

Marion County's Budget Requests Increase Slightly

Marion County budget requests are running a little above last year's budget, but County Judge Rex Hartley said Wednesday they are expected to be cut within the six-per-cent limitation.

Departmental requests will be considered at budget committee meetings in May. The budget must be approved by June 31, Hartley said.

Last year's budget totaled close to \$3,400,000, with approximately \$1,000,000 of the amount collected by tax levy and the rest from revenues and expendable surplus.

The registration and elections request for \$45,004 jumped \$2,194 over last year's \$41,800.

Major increase is a jump from \$7,000 to \$10,000 for the wages of registrars and election clerks, mostly to handle additional work required by registration laws and increasing population, said court officials.

Salaries Swell Budget
Heavy salary increase requests swelled county surveyor A. D. Graham's budget some \$3,532 with \$22,630 requested as compared to \$19,250 allotted last year.

Major increases include a jump in salaries and office equipment, and official bond.

An increase of \$679 in salaries was requested in a Silverton Justice Court budget of \$5,285.

Jefferson Justice Court requested an increase of \$10 with a \$5,485 budget.

Higher cost of insane examinations resulted in a \$400 increase of last year's \$1,300 amount.

Increased costs also upped county record auditing from \$3,300 to \$4,000.

Defense Director's Budget Up
Marion County Civil Defense Director Wallace Wharton requested an increase of \$200, raising his budget to \$10,000. The increase would be for office and traveling expenses.

Marion County District Court \$2,021 to \$20,825. The spread includes a jump in the constable's salary from \$5,640 to \$7,200, with the remainder going to increased deputy salaries.

Jefferson Justice Court Constable requested an increase of \$10 to \$580.

Woodburn Justice Court Constable requested an increase of \$75 to \$1,000.

Stayton Justice Court Constable increased \$20 to \$470.

Miscellaneous Items Rise
The miscellaneous page, which includes everything from garbage disposal and predatory animal control to state industrial accident insurance, increased some \$2,800 from last year's \$111,250 to \$114,050.

Most of the increase went for an additional \$1,500 to bring the county up to \$100,000. Most of this is a reserve for possible county promotion during centennial year, said court officials.

A \$2,000 increase in social security brought this item to \$10,000 and social security increased \$500 to reach \$4,000 both indicating additional county salaries anticipated.

Budget areas remaining at the same amount include the county property reappraisal program at \$100,000; microfilming at \$4,120; indigent soldier relief at \$200; indemnity for slaughter of diseased cattle, \$1,000.

Mt. Angel Court Same
Mt. Angel Justice Court requested the \$2,260 as last year and Mt. Angel Justice Court Constable requested the same \$200. Marion County Circuit Court expenses remained the same at \$74,765.

Budgets requesting a decrease include the Silverton Justice Court Constable, which decreased \$25 to \$1,820.

A \$50 budget decrease was recorded in the Stayton Justice Court, reducing the budget to \$2,955.

County Coroner's budget decreased \$40 from last year's \$1,625. The budget item for the care of poor children committed to charitable institutions dropped \$500 from last year's figure.

Hungarian Rebel Leader Sentenced
BUDAPEST (AP)—A people's court at Seged, in southern Hungary, has handed down a death sentence against Jozsef Kovacs. He was accused of heading the militia there during the 1956 anti-Russian revolt.

Nine others drew jail sentences of two to 15 years after a two-month trial that heard 100 witnesses.

PP&L Declares \$1.25 Dividend
PORTLAND (AP)—Pacific Power & Light Co. Wednesday declared a quarterly dividend of \$1.25 per share on its 5 per cent preferred stock.

The dividend for common stock is 40 cents per share. Dividends for other classes of preferred stock range from \$1.05 to \$1.54 per share.

Accepts Call Woman Says Man-Hating Impulse Sent Her on Stage to Pound Actor



NEW YORK (AP)—A woman can get mighty fed up with men sometimes, the rats.

In fact, Joyce Greller says that's what made her mount the stage of a Broadway theater Tuesday night and belt the leading man.

"I'd just had a fight a few days ago with a boy friend, and this thing on the stage reminded me of all the rotten men I've known," Miss Greller, a writer and part-time clerical worker said.

"It was a composite of every one of those fine rats."

Miss Greller, a vivacious young woman of 25, got her man-hating impulse in the midst of the performance of "Look Back in Anger" at the Lyceum Theater.

In "Emotional Cycle" "Something began building up in me right from the beginning," she said. "I was in one of my tense emotional cycles."

The play is about a self-pitying man who drives his wife into leaving him, and then talks her best friend as his mistress. Actor Kenneth Haigh plays the leading male role.

By the end of the second act, Miss Greller said she was seething with rage and she smothered furiously at intermission trying to calm herself. But when the third act got under way, her anger exploded. She left her seat.

"I don't know how I got up on the stage," she said. "I probably couldn't do it again."

Anyhow, she was up there, pounding actor Haigh with her fists, and shouting what sounded like, "He left me, he left me!"

The curtain was rung down on Haigh and another actor, Alan Bates, who carried her off the stage.

"I didn't realize what I was doing," Miss Greller said later. "It was just as if I'd burst into somebody's living room and stood there in the middle of these people."

But she still thought the character in the play should get just what she gave him, although she has nothing personally against Haigh. She doesn't even know him, in fact.

Show Resumed
"It's the people's theater after all," she said. "I don't see where Show Resumed"

Miss Greller said: "They could have pressed some kind of a charge against me, but they didn't. The one actor smiled at me, but the other, the sniveling coward, said, 'Watch her. Be careful.'"

"What a rat!"

5 Air Force Officers Begin 'Space' Test

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)—Five young Air Force officers began a simulated space flight Wednesday to determine what effect long confinement in close quarters will have on the morale and efficiency of tomorrow's space crews.

The officers, all volunteers who each have had more than 3,000 hours flying time, were sealed within a cabin 17 feet long, 7 feet wide and 6 feet high. Their grueling five-day ordeal started at 9 a.m., and will end next Monday at 9 a.m.

A spokesman at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base's Wright Air Development Center, where the tests are being conducted, said the men passed the first hours of the test satisfactorily.

Their simulated flight — inconspicuously being made in a mock conventional B36 bomber — takes them on an 18,000 m.p.h. orbit, 140,000 miles above the earth.

No Space Flight Candidates
The spokesman emphasized that the course of the flight was arbitrarily selected and has no relation to the test itself. The Air Force is not trying to duplicate space flight conditions as was done in a recent around-the-moon space flight test in Texas. The Air Force is trying in this case to find out how well a group of men can function when coupled up together for long periods, the spokesman said.

The tiny cabin is divided into a work and a rest area. In the work area the men sit in space capsules slightly larger than an enclosed airplane seat. The capsules contain the necessary instruments to perform assigned flight and test duties.

Rest Area In Cabin
When not on duty the men retire to a rest area at the rear of the cabin where there are bunks and a food bar with an electric stove to heat their preferences.

The men will work in shifts during most of the flight with three men on duty and two men resting.

The crew members are: Maj. Russell D. Brewington of Houston, Tex., crew commander and pilot; Capt. William D. Johnson Jr. of Chattanooga, Tenn., copilot; Capt. James V. Kennedy of Chicago, engineer; Capt. Dan D. Fulgham of Pasadena, Tex., defense director; and Capt. Lawrence J. McCaechern of Millinocket, Maine, navigator.

Corvallis Firm Bids Low on BPA Project
PORTLAND (AP)—Witzig Construction Co., Corvallis, Ore., was apparent low bidder Wednesday when the Bonneville Power Administration opened offers for construction of Fairmont substation near Discovery Junction, Wash.

Witzig's bid, low of six, was \$95,763.

Search on for Cattle Rancher
MADRAS (AP)—A search is underway here for Hamley Danzuka, 29, a Warm Springs Indian cattle rancher, who disappeared Feb. 14. Jefferson County Sheriff Spencer Summerfield said Danzuka left Maras with two Indian companions and has not been seen since.

Danzuka, he said, frequently leaves his ranch for long periods and there were no fears for his safety. However, he has not stayed away this long before.

Summerfield questioned the two companions Wednesday. He said they told him they were unable to give any clues as to Danzuka's whereabouts.

Mid-April Fall Of Sputnik II Anticipated

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP)—Sputnik II—possibly as big as the German V2 rockets that hit London—is expected to make a flaming dive to oblivion in a month.

The Russian moon with its dead dog voyager is losing altitude at the rate of five miles a day, the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory estimates.

At the present loss of altitude, the satellite is expected to fall around April 14.

It would fall within 120 miles of the earth at the low point of its orbit. The loss of altitude is almost entirely at the high point or apogee, now 850 miles. This is about half the altitude the satellite achieved when it was launched Nov. 3 with shaggy dog Laika aboard.

It is now entering a period of visibility over most of the United States in the pre-dawn hours. By next week it should be visible morning and evening to most of the nation. This is expected to be its swan song before its final plunge.

As the satellite falls lower its speed increases due to the tug of gravity. Having a shorter course, it takes less time to circle the globe. It now takes just over 95 minutes for a round trip in contrast to 103.6 minutes after launch.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Elvis Presley was given a surprise party at the studio Wednesday after finishing his last picture before Army service.

The rock 'n' roll singer had train reservations Wednesday night for his home in Memphis. He will visit with his family before entering the Army later this month.

On hand for the party in the Paramount Studio commissary were his costar, Dolores Hart, Director Michael Curtiz and the rest of the cast of "King Creole."

A huge cake was decorated with the figure of an Army private peeling potatoes. Miss Hart gave him a prop Civil War musket as a farewell present.

Other stars who dropped by and wished Presley well were Sophia Loren, Valerie Allen and Anthony Quinn.

Family Hopes To Get Son to Specialists

NEWBERG—The biggest hope of the Wayne Rokowski family here is, somehow, to get 16-year-old Jimmy Rokowski into the hands of specialists at a Boston, Mass., hospital.

Mrs. Rokowski says doctors have advised her that son Jimmy has a chance to lick his case of acute nephritis (Bright's disease) if he can get the specialized treatment offered at Massachusetts General Hospital. Without such treatment, the disease is often fatal.

Employees at the pulp plant here are interested in Jimmy's case and are trying to raise funds that would send Jimmy and his mother to Boston. The family will have to have a \$200 deposit and they are advised Jimmy may lose his place on the waiting list if he can't get to the Eastern hospital by April 1.

Although he has had the disease since he was 17 months old, Jimmy is a happy boy and he doesn't realize the seriousness of his condition which already has been given attention at Doernbecher Hospital in Portland and at the Portland Clinic. His mother has her leg in a brace following a recent polo attack.

The Rokowski live on a six-acre farm at Newberg Route 2, Box 145.

Conservatives Defeated in British Commons
LONDON (AP)—Britain's Conservative government was defeated on a minor vote in the House of Commons Wednesday night. Excited Laborites immediately demanded the resignation of Prime Minister Macmillan's Cabinet.

An embarrassed government spokesman rejected the tongue-in-cheek demand amid jeers and shouts from exultant opposition ranks.

The defeat was by 158-155. It came on a bill concerning court powers to force errant husbands to maintain their wives.

District Supt. Charles D. Schmidt, attending a National Association of School Administrators regional meeting in San Francisco, is expected to return to Salem today in time for the board meeting.

Film Actress McDonald to Seek Divorce

CINCINNATI (AP)—The stormy marital life of actress Marie McDonald is headed toward the divorce court again.

The beautiful blonde said Wednesday she had changed her mind and intends to sue Harry Karl for a divorce, so she "can testify against him" in connection with her recent charge that he engineered her abduction more than a year ago.

A suit for \$1,000,000 damages, filed Tuesday in Los Angeles by Sid Hudson, an associate of her husband, and charging her with slander, determined her course, she told a newsman.

It was only last week that Miss McDonald passed off a request from her husband for a divorce. At that time she said she loved him and considered his admitted infatuation with another woman a passing fancy.

Hudson, in his suit, charged Miss McDonald has refused to grant permission to Karl to divorce her but on the contrary, for spite, vengeance and sheer wanton disregard for truth and human feelings, falsely and maliciously accused Karl and Hudson of conspiring to commit the alleged kidnaping.

Olds, Fisher Idle 15,250

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Oldsmobile and Fisher Body plants of General Motors Corp. shut down operations here Wednesday until Monday, idling some 15,250 workers.

Spokesmen said the shutdown was caused by growing dealer inventories.

J. F. Wolfram, Olds general manager, said 150 workers will not be called back immediately Monday because of adjusted production schedules.

With the new layoffs, Olds will employ about 10,750 workers, some 1,000 less than a year ago at this time.

Fisher Body employs 4,250, down from 4,370 a year ago. It recently laid off 250 workers.

Argentina Bank Clerks Arrested
BUENOS AIRES (AP)—The government put several hundred bank clerks under arrest in military barracks Wednesday. The clerks defied government orders to get back on the job in earnest after a seven-week strike.

A decree issued Sunday ordered mobilization of all bank personnel. The union told its members to return to work Wednesday but to engage in slowdown tactics.

The strikers want more pay. Bank managers refused to continue negotiations unless the clerks returned to work first.

Congregational Church Chooses New Minister

Rev. David D. Rose, Rock Springs, Wyo., called Wednesday night as minister of Salem's First Congregational Church.

The call was extended at a meeting of the congregation, with 150 members attending unanimously by accepting the recommendation of its pulp committee. He is expected to take over the pulpit in the next few weeks.

Rev. and Mrs. Rose visited Salem 10 days ago, with Rose conducting both Sunday services at the church.

Connecticut Native
Rose, a native of Connecticut, is a graduate of Tufts College and Andover Newton Theological Seminary.

He was ordained in 1941 and served four small churches in Indiana for two years, a church in Orono, Maine, for three years, and Alki Congregational Church, Seattle, for seven years. Rose went to Rock Springs four years ago.

He has served in various capacities in the Wyoming Conference and is now chairman of its Christian World Mission department.

Succeeds Dr. Keiser
The Roses have four children. They are Deborah, 11, Mary, 9, Elizabeth, 7, and William, 3. Rose will succeed Dr. Julian J. Keiser, who went to Los Angeles Dec. 1 to become minister of social action and inner city ministry of the Congregational Christian Conference of California and the Southwest.

Shots Panic Health Center

NEW YORK (AP)—A Chinese suddenly opened fire with a revolver among 200 persons in a Bronx rehabilitation center Wednesday, killing one man and wounding another.

Scores of those in the building—tubercular, cardiac and mentally disturbed cases—required sedatives after trying to flee in panic. They were seated at sewing machines when the first of nine shots rang out.

Police seized Norm Lee, 40, as the gunman. They said he fired one of the shots at them. The police fired one shot that hit a wall.

Lee is tubercular and had been undergoing rehabilitation at the center.

He was quoted as saying, just before the shooting: "The people around here don't like me."

2,600 Look Over Farm Mutual's New Building Here

More than 1,500 persons were guests of the State Farm Mutual Insurance Company Wednesday night for the closing of a two-day open house which saw a total of about 2,600 looking over the 739,000 building.

Visitors were guests of the company's employes and were conducted on tours of the firm, in which a huge electronic brain computing machine was on display.
