Holmes Urges Restoration of Water Clause

Gov. Robert D. Holmes has wired congressmen and western governors to urge restoration of a provision relating to state water laws in Senate Bill 697. In the telegram, the governor urged Oregon's congressional delegation and the 11 western governors to take similar action. The governor said the bill's section 200 (A), deleted in the House version, should be reinstated with appropriate provision relating to water uses.

The telegram said in part: "We are critically concerned that SB 697 providing authorization for public works on rivers and harbors by the Corps of Engineers include provision that water storage for municipal, industrial, domestic and other beneficial uses and for increasing low flows downstream be maintained and used in compliance with applicable state laws." "Only by such a provision can we maintain the integrity of water rights and local water resource programs."

The telegram also went to Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson, Speaker Sam Rayburn, Sen. William Knowland and Congressman James E. Murray.

Contracting Work to Be Completed At Waldo Junior High by April 15

The first of Salem's two \$14 million junior high schools under construction will be completed in another month and the other won't be far behind, architect William I. Williams said Saturday.

General contracting at Waldo Junior High School, on Lansing Avenue NE south of Silverton Road, will be completed by April 15, he said, and at Judson Junior High School, on Jones Road SE near Hillwood Drive, by June 1. The contractors have a little leeway in their schedule. Contract completion date for both schools is June 15.

Ample Time Available
Quite a bit of work will remain to be done on separate contracts by school crews but there will be ample time to do it, Salem School District Supt. Charles D. Schmidt said. The schools will open with the start of next school year, tentatively set for Sept. 8.

Inside floor covering and installation of steel corridor lockers and outside blacktopping are to be done on separate contracts. Landscaping and athletic field work, and installation of furniture and equipment for 19 classrooms and home economics, clothing, family living, science, health, physical education, music and special education rooms, cafeteria, kitchen and library also will remain to be done during the summer.

Complete at Waldo
Architect's reports at a Salem School Board meeting last week showed masonry, lathing and plastering complete at Waldo School and in progress at Judson.

Workers at Waldo now are installing and finishing wooden cabinets and acoustical tile and painting. The finish floor also is being laid in the large double gymnasium which can be made into two small gyms by closing a sliding door. General contracting by Paul B. Emerick Co. was reported 78 per cent complete at Judson last week and 84 per cent at Waldo. Bowen Brothers mechanical contractors reported 80 per cent complete at each school; Lord Electric Co., 90 per cent.

Community Colleges 'Not Dumping Sites'

"Community colleges should take the student where he is and give him the services he needs to extend his education," a nationally known education authority said here at weekend meeting of the legislative interim committee on education. "But this does not mean that community colleges are dumping grounds of students not acceptable to the senior institutions," added Dr. D. Grant Morrison, specialist in junior community colleges for the U. S. Department of Education. Emphasis should be placed, he said, on the idea that community colleges should never be second-grade in students, instructors or support in finance.

Dr. Raymond Hatch, Lansing Mich., president of the National Vocational Guidance Association, said "we believe there is nothing sacred about the 12 year concept in education." He said the provision of up to the 14th year in local education can do a great deal to help in solving the tremendous enrollment pressure problems of the next few years. It was brought out that the 1937 legislature appropriated \$80,000 for the current biennium in connection with junior colleges.

Rural School Law
Discussion of the rural school law of the 1937 legislature was sparked by Robert Van Houte, Stanfield, and David Vandenhorst, Umatilla, the rural school law becomes operative July 1. Van Houte and Vandenhorst said there was a feeling that the new law was unfair to taxpayers in the poorer school districts and some of its sections should be revised. Representative Glen Stadler, Eugene, was appointed a member of the interim committee to succeed Rep. Keith Skelton, also of the Eugene area, who resigned.
