hostility, including firing on a French patrol boat at Bizerte. In retaliation for France's air attack on the border village of Sakiet Sidi Youssef Saturday, Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba told France to pull out her 15,000 troops and give up her strategic naval base at Bizerte. But the French showed no signs of bowing to Tunisian demands. In Paris, the French were reportedly ready to seek to have all French bases in Tunisia brought directly under command of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Then Bourguiba would have to deal with the national military force of the NATO Alliance.

Friendly to West
Tunisians in not a member of the alliance, she is friendly to the West. She has received both financial and military aid from NATO's biggest member—the United States. Bourguiba's demand for the removal of French garrisons came after he talked with a string of foreign diplomats, including U.S. Ambassador G. Lewis Jones. As they conferred, an angry crowd of Tunisians outside the presidential palace clamored for action. "Out with the French," they cried. "Give us arms."

They broke up and went home after Bourguiba announced the demand for the removal of French forces. "That and that alone can reestablish a climate of friendship cleaned of the remains of colonialism," he said. Defied French might. As he spoke his weakening army Guard troops were fired at by the French military. The Tunisian troops rushed to Bizerte to build a defense around the entrance to the port's excellent, natural harbor. Orders for the building came after Tunisian forces fired with small arms at a French naval patrol craft trying to slip out of the harbor last night. When the firing started, the craft returned to the base.

The Tunisians have threatened to block the harbor entrance by sinking ferries. The French tried to run the blockade. This technique was used by the Egyptians in the Suez Canal during the 1956 Suez war. It took months to clear the canal again.

The French used three helicopters to fly supplies to an army base near Tunis. This was in defiance of Tunisian orders. Three shot down French aircraft trying to deliver supplies to isolated bases.

At the United Nations, Tunisian Ambassador Moncef Slim held up submission of Tunisia's request for a U.N. Security Council meeting pending further consultations with Council members. He was understood to be studying what action Tunisia could take from the Council. Slim talked with Ambassador James J. Wadsworth, acting chief of the U.S. delegation, before conferring with Soviet Delegate Arkady Sobolev, Council president for February.

Sobbing Youth
Tells of Killing
Young Coed

AHSKIE, N.C., Feb. 12 (U.S. News)—A 15-year-old high school athlete star, son of a highway patrolman, was held today as officers tried vainly to learn what led to the shotgun slaying of a school coed, also 15. Sobbing constantly, the boy surrendered both himself and a shotgun after driving aimlessly about for four hours in his father's car. The boy, Jan Rivers Hackett, told police he had shot the coed, Debrae Newsome, but gave no reason. Officials of Ahsokie High School said the two had not dated steadily.

A logging crew found the girl's body beside a road near here at 11 a.m. Tuesday, a half hour after she had left school with young Hackett to get some books, officers said. She had been shot twice in the side. The boy surrendered to police at Wilson, about 40 miles from here, around 3 p.m. He said he had been driving around because "I didn't know what to do." Officers said he was highly upset and wept constantly as he told of what happened. Both youngsters were juniors. The boy, son of Highway Patrol Sgt. John S. Hackett, was the starting fullback on the football team and a center on the basketball team.

HALIFAX, N.S., Feb. 12 (U.S. News)—Eight vessels are being made ready here for the spring seal hunt, but in Newfoundland—which once sent out as many as 20,000 men in sealers—only one ship is making up this year.
