

Monte Carlo Ballet Program Absorbing

The Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, S. J. Denham, director, presented a program of three famous ballets last evening in North Salem High School auditorium. The productions gave full emphasis

to all the attractions of the ballet, to dancing and music, costumes and scenery. The program was arranged as a benefit for the YWCA Expansion Fund. Notable in the fairly well-filled house was a large number of attentive children.

Les Sylphides was presented in a cameo-like setting, with the traditional white ballet skirts set against a gray-green birch-like background. The solo variations, supported by either a staccato or gently moving corps de ballet, flowed with subtle freshness. Familiar short piano pieces of Chopin were given new dimensions, with graceful motions melting into ever new combinations. Musical tones, which can be long and lifeless, were dissolved into infinite curves of rhythmic interest by the dancers' gestures.

Eccentric Moment
The Nutcracker opened with the scene in the Snow Country, omitting the first scene of the party, and so perhaps missing contrast from Les Sylphides. But the second act, in the rose-colored Oriental Palace of Sweets, was gay with bright-colored costumes. The audience responded particularly to the humor of the Chinese Dance. For me the coda to the Pas de Deux was an ecstatic moment.

Scheherazade, the final ballet of the evening, opened in a voluptuous setting of darker colors and gorgeous costumes. Here, in the part which I could remain to see, the music was regal, imperious, erotic or humorous, whatever the dramatic mood required.

Communicative Dancers
One hesitates to single out any outstanding element in these well-balanced and absorbing productions. I thought the leading men were the most communicative dancers. Among them were Alan Howard, George Zortich, Eugene Slavin, Deni Lamont and Edmund Novak. Leading women were Nina Novak, Irina Borowska, Gertrude Tyven and Margery Beddow.

The 20-piece orchestra, under the authoritative direction of Ivan Boutnikoff, performed the musical accompaniments very effectively.

Professional Group Salary Base Urged For Military Judges

The resolution will be mailed to all Oregon Congressmen. A bill is presently in the Senate concerning the status of military judges. The American Bar Association is urging bar groups to adopt similar resolutions to spur interest in the measure, said bar members.

Warplanes Bomb Indonesia Rebels
PADANG, Sumatra, Feb. 21 (AP)—Indonesian warplanes today struck the first blow against the rebel government in Sumatra, a spokesman announced.

The rebel spokesman said two B-25 bombers gunned and dropped seven bombs on a bridge at Pannan, a coastal town 47 miles south of here.

He said damage was slight and there were no casualties.

Chamber Meet Supports Local School Control

PORTLAND, Feb. 21 (AP)—Some 400 businessmen, attending a chamber of commerce meeting here today, were almost unanimous in favoring local school control.

The show of hands vote came after Felix Morley, a member of a touring national chamber group, said there was a danger of letting the federal government have a hand in education.

Political favoritism and corruption could accompany such programs as federal scholarship grants, he said.

OEA Hears Holmes Blame Educators

PORTLAND, Feb. 21 (AP)—Gov. Robert Holmes today said teachers and parents must shoulder the blame for vital courses disappearing from the curriculum of the nation's schools.

Holmes told an Oregon Education Assn. conference that "it is easy to put the total blame on educators for the fact that foreign languages have almost entirely disappeared as subjects in our high school curriculum."

"We have too often substituted something called general science for physics and chemistry. We don't require enough mathematics," the governor said.

Holmes added, however, parents also are to blame for not demanding that broader language, science and mathematics courses be taught.

Larceny Count Faced by Boy

A 17-year-old Brooks boy was arrested Friday by Marion County sheriff's deputies on a charge of petty larceny, involving "many gasoline thefts in the Salem area during the last few months," said Deputy James Warren.

The boy was placed in detention by juvenile officers after admitting siphoning gas from private cars and commercial vehicles, they said.

WU Chairman for May Rites Named

Gordon Macpherson, junior from Willamina, has been named chairman of Willamette University's May Weekend, May 2, 3 and 4.

He said he will emphasize the importance of the weekend in introducing high school guests to the academic and social life at Willamette. He was elected by the student council.

Two Fatalities Among Industrial Accidents

A total of 1,083 industrial accidents, 24 claims for occupational disease and two fatalities were reported to the State Industrial Accident Commission during the week ended Feb. 20.

Fatalities included Robert D. Fullerton, Springfield carpenter, and Henry A. Nelson, Yamhill carpenter.

Construction Upsweep Foreseen by Builders

An upswing in construction of homes in the Northwest was forecast Friday at opening of a two-day regional convention of the Northwest Home Builders Assn. at Hotel Marion.

In making the prediction, Lloyd Hammerstad, Yakima, Wash., regional vice president of the group, said reductions of interest rates should be a factor in speeding up of construction.

Hammerstad said that while in Chicago recently at a national home builders conference, he noted that contractors from over the land were optimistic about trends.

Cost of home construction may go up 2 or 3 percent over a year ago because of wage increases to skilled labor, Hammerstad said. He added that contractors' organizations are working to streamline construction to ease costs for the purchaser.

Today's closing agenda will include discussions of FHA problems, requirements tied in with zoning and a study of state industrial insurance.

Special highlight Friday for approximately 35 conference participants and wives was an evening banquet. Cities represented at the regional session include Salem, Eugene and Portland and from Washington: Bremerton, Tacoma, Seattle, Spokane, Yakima, Kennewick, Pasco, Richland and Longview.

State Rep. Stafford Hansell, Athena Republican, who was appointed early in the last regular legislative session on the death of Rep. Irvin Mann of Adams, filed for election at the state election bureau Friday as representative from Umatilla County.

Other filings included Bertram Hooks, Molalla Democrat, for state representative from Clackamas County; Rep. Carl Back, Port Orford Democrat, for re-election from Coos County district, and Donald Helmick, Sherwood Democrat, for representative from Washington County.

Liquor Sales to Minor Results In License Curbs
PORTLAND, Feb. 21 (AP)—The Oregon Liquor Control Commission has announced that 18 licenses and 12 service permits will be suspended Monday. Most of the violations involved minors and the penalties range from five to 30 days.

Among 30-day suspensions was one to Marshall's Inn, Salem, but an attorney for the establishment said Friday the place was granted a re-hearing set for Feb. 28. Suspension was postponed to March 17 pending outcome of the second hearing, the attorney said.

As a result of its February meeting, the OLCC cancelled the license of the Santiam Tavern, Stayton, because of sales to minors.

Licenses suspended because of sales to minors included Turner Inn, Turner, 7 days; and Y Cafe, Salem, 15 days.

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Ike Replies To Plea by Governors

Dangers in the "over-cautious attitude" of the national administration to the "current economic recession" were aired by Gov. Robert D. Holmes Friday after receipt of President Eisenhower's answer to an eleven-governor request for a speedup of federal public works projects.

The governors, including Gov. Holmes, petitioned the President to take action to ease unemployment and business decline in a telegram a week ago.

"The wait-and-see if it gets worse policy of the Eisenhower answer is, I think, highly dangerous," Gov. Holmes said, "and offers very little to the man who is now without his weekly paycheck."

The President indicated, Gov. Holmes said, that additional efforts to loosen credit policies, asked for by the governors, were under consideration. The President added, according to Gov. Holmes, there would be a sharp rise in the first half of this year in the letting of defense procurement contracts.

Brucellosis Test Changes On Tap Soon

Radical changes in procedures and payments under the cooperative brucellosis testing program in Oregon will become effective March 1, Robert Steward, director of State Department of Agriculture, said Friday.

The changes are the result of a heavily cut in the federal share of the cooperative funds anticipated to carry the state through to the certification goal set for June 30, 1959.

The adjusted program calls for a reduction in federal indemnities for reactors to match the state payment of \$8 for grade cattle and \$12 for purebreds.

Rate Increase for Bulk Commodity Haulers Urged
A petition requesting a 12 percent rate increase for motor carriers hauling bulk petroleum and other bulk commodities within Oregon has been filed with Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan.

Hearing on the petition has been set for March 10 in Salem. The petition also requested authority to reduce the table of estimated weights of petroleum distillate fuel oils not suitable for illuminating purposes from 7.75 pounds per gallon to 6.6 pounds per gallon, a reduction of approximately 14 percent by weight.

The petition was filed by the Pacific Inland Tariff Bureau.
