## Fairview Notes Patient Care Improvements

Continued improvements in the field of patient care at Fairview Home were noted Thursday in the annual 1957 report to the State Board of Control made by Dr. Irvin B. Hill, superintendent.

Dr. Hill said there were 22 deaths during 1957, the lowest number in more than 25 years.

"The amount of tuberculosis became so low," he reported, "that our TB ward was closed and the few remaining patients were transferred to the State Tuberculosis Hospital for treatment."

"An outbreak of Asian influenza in the fall affected 1,100 patients, but as a result of excellent medical and nursing care," he continued, "there were only two deaths in this group."

In his report Dr. Hill noticed the increased amount of dental work and the increased recreation program made possible by the multi-purpose building.

"Many more patients have been taken home on visits than in the past. This represents better acceptance of the mentally retarded by the patients' relatives and by the public."

He said a major step in improving patient care was the consolidation of responsibility for "Co-ordinating all phases of treatment and training under the medical staff. This has led to better utilization of all professional personnel and more consideration of the total requirements of each patient."

The total patient population on Dec. 31, 1957, was 2,813 with a waiting list of 431. During the year there were 91 new admissions at Fairview, 53 patients were discharged after being away from the institution for one year and 196 new commitments were made.

"The highest rate of commitments continues to be in the teenage group," he said.

## Movements Near Store Bring Arrests

Suspicious movements near a North Salem grocery store early Thursday morning led to arrest of two Salem men on charges of attempted burglary, city police said.

The pair were listed as Gerald Bertrand Corrigan, 31, and Elmer Boyd Gravelle, 29, both of 419 19th St. SE. Officers said the men admitted being ex-convicts.

Another charge filed against Corrigan Thursday was obtaining property by impersonating another person, police reported. There is no connection between the two charges.

The attempted burglary charges resulted after an officer noticed a man, crowbar in hand, standing at the door of Gray's Grocery, 2000 Capitol St. NE, about 2:30 a.m. The man disappeared when detected.

Further investigation, said the officer, disclosed a car with motor running parked nearby with two men in it. Found in the vehicle were a crowbar, two saw blades, a hatchet and a punch. Another crowbar was under the car.

The charge of obtaining property by impersonating another, filed against Corrigan, was based on a complaint from Weisfeld's Jewelers that a man who gave his name as Charles Southerly bought a lady's and man's diamond rings on credit last Jan. 20. Total value of the rings was \$250.

Police said Corrigan and Gravelle were held under \$2,000 bail each on the attempted burglary charges. Corrigan's bail on the second charge was set at \$500.
