

Kohler Firm Rejects U.S. Arbitration in UAW Strike

WASHINGTON, March 7 (U.P.)—The United Auto Workers offered today to submit their four-year-old strike against the Kohler Co. to federal arbitration, but the company said no.

Lyman C. Conger, Kohler's general counsel, said that while the Wisconsin plumbing fixtures firm is willing to listen to the advice of mediators it couldn't allow any outsider to write the terms of its labor contract.

Outsiders might be a lot smarter than Kohler executives, Conger told the Senate Rackets Committee, but "they couldn't have too much knowledge about making bathtubs."

The Senate group is investigating violence and vandalism around the Kohler plant at Kohler, Wis., and attempting to fix responsibility for it.

The offer to arbitrate came from the UAW's secretary-treasurer, Emil Mazey. He told the senators the company had rejected arbitration offers in the past but the UAW hoped it would take a new look at the situation.

Mazey suggested the committee as an arbitration board, or some other federal agency.

Conger made it plain Kohler would not accept compulsory binding arbitration on the terms of a contract. The issues in the long and bitter strike involve wages, working conditions and the rehiring of strikers. The Kohler plant was shut down during the first 34 days of the strike but has been operating since then.

Methodist Youth Conclave Today; 1,000 Expected

An all-day meeting of Oregon Methodist Youth Conference is expected to lure over 1,000 high school students to Salem today. Theme is "Teach Us to Pray."

Registration will begin this morning at 8:30 in the Fine Arts Auditorium on the Willamette campus. It is the first time the combined districts representing over 70 Methodist churches will meet in Salem.

The meeting is sponsored jointly by the university and the Oregon conference board of education of the Methodist church. The Rev. Robert Uphoff, pastor of First Methodist Church in Olympia, Wash., will be main speaker.

Study groups dealing with prayer; speech finals, luncheon at the Salem Armory and Marion Hotel and a dramatic skit tonight in Willamette Fine Arts Auditorium are on the agenda. The dramatic presentation will be directed by Diane Dickson, Willamette University freshman.

The Parsoners, a group of Methodist ministers, will also entertain this evening.

In line with the prayer theme, members say another purpose of the meet is to show that juvenile delinquents make up but a small minority of today's youth.

11th Airborne Division Plans Deactivation

WASHINGTON, March 7 (U.P.)—The Army today announced the 11th Airborne Division will be deactivated in Germany on July 1. Two of its battle groups will be moved into a revived 24th Infantry Division.

The 11th is the only airborne division now overseas and one of three on the Army's active list.

The Army said the new 24th Division, containing two airborne and three infantry battle groups, will meet a need for infantrymen in Western Europe. It also will provide a small emergency force that could be flown quickly to a danger spot.

The 24th took part in heavy fighting during the Philippine campaign of World War II and was the first in action in Korea in the summer of 1950. It was removed from the active list last year and its personnel taken over by the 1st Cavalry Division in Korea.

When re-constituted in July, the 24th will have about 14,000 officers and men—normal for the new style "Pentomic" divisions.

Albany Woman Sues Over Shot

ALBANY, Ore., March 7 (U.P.)—A woman fishing on the Willamette River bank last June was struck by a bullet which apparently came from a gun on the far side of the stream. She now asks \$16,115 damages from two boys and their parents.

The woman, Mrs. Marie Salama, 49, who lives on an Albany rural route, said in a suit filed in Circuit Court that the two boys, Philip Dimick Jr., 14, and Harvey Cole, 15, both of Jefferson, fired the shot which hit her.

She said she was in a hospital for 31 days.

Philip Dimick Sr. is mayor of Jefferson. He, Mrs. Dimick, and Mr. and Mrs. Ward E. Cole were made defendants along with the boys.

At the time of the shooting the boys, questioned by police, said they were unaware anyone had been hit.

LEG BROKEN
FALLS CITY, March 7—B. H. Ruggles, about 75, suffered a broken right leg in a fall at 8:30 p.m. tonight from his back porch. He was taken by ambulance to Dallas hospital.

Teaching Profession Will Police Own Ranks in Plan

PORTLAND, March 7 (U.P.)—The Oregon Education Assn. today approved a plan which would result in the teaching profession policing its own ranks.

Delegates to the OEA representative Council approved the plan and appointed Harold D. Shaw, Sweet Home, to head a committee to work on it.

The plan calls for a group of educators to examine the competence of teachers and to suspend or revoke teaching certificates of those teachers who do not measure up to standards.

In other action the council: Reared Tom Powers of Eugene.

FCC Inquiry Broadens to Other Matters

WASHINGTON, March 7 (U.P.)—A federal grand jury delving into the conduct of Richard A. Mack as a Federal Communications Commission member was reported today to have broadened its inquiry to other FCC matters.

It was learned that a group of witnesses not associated with the Mack investigation have been subpoenaed to appear before the grand jury next week.

Papers filed in the U. S. District Court by the Justice Department describe the reason for the whole investigation in general terms, without naming any government agency or individual. The papers say the Justice Department "is informed that various persons, companies, corporations and firms to the department unknown" have violated federal laws by "giving money and things of value to officers and employees or persons acting for and in behalf" of the government.

These papers also mention allegations of fraud and perjury. It was reported elsewhere that they involved the FCC.

Mack resigned from the FCC Monday after disclosures before a House investigating committee that he had accepted favors from Miami, Fla., business friends while the FCC was considering four competing bids for TV Channel 10 in Miami.

Mack and three other commissioners swung the channel to Public Service Television Inc., owned by National Airlines.

The bodies of two men were found in an empty railway boxcar here today. Both had been beaten severely about the head and face. It is believed that both men may have come from Oregon.

Papers and effects of one of the men bore the name of Noah Arthur Robertson, Ashland, Ore. The other man was identified as Jack Cecil Webb, about 40. His address was not known.

Snohomish County Coroner Ken Baker ordered autopsies to determine when the men died and the cause.

The bodies were discovered by a Great Northern Railroad inspector, Eldon Baches, during a routine inspection of a string of empty cars.

The freight car in which the bodies were found left Vancouver, Wash., at 12:35 a. m. Thursday, railroad officials said.

Runaway Train Dives Into Lake

TWO RIVERS, Wis., March 7 (U.P.)—A runaway, switch engine pulling nine freight cars thundered through two neighboring port cities and plunged into Lake Michigan today, but authorities still had not learned tonight whether anyone was at the controls.

The diesel went on its wild, seven-mile dash through two cities and innumerable grade crossings at 2 a. m., while its unsuspecting crew was at lunch.

One of the cars leap-frogged the 125-ton engine as the power unit soared over a concrete embankment into Two Rivers Harbor. Another fell on top of the engine as it sank in 30 feet of water. The other seven remained on the slope leading down from the end of a siding, one of them teetering over the water.

The possibility the train may have been stolen was suggested by the entry of the FBI into the investigation.

NEW YORK, March 7 (U.P.)—An irate mother was sentenced to 10 days in jail today for slugging two teachers in a Manhattan classroom.

Mrs. Mae Snuggs, 30, a Negro, was sentenced by a three-judge panel of the Southern District Court.

Judge Matthew J. Troy told the woman, "We're not going to stand for anyone barging into our schools and assaulting teachers."

Mrs. Snuggs said she went to Public School 87 to complain about her daughter being hit by a teacher.

Dr. Herman P. Mantell, the school principal, said he had concluded a talk with Mrs. Snuggs about her daughter's behavior when two women charged into Miss Mantell's classroom.

She began swinging at the white teacher, breaking her eyeglasses and knocking her against a blackboard. Dr. Mantell said. Then she turned on Arthur Simon, the assistant principal who also is white, hitting him and kicking at him.

"All the children were just petrified by the scene," he said.

Mrs. Snuggs pleaded guilty to attempted assault, a misdemeanor.

Demos Add 2 Senate Candidates; GOP One

Eleventh-hour surprise candidates filed just prior to the deadline Friday to assure Marion County voters of both Democratic and Republican faiths a full slate of legislative candidates in the May 16 primary.

Democrats came up with two men, John S. O'Brien and W. Gordon Allen, both of Salem, as state senate candidates. David G. Draper, Stayton, added his name to an overflowing list of Republican senate candidates.

Republican Douglas Heider Jr., young Salem businessman, placed his name on the ballot for state representative. Two Democrats, Mrs. Rose M. Lockhart and Delbert L. McDonough, both of Salem, also filed for the House.

Marion County has four seats in the House and two in the Senate.

Fourth to File
Draper, 26, fourth Republican to file for the Senate, is a graduate of Albany High School and has been a minister for the past two years at the Church of the Nazarene in Stayton. He graduated from Northwestern Nazarene School and did graduate work in Pasadena, Calif.

He said he hopes "to raise moral standards and oppose to yielding to expediency. We are opposed to such things as loosening of liquor laws. I am in this race primarily to help Mark Hatfield, candidate for governor, and any other politician of high moral character."

Other Republican candidates for Senate are incumbent Sidney Schlesinger, Eddie Ahrens and Robert F. White.

O'Brien, Senate Democratic candidate, is a 47-year-old Salem linotype operator. He has served as an officer of both the Oregon Association for the Deaf and National Association for the Deaf.

"I am interested in social legislation," he said. "Particularly in problems of education, training and well-being of the physically handicapped. The problems of expanding school and collegiate population, the mentally retarded, juvenile delinquency and the aged, need attention."

Has Three Children
He is married and has three children and is a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Salem.

The other Democratic Senate candidate, W. Gordon Allen, of Salem, is a radio chain operator. He is Democratic state finance chairman.

Allen, 37, is president of station KGAY in Salem and KGAL in Lebanon and is active in other radio and business interests. He graduated in electrical engineering from Louisiana Tech and did graduate work at Oregon State College and at Princeton. He served as a Navy officer during World War II.

He is married and has two sons and is a member of Elks, American Legion, Lions and several Willamette Valley chambers of commerce groups.

Mrs. Lockhart, sole woman candidate in this county's legislative race, is the wife of Gale Lockhart, employee of the Southern Pacific railroad in Salem.

A former Portland businesswoman, she has had "experience in accounting and tax matters," and was employed by Keiser shipyards and SP and UP railroads.

She said she was particularly concerned with problems of child welfare and older citizens. Several years ago she appeared as Rose Flaherty, a vocalist on Portland and network radio programs.

Has Been Switchman
McDonough, 37, has been a Southern Pacific switchman for the past 15 years in Salem. He is chairman of his local brotherhood union. He said he was "particularly concerned with matters

of taxation and education. I will insist on taxes based on ability to pay, and will strongly oppose a sales tax in any form."

He favors spreading more widely government representation and not limiting it to business and professional persons alone. He is married and has three children.

Other Democratic candidates for the House, in addition to McDonough and Mrs. Lockhart, are Herbert W. Carter, Salem attorney and Daryl Donaldson, Salem businessman.

In addition to Heider, are incumbents R. L. Elstrom and Winton Huml, Joseph Lane, George Penston, W. W. Chadwick, R. F. Cook.

Artery Disease Laid to Stress Rather Than Diet
CHICAGO, March 7 (U.P.)—A medical professor said today there is accumulating evidence that stress, rather than diet, may play the more important role in hardening of the arteries.

Dr. Edgar S. Gordon, professor of medicine at the University of Wisconsin medical school, said even the stress of everyday living can boost the level of blood cholesterol, a fatty substance believed linked to hardening of the arteries.

He told the annual clinical conference of the Chicago Medical Society: "Healthy students during examination period manifest a very significant rise in blood cholesterol."

"The same change has been observed in business executives who are under extreme tension and pressure," he said.

"Physical exercise, on the other hand, although it can be regarded as a form of stress, appears to lower blood cholesterol content and therefore may be presumed to have a beneficial effect."

He said popular concepts in recent years have tended to incriminate diets high in animal fat. But many recent studies, he went on, make it clear the disease is far more complicated than a dietary disturbance.
