Haven School Operators Win Rare 'Golden Deeds' Award

Mr. and Mrs. Alfred E. Moss, who operate Haven School and Baby Louise Haven for retarded children in southeast Salem, Wednesday were given the Salem Exchange Club "Golden Deeds" award and a \$100 donation.

The presentations, a complete surprise, were made by Exchange Club president Stuart McElhinny during a luncheon meeting of the club.

The award, made only on occasion, was given to Mr. and Mrs. Moss for "outstanding community achievement and unselfish giving of time and personal finances to be of service to the community of Salem," McElhinny said.

The money will be used to purchase a primary printer for the school. This special machine prints in large size type, which is invaluable in the education of the retarded child, according to the recipients.

Award Last Made in '56
Last Salem citizen to receive the "Golden Deeds" award was the late Claude Kells in 1956.

Before their surprise award, Mr. and Mrs. Moss spoke on the development and operation of Haven School and Baby Louise Haven.

Established in 1950, in memory of their grandchild who suffered cerebral palsy, Baby Louise Haven embraces both temporary or permanent care of any child, regardless of handicap, physical or mental. Services for the child include nursery facilities, preparation of proper formulas and "just loving care," Mrs. Moss said.

35 Students Enrolled
Haven School, which is a day school for retarded children of the Salem area, has an enrollment of about 35 students. Each pays a monthly tuition of \$35.

Haven School was incorporated in March, 1956, and has a staff of three full time teachers.

Located in the country, two miles south of Pringle School on Battle Creek Rd., the school offers special training to both boys and girls who, in Mrs. Moss' words, "have been too long forgotten as far as education and training is concerned." Bus service is offered free to each student. The school is a Salem United Fund supported organization.

Mrs. Moss, speaking of the future, said that Salem needs and will someday have a sheltered

More Bees Buzz in State; Fruit Pollination to Benefit

Fruit in Oregon should be getting a better "set" this year, USDA officials are reporting, giving as the reason that bees are again on the increase. For the past few years bee population has been steadily going down and nature's chief assistant in pollination of fruit and legume blooms was being missed in many Oregon farm circles.

Reports released Wednesday show that in 1957 there were 54,000 colonies of bees in Oregon, a 6 per cent increase over 1956. Oregon honey production in 1957 totaled 2,268,000 pounds, which was 14 per cent above the 1956 yield and one-fifth more than the annual average in the previous four years.

The total 1957 yield of 42 pounds per colony was the highest obtained in the past eight years in Oregon.

Stocks on hand at the beginning

of this year were also 14 per cent higher than the previous year.

Oregon producers averaged 18.8 cents per pound for all honey sold in 1957. This included the combined wholesale and retail sales of extracted, chunk and comb honey, just four-tenths of a per cent less than the 1956 total average price. Extracted honey in wholesale lots, the principal method of sale, returned an average of 16 cents—1 cent lower than 1956 but the same as the 1955 average.

Increase in production per colony was higher in the over-all picture of the country than in Oregon alone. In the entire country, increase of honey was up 14 per cent but this increase was made on 2 per cent more colonies of bees than the previous year. National average production per colony this past year was 41.8 pounds, 2.8 pounds more than Oregon's.

Oregon's average price was also the national average, although the extracted honey brought one cent less nationally than in Oregon. Of

the 11 western states, Oregon beekeepers received the highest price for their product.

While the northwest honey flow was above a year ago, California's flow was 23 per cent below a year earlier and 32 per cent below average. Both orange and alfalfa honey crops were reported below normal. This was laid to, in part, the removal of large acreages of oranges and legumes for city and highway development.

However, California still leads the nation in honey production and Oregon doesn't rate in the 10 top states. Compared to Oregon's 54,000 colonies, California had 339,000 colonies this past year.

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
