Packers See Grading as State Contract Aid

"If and when Oregon meat packers request a grading program from the State Department of Agriculture and are willing to pay for the program, we have sufficient legislation to start it," declared State Agriculture Director Robert J. Steward Wednesday at the conclusion of a meeting dealing with state meat contracts.

Steward called the Salem meeting to determine what would be necessary to enable packing plants now under state meat inspection to bid on state contracts. He said many of these plants have expressed interest in bidding on contracts to supply meat products to the state institutions.

Would Expand List

State Finance Director John Richardson said the state buys only federally graded meat, but they would expand their list of eligible bidders to include Oregon packers provided they could be assured of inspection for wholesomeness together with grading comparable with the federal system.

The 1957 Legislature provided for a statewide meat inspection program in Oregon which is now in effect throughout the state. Wyoming is now the only state with a grading system on the state level. Meat inspection establishes the wholesomeness of the product and the sanitary conditions in which it is handled; grading establishes degree of quality.

Grading Said Factor

Steward said that some packers contend that grading is a factor in competition for the consumers' dollar. Consumers are now more grade conscious and packers feel that grades would be a "marketing tool."

Steward told the group he has called a meeting April 3 in Salem of members of the federal grading service staff and representatives of the livestock feeder industry. This will be a workshop on techniques and meaning of grading.

Noting the interest in Venezuela because of its recent revolution, Johnson said he had been through three of them and would rather get out than in.

"That's their business and not ours," he said. Johnson will speak before North Salem High School assembly at 9:30 this morning and will address a noon meeting of the YM Board of Directors.

He will leave this afternoon for Portland where he was executive of the Downtown Branch for seven years until 1946.
