Bananas Give Ideas For Main Dish, Bread

We've been having a wonderful supply of bananas with pretty good prices offered at some of the shops. Some folks have never eaten enough bananas right out of the skins to satisfy their taste, but others like to do things with the fruit.

If you are eating the banana and it is flecked with brown, you'll find it is its most flavorful condition. If you plan to use the banana in salad or fruit cups it should be all ripe but need not be brown-flecked. When tipped with green, and therefore only partially ripe, it is just ready for broiling, baking or frying. The slightly underripe banana has quite a different flavor when cooked than the ripe ones.

Bananas are recommended for broiling to be served with meat, can be cooked and given a cheese sauce to make them a main dish in their own right. Pan fried with eggs or sausage they are excellent for breakfast. Banana bread is a good teatime food, it keeps well too, so make it a day or so ahead.

Banana Bread

1 1/2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
2 eggs, well beaten
1 cup mashed ripe bananas
(2 or 3 bananas)

Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add flour and other dry ingredients sifted together, alternating with the bananas, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Turn into well greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees for 1 hour and 10 minutes or until done. Makes 1 loaf.

Bananas join bran in this muffin recipe:

Banana Bran Muffins

1 cup sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup sugar
1 cup bran
1 egg, well beaten
2 tablespoons sour milk or buttermilk
2 tablespoons melted shortening
2 cups thinly sliced bananas

Sift flour, soda, salt and sugar into mixing bowl. Add bran and mix well. Combine egg, milk, shortening and bananas. Add to dry ingredients, mixing only enough to dampen flour. Turn into well-greased muffin tins, bake at 375 degrees 30 to 35 minutes or until done. Makes 8 large muffins.
