

Greco, Spain Ballet Genuinely Authentic

Jose Greco and his Spanish Ballet, with Lola de Ronda and Compañia Pinau Roger Machado, brought an excitingly varied program of Spanish dances and songs to North Salem High School Auditorium last evening. One felt that the recital was genuinely authentic, with no bows to commercialism.

We're indebted to the Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce for sponsoring such exotic entertainment. The auditorium was perhaps a third filled.

Many of the joys of the evening were very intricate. One needs more knowledge than I have to sufficiently appreciate them. Still there was much of general appeal. There was Greco's sleek build and amazingly rapid foot work. Miss de Ronda was both beautiful and discreet. Shorty Pepita Sevilla of the long braids was rambunctious at every chance. The Canary Island songs by Maria Merida and Jose sang flamenco songs filled with complex turns.

How much goes on in such an evening's entertainment! The stamping of the dancer's feet may be like a wild herd, as in "El Cortijo," or the dancing may be with soft shoes, with only an occasional accent. Likewise the castanets may merely flicker in a rhythmic shudder, or they may be pecked with their noise. Tambourines rattle, or hands merely lightly pat. Of course the guitar is often present, or the accompanying piano.

At times the costumes too were noteworthy. I recall the beautiful gold gown of the bride in the "Wedding Feast at Valencia," or the gray suit worn by Greco in "Cans." The lighting was also of some interest, particularly in "Peñoles."

Much more should be reported, and I wish the dance company would help your reporter by a closer program. One spends a dollar for the fancy program. Usually there isn't much return for such money spent. Oh, but in this program there are two whole pages of program notes. But what a fine time following the dances. The order is scrambled in the big program, and on the local program I know that following the intermission a number was inserted.

Forest Road Suit Aimed By Thornton

A new federal forest highway fund-apportioning formula which reportedly would cost Oregon nearly \$13 million yearly—was target of a suit filed Friday in Washington, D.C., by Attorney General Robert Thornton, it was learned here.

Thornton reportedly seeks a temporary restraining order that would delay immediate application of the new program, which was shaped within the past year.

Under the previous, long-established formula, the greater a state's forest area and forest value, the greater the apportionment of funds for building access roads in and adjacent to national forests.

The new formula reportedly takes emphasis off value, where Oregon ranks among the highest, and instead underscores need for funds. This apparently would hurt Oregon and benefit some less heavily forested states.

Apportionment of funds in the program is responsibility of secretary of agriculture and commerce.

The other driver, Thomas G. Erickson, 344 Mill St. SE, was not hurt in the 11:20 p.m. accident.

3 Accused Policemen Quit Force

PORTLAND, Feb. 28 (AP)—Three policemen, booked yesterday on burglary charges, today resigned from the Portland Police Department.

The resignations were submitted by Donald E. Roberts, 28; Fred Matthews Jr., 37; and Warren L. Moore, 33.

Earlier, Police Chief William Hilbruner said that Moore had admitted participating in the burglary of an appliance store here.

The other two policemen later admitted a part in the burglary in oral confessions, Hilbruner said.

The three were released after posting \$1,500 bail.

Television sets, radios and other appliances were taken in the Saturday night burglary. Most of the merchandise was recovered.

Air National Guard Plans McNary Drill

Nine planes of the Army Aviation Unit, Oregon National Guard, from Portland are scheduled to take part this weekend in their first drill at the newly-acquired McNary Field base, Specialist L.C. Ralph Blanchard said Friday.

The drill will mark the first big step in the eventual conversion of the former Naval Air facilities here into a major aviation center for Oregon Guard air units.

Although development of the port has been delayed awaiting the transfer of the federal lease, the field is already the "main maintenance area in the state," Col. Carl Cover of the Oregon Military Department said.

Six planes have been repaired at the McNary base since the Navy left in December 1957.

Most of the flight drills will continue out of Portland, Cover said. But he expects a flying unit to be based in Salem before 1960. Eighteen pilots now drill at Portland, he said.

Blanchard, who moved down to look after the facilities in December, said the weekend drill would depend on weather.

Four men are now stationed at the Guard airport.

White Girl Expelled at Little Rock

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Feb. 28 (AP)—A 16-year-old white girl was expelled from Central High School today and her father promptly charged that she was being "crucified" in a campaign to beat down opposition to racial integration.

The Little Rock School Board ousted Sammie Dean Parker, a pretty blonde who has been involved in several racial incidents, for the rest of the term.

No reason for the expulsion was given. Sammie Dean has been suspended since Feb. 17 in connection with the appearance of printed cards reading, "One down—eight to go" in obvious reference to the expulsion of Minnijean Brown, one of nine Negroes who entered Central High last Sept. 25 under federal troop protection.

Salem Singers In Meet Finals

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Feb. 28 (AP)—The Four-De-Matics of Forest Grove, Wash., the defending champions, tonight won their way into the finals of the Northwest Barber Shop Ballad Contest.

The Renton quartet was one of eight men's groups to survive first-round competition tonight. Thirteen quartets were eliminated from the competition.

The men's championship round, to be held tomorrow night, is the highlight of the ballad competition in this city's annual Gay 90s Festival.

Others in the finals are the Clefs, Forest Grove; Capital Chordsmen, Salem; and the Porcupine Four, Templeton and Melville-Belle Four, all of Portland.

CARACAS, Venezuela, Feb. 28 (AP)—Ray R. Rubottom, of the U.S. State Department, indicated today it is unlikely Argentina's ex-dictator Juan Peron will be given a visa to enter the United States.

Plywood Plants Closing, Jump Jobless Total

Pacific Northwest plywood plants are closing down, adding to unemployment in the region.

Random Lengths, the weekly lumber market report of the Lumbermen's Buying Service at Eugene, said closures were "an attempt to bring sanded stock supplies in line with sales."

Plywood was selling for \$64 a thousand square feet for sanded-on-one-side, quarter-inch stock. This is \$8 lower than the price at the beginning of the year.

Among cutbacks announced Friday was that of the Long-Bell division of the International Paper Co. Officials of the firm said they were reducing production 25 per cent at their plants at Langview, Wash., and Gardiner and Vaughn, Ore., to conserve their timber until prices rise.

Shorter Work Week

Employees will go on a shorter work week or will work three weeks out of four, the firm said.

Some 450 workers will be idled in the Roseburg area next week with the closing of three plants—Pacific Plywood, Inc., at Dillard; Nordic Plywood, Sutherlin; and Uniqua Plywood Corp., Roseburg.

However, the U.S. Plywood Corp. reported it will put its new plant near Roseburg into operation on Monday.

B. V. Hancock, executive vice president of Cascades Plywood Corp.—whose Lebanon plant employs 1,000 men—said the plywood production was exceeding demand and that his firm was considering the possibility of a cutback.

"The plants are producing more than the market wants," he said. "Even cutting the price doesn't take it off our hands," he added.

Announcement was made Thursday that Custom Plywood at Grants Pass, Medford Veneer and Plywood, and Oregon Veneer, both at Medford, were closing.

Blind School Project Given More Funds

The project at State school for the blind involves additions to gymnasium and girls dormitory, and a swimming pool. William Ryan, Board of Control secretary, said officials were inclined to believe it would be more economical to build a new kitchen at MacLaren rather than remodel the old one.

Play Given Professional Job at WU

Willamette University did a job on Tennessee Williams' "Summer and Smoke" last night professional enough to deserve to be seen by a full house in its second showing to night at 8:15 in the Fine Arts Auditorium.

"Smoke" is the story of the decay of a preacher's daughter, Alma, whose insane love for a wild, living doctor, John, is poorly disguised by stiff-necked puritanism. The irony is that while John quietly tries to convince her to unbutton her love, he is touched by her saintliness and begins to realize just how wrong his wild ways are.

Indignant Saint

By the time her sex desire finally breaks away from the false puritanism and she begs him for his love, it is he who is the indignant saint and she goes off crushed, "to be picked up by a sign of the first passerby"—a traveling salesman.

Alma is a pitiful woman in the long tradition of playwright Williams. Whatever protests there might be, though, are certainly not the way it was put on.

Excellent Job

Director Robert M. Putnam and the Willamette students do an excellent job of wrapping their audience in every bit of humor and drama—of which there is a good amount.

The end was so gripping the audience hesitated to applaud and break the spell.

It was well done all the way through. Mary Beth Van Cleave as Alma and Mac Baker as John were exceptional and well supported by Barbara Bredsten (Alma's crazy mother who steals a couple of scenes) Gail Boden, Mary Jo Smullen, Ross Stephens, Warren Walker, Wayne Haversen, James Smith, Carol Cartwright, Stephen Hone, Yvonne Hill, and Thomas Caylor.

The sets, lighting and overall effect were excellent.

Construction Shows Jump In February

Estimated cost of construction projects authorized within Salem during February amounted to \$181,280, some \$68,390 above the \$112,890 worth of projects recorded by city engineer's office during January.

Major projects started include an \$84,000 office building at 1700 Commercial St. SE, to house the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation; a \$25,000 alteration to Terminal Ice & Cold Storage warehouse at 905 Front St. NE; and a \$30,000 office building at 255 Church St. NE for the Credit Bureau of Salem.

This contrasts with January construction which listed only six projects, all residential, over \$10,000 but below \$30,000.

Alterations last month amounted to \$77,280, with \$17,400 of this in private dwellings and \$59,880 in commercial projects. Some 47 permits were issued in February compared to 35 during the first month of 1958. January had 77,720 private dwelling alterations and \$22,350 commercial.

Last month's city building figure was \$14,475 below the February 1957 construction figure of \$195,755. However, 59 permits were issued during the second month of last year compared to 47 this February.

February's construction was 62 per cent higher than January's but slightly over seven per cent below February of 1957.

Oregon Egg Producers Send Funds

Oregon Egg Producers is currently distributing a total of \$1,231,872 to Western Oregon farmers, Sterling Gribakov, Salem branch manager, said Friday.

Patronage refunds totaling \$28,618 are being distributed at the present. On Jan. 1 the association continued its policy of redeeming its capital certificates in five years by recalling the 1953 issue at the face value of \$27,810. In addition \$135,444 was paid out to members as 1956 interest on outstanding certificates.

Final audit figures for the 1957 operation of the farmer-owned marketing and purchasing association showed an excess of \$50,000. Although feed and supply volume declined slightly from the record high reached in 1957, sales for both departments in 1957 represented the second highest volume in the association's history. Egg receipts increased by 12 per cent were the highest since 1945.

The patronage refund represents an 8 1/2 per cent in the feed department and a 4 per cent on all farm supply purchases.

Gribakov reported the association closed the year with assets exceeding three and three-quarter million dollars and no mortgage indebtedness.

Salem Parking Survey Going Well in Report

Salem's parking survey is proceeding well, according to City Engineer J. H. Davis who said Friday that conclusive data on the parking habits of Salem area motorists plus the parking places they use will be available in about a month.

City survey takers are now busy in the downtown area gathering information about parking meter locations, the type of business or building adjacent to the meters, available off-street parking and a host of other details. Following completion of this material the State Highway department will draw up a special map of the downtown area.

Final step in the survey will include checking the actual parking movements of motorists. A staff of volunteer clerks from downtown stores will tabulate these movements from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on a designated Friday.

Armed with the results of the survey, city officials will again meet with Downtown Merchants Association to discuss possibility of changing charges or time limits on downtown area meters. The merchants have asked a two-hour time limit be placed on all meters in the area. Meter charge would remain at five cents per hour but the parking limit would be strictly enforced, according to the plan. City officials have expressed a cool attitude toward the proposal.

President to Have Health Check Today

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)—President Eisenhower had a tooth pulled today and then settled down with a Western magazine at Walter Reed Army Hospital to await a physical checkup Saturday.

The physical examination, scheduled to begin about 11 a.m., will be a follow-up to the slight stroke Eisenhower, now 67, suffered last Nov. 25. It will be conducted by three of the neurologists who were called in at that time.

The tooth extraction involved an upper molar that was cracked some time ago when he bit down on something hard while eating.

Disarm Chief Ponders Step; U.S. to Press for U.N. Talks

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Feb. 28 (AP)—The United States' new disarmament negotiator, Ambassador James J. Wadsworth, said today discussions will begin immediately on the question of what to do next.

He told reporters he referred to informal consultations already under way on a small scale.

Wadsworth is deputy chief of the American U.N. delegation.

Wadsworth in a recorded interview with the Voice of America, said it occasionally would be necessary to hold certain conversations outside official U.N. bodies. But he said the U.N. "should hold an umbrella" over disarmament so all its members could be kept informed.

He told U.N. correspondents a couple of ideas look promising among those now being discussed to break the Soviet-Western deadlock over procedure for disarmament talks. He would give no details.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)—The United States and its European Allies have decided to press Russia to resume disarmament talks.

To set the stage for this, Allied diplomats are reported ready to appeal privately to Moscow to abandon its boycott threat for the sake of breaking the six-month disarmament deadlock.

Cards Yield Profit

UNITED NATIONS, Feb. 28 (AP)—The U.N. Children's Fund sold 74 million greeting cards in the 1957 Christmas season, netting a profit officials estimate at \$300,000.
