

Ike Brushes Legality Issue Off; Nixon Would Sign Bills

WASHINGTON, March 5 (AP)—President Eisenhower brushed aside the legality issue today and informed a news conference that Vice President Nixon would assume all-inclusive powers, including authority to sign bills, in event of presidential disability.

Eisenhower dismissed the idea that Nixon should take an oath as acting president, should a disability emergency arise. He said he and Nixon assume that "we are men of good faith, and we are honest men that are trying to do what is correct for the country."

Polk Planners Okeh Arterial Street Plan

Anticipation of a five-fold increase in population in West Salem spurred Polk County Planning Commission members to give preliminary approval to an arterial and collector street plan for the area Wednesday night.

The area now has approximately 5,000 residents but can accommodate 24,000, said commission members.

Doaks Ferry Road, from Wallace Road on the north to Dallas Road on the south, is to be a bypass of Salem with a 100-foot right-of-way.

Collector roads with 80-foot rights-of-way are designated as Orchard Heights and Glenn Creek roads and Eola Drive. The roads now have 40 to 60 foot rights-of-way.

Commission members referred petitions requesting an extension of Paul B. Wallace Memorial Park to the Mid-Willamette Valley Planning Commission because of "the area-wide nature of the proposal."

The matter had previously been referred to the commission by Polk County Court.

A permit system for sewage disposal on non-farm land outside city limits was referred to District Attorney Walter Foster for review.

Wiley Gardner and Ross Chapin were placed on a committee to nominate officers to be elected at the next meeting, April 2.

Dismissal of Beer Delivery Dispute Asked

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5 (AP)—Dismissal of a complaint by the Truck Operators' League of Oregon against a Salem, Ore., local of the Teamsters Union was recommended today by an examiner for the National Labor Relations Board.

The complaint stemmed from a beer delivery dispute in the Salem area last year.

The examiner, William Spencer, said the union did not violate the secondary boycott provision of the Taft-Hartley Act when it picketed trucks delivering beer for struck firms.

The Teamsters had placed pickets around several firms in Salem last August in a dispute with beer distributors.

The distributors then hired several trucking firms to make the deliveries. The Teamsters then picketed these trucking firms.

Williams said the trucking firms "were engaged in what is commonly and appropriately called strikebreaking."

Reserve Unit Rated Highly

Salem's Naval Reserve Surface Division 13-28 rated a 3.4 out of a possible 4 in an inspection Wednesday night.

This is a high "very good," almost "excellent," but the lowest in some years for the division which last year rated 3th best of its size in the nation.

It was the first inspection under new standards laid down by national headquarters. Former inspections were made under district supervision.

The division's downfall was too many absences. Personnel inspection rated an excellent 3.85.

Members of the inspection team from Portland and Seattle was led by Capt. Henry Mullins, commanding officer of the Portland training center.

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Marian Anderson Exalts Audience

Marian Anderson expresses radiant love and dignity through her singing. The contralto seemed to exalt every one last evening in the capacity audience at Willamette's Auditorium. Franz Rupp was the supporting partner at the piano.

The beauty of Miss Anderson's voice has long been legend. In "Trampin'" there was a special hue searing one's soul, like a deep nearby echo. How different was the high brilliant quality in the following "Ride On, King Jesus." There was a similar dazzling contrast between the two Schubert songs, "Aufenthal" and "Auf dem Wasser zu Singen."

More important than the countless vocal colors was the intensity of Miss Anderson's dedication to her text. So deep is her conviction that in the more dramatic songs, like Schubert's "Der Doppelgänger," one is willing to overlook vocal deficiencies. Perhaps nowhere was the singer's concentration to the poem more touching than in "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands."

While Miss Anderson was always interpretatively successful, the concert was particularly satisfying in the songs using higher voice and less emotional intensity. Scarlatti's florid number and Haydn's "My Mother Bids Me Bind My Hair" were in this category. In Scotti's charming "Lullaby" the tone quality was lovely and evenly sustained.

Miss Anderson's speaking voice alone is inspiring.

Franz Rupp's accompaniment added much character to the music. There were times when he overshadowed Miss Anderson, and times when he seemed to be pulling her along. Rightfully fully equal to the singer in the Schubert songs, throughout the concert these were generally suitable full-bodied accompaniments.

The concert was the last of the season sponsored by the Associated Students of Willamette University.

Teachers Quit As Dissension Splits Town

OAKVILLE, Grays Harbor County, Wash., March 5 (AP)—The superintendent and 19 of 11 teachers in Oakville schools submitted their resignations today in a dispute that has divided this small community into two hostile camps.

Superintendent of Schools A. L. Spitz and the 10 teachers said in a statement accompanying their resignations that they took the action because of "dissension and animosity in the community."

There was no further official explanation.

Old Cow Pony Corralled on Salem Bridge
